RICHARD ROHR'S MEDITATION:

GROWING IN LOVE'S LIKENESS ~ FALLING INTO MERCY

The transition to the second half of life moves you from either/or thinking to both/and thinking: the ability to increasingly live with paradox and mystery. You no longer think in terms of win/lose, but win/win. It is a very different mind and strategy for life. In order for this alternative consciousness to become your primary way of thinking, you usually have to experience something that forces either/or thinking to fall apart. Perhaps you hate homosexuality and then you meet a wonderful gay couple. Or you meet a Muslim who is more loving than most of your Christian friends. Or you encounter a young immigrant who doesn't match your stereotypes at all. Something must break your addiction to yourself and your opinions.

Your first reaction is a struggle: "What do I do now? I don't like this. I can't deal with this. I want to go back to my familiar and habitual world." You know your lesbian daughter is good and you love her and don't want to reject her. So you ask your minister, "What will I do?" (Hopefully you have a wise, nondual minister!) Inside such "liminal space" is where real change happens, where your self-serving little dualisms must fall apart. It might be called growing up.

Jesus always honoured and often idealised good, holy non-Jews, like the Samaritan man (Luke 10:29-37), the Roman centurion (Matthew 8:5-13), and the Syro-Phoenician woman (Mark 7:24-30). But even his disciples struggled to accept that the outsider could or should be accepted. If you're stuck in the first half of life, with your explanation about why you or your group are the best, you will hold on strongly because it's all you have, and any change feels like dying.

Often the only thing that can break down your natural egocentricity is discovering that the qualities you hate in others are actually within you. You're not so moral after all. You've imagined doing "bad" things; and if you could get away with it, you know you'd do it. Perhaps the only reason you don't is because you're afraid. Fear is not enlightenment. Fear is not the new transformed state of the risen Christ that we've been promised. Fear keeps you inside of a false order and will not allow any reordering.

Unless you somehow "weep" over your own phoniness, hypocrisy, fear, and woundedness, you probably won't let go of the first half of life. If you don't allow this needed disappointment to well up within you, if you surround yourself with your orthodoxies and your certitudes and your belief that you're the best, frankly, you will stay in the first half of life forever. Many religious people never allow themselves to fall, while many "sinners" fall and rise again. Our greatest sin is not falling or failing, but refusing to rise and trust ourselves—and God—again. Make sure you are always in need of mercy and you will never stop growing.





I believe it because I believe that that one God who is Father made heaven and earth, made all of me, the frail and broken bits as well as the divine and noble. I believe it because I believe in Jesus the Christ who showed how glorious this humanity of ours is and drew it into the very heart of God. I believe it because the love which is the very being of God, the love which is the Holy Spirit, has been poured into this humble earthen vessel.



GOSPEL REFLECTIONS

EASTER! ALLELUIA! ALLELUIA!

Christendom's joyous celebration of Jesus closing his eyes in agony to the world and raised by God into the soaring majesty of the cosmic Christ within the glory and wonder of God in and around us.

Was Easter once a pagan festival as some like to say, suggesting "true" Christians should ignore its celebrations? Easter *Pasch* or *Passover*, commemorating the early Israelites escape from slavery in Egypt remained a major festival for early Christians and as Christianity spread into Anglo-Saxon countries the name became associated with the pagan goddess of Spring, Aostere. According to the Venerable Bede (7-8th century) every year during the Northern Hemisphere's Spring Equinox the people celebrated with a holiday the return of Aostere from who knows where, to light and warm the earth and make it productive again after the long, cold, dark winter. But the goddess' time was limited.

In a nondescript part of the great Roman Empire, Jesus was preaching about the one God of inexhaustible Light and Love. Light from which all the created suns, stars and moons have their light and Love permeating all things including each of us. He not only taught about God, he exuded God and crowds flocked around him intrigued by his unique relationship with God and what he taught and lived himself, *love of God and others*.

He aroused the hostility of the powerful Religious Establishment by his interpretation of the Torah and declaring that some of his religion's traditions were not from God but were manmade (Mark 7:8). We know what happened. Betrayed while in hiding he was arrested and taken to Pilate, the Roman Prefect, who, fearing a riot when Jerusalem was crowded with pilgrims for the great feast of Passover, coldly and mercilessly had him tortured and executed by one of the cruellest deaths devised by man at his barbaric worst.

He died physically in indescribably agony, a criminal not fit to live among righteous people, deserted by all but a beloved follower and a few women. But spirit never dies, and through Jesus' living spirit glorified in the omnipresent God there erupted on earth a spiritual movement more momentous and widespread than any before or after it. It spread *like fire upon the earth*" (Luke 12:49) from Galilee into Rome, Greece, Anglo-Saxon countries and beyond changing hearts and so history through the centuries to us today. Eostere faded away and Rome's pagan gods with her (Eostere left behind her imprint - the female hormone is named Oestrogen.)

Rome could deal with upstarts whether men of dreams or men of action. It could digest them, neutralise them or crush them. Whether in war or politics or philosophy it would never be bested least of all by some oddball from a small country you could almost jump across. To have been told that a child would grow to entrance minds, hearts and imaginations for the next two thousand years, found a religion that would digest Rome itself, a culture that would eclipse that of Rome, might have unhinged minds. Yet it would all prove true. The emperors might leave a mark and some be remembered, but none of them be remembered like Christ or act like him as a living person in so many lives. The gods of Rome and Greece faded away at his coming." Was Jesus resurrection physical or spiritual that first Eastertime in Jerusalem? Scripture gives accounts of his encounters with people that not only differ, but at times are contradictory and we wonder. But whatever the discrepancies and contradictions, one thing no one can deny, something happened.

Scripture makes no secret that when Jesus was here as a historical person, the twelve he chose as an inner circle around him were so weak and spiritually dull, at times he seemed almost to despair of them (Matt 17:17). When their beloved Leader was crucified, terrified that they too would be arrested as his followers, they huddled together behind locked doors in Jerusalem, guilt-ridden over their cowardly behaviour deserting in his darkest hours and grief stricken over his cruel execution.

Then something happened so unexpected and overwhelming that those weak, trembling men were never the same again. Nothing else can explain what changed them to the depths of being other than what they said happened. Jesus, crucified as a blasphemer, seducer of the people, his cause a failure had died, but still was vibrantly alive, vindicated by God and glorified. They had met him and those encounters, altered without doubt in the telling and retelling, were why those frightened men in hiding became so filled with such unmovable faith in Jesus and his resurrection all they wanted with unprecedented courage, was to go out to tell everyone they could of his still living presence with them. With all people, lovingly supporting, disciplining and directing all who live his way to find purpose in living and meaning in dying. His cause had not finished, it was about to begin.

Every ordeal in life physical or spiritual is a little death to the self, a deepening and strengthening of the spirit soul in God. Those who live in union with the spirit of Jesus are among the least interested in whether the resurrection was a physical or spiritual event. For them, they say, they know the spirit's loving comfort, support and direction is with them through all their adversities in life and in the light of that miracle any speculation about the manner of the first appearances is of little consequence. That Good Friday is always followed by Easter.

That new possibility and its radical novelty should also never be understated. From the beginning of time until Jesus' resurrection, dead bodies stayed dead. And from Adam and Eve until that same resurrection, wounded and dead hearts stayed wounded and dead. All that has now changed. There are new possibilities.

What is new in the resurrection is not just the unbelievable new possibility of physical resurrection. The resurrection gives us to the equally unbelievable possibility of the newness of life that forgiving and being forgiven brings. In our day to day lives that is how we are asked to appropriate the resurrection of Jesus, by forgiving and by letting ourselves be forgiven.

In Mark's account of the death and resurrection, our human condition is symbolised by a young man who was following Jesus' journey to the cross from a safe distance. At a certain point this young man, who is wearing only a white linen cloth, is seized. He escapes his captors and flees naked, leaving the cloth behind. That betrayal is yours and mine. But we next meet him on Easter Sunday, sitting on the tomb of the resurrected Jesus, wearing again his linen cloth and announcing to the whole world that Jesus has been raised, that an unbelievable newness has burst into our world, and that there is something even beyond our wounds, sins, and betrayals. The chain of anger has been broken.

REFLECTING ON THIS SUNDAY'S SCRIPTURES

To him all the prophets bear witness, that everyone who believes in him will receive forgiveness of sins through his name." (First Reading)

THE RESURRECTION OF CHRIST BRINGS FORTH FORGIVENESS

Forgiveness is the only thing that is new and it is the message of the resurrection.

The world contains only one thing that is truly novel, forgiveness. Everything else is an old tape repeating itself endlessly over and over again. There is normally only one song that gets sung: betrayal-hurt-resentment-non-forgiveness. That pattern never changes. There is an unbroken chain of unforgiven resentment and anger stretching back to Adam and Eve.

We are all part of that chain. Everyone is wounded and everyone wounds. Everyone sins and everyone is sinned against. Everyone needs to forgive and everyone needs to be forgiven.

Betrayal is an archetypal structure within the human soul, just as sin is innate within the human condition. We, all of us, betray and sin. We betray ourselves, betray our loved ones, betray our communities, and sin against our God. Everyone stands in need of forgiveness.

But we are also, each one of us, betrayed and sinned against. We are betrayed by our loved ones, by churches, by our communities, and, in a manner of speaking, even by our God. It is not for nothing that, on the cross, Jesus, incarnating there all that is human, cries out: "My God, my God, why have you forsaken me?" We all feel betrayed at that deep level sometimes. Hence, as badly as we need to be forgiven, we also need to forgive.

We have hurt others and we have been hurt. We have sinned and we have been sinned against and when we wake up to that we have a choice: Like Judas we can cleanse ourselves of this, figuratively speaking, by taking what we have gained by our sin, the thirty pieces of silver, and throwing it back into the temple and walking away, purified, but unforgiven, walking straight towards suicide. Conversely, though, we can do like Peter, after his great betrayal, weep bitterly and then return, humbled, compromised and scarred, but forgiven, walking solidly into life. In forgiveness lies the difference between the choice for suicide and the choice for life.

But forgiveness is not easy. An old adage says: To err is human, to forgive is divine. More accurately, one might put it this way: To forgive is the grace that is given by the resurrection.

The resurrection of Jesus has many dimensions. At one level, it was a physical event. The dead body of Jesus was raised, the cosmic universe at its deepest level suddenly had a new set of laws, and the very atoms of this universe, as nature first arranged them, were re-arranged. Something radically new, physically new, as radical and new as the original creation, appeared within history. This aspect should never be, as it recently has been, understated.

However the resurrection was also a spiritual event and that too is important. In the resurrection of Jesus we are given not just the potential for a resurrected body and a resurrected cosmos, we are given as well the possibility of forgiveness, of being forgiven and of forgiving each other.
