

PARISH BLESSING OF ANIMALS



Since the feast of St Francis of Assisi (4th October) fell during the school holidays we will have our annual blessing of animals on Sunday 25th October immediately after the 11:30am Mass—that is, at 12:30pm - on the grassed area in the lower playground of Holy Family school (entry via the gate in Balfour St).

This is for the whole parish – our two communities. Please bring your pets, however large or small, to be blessed and to be celebrated as part of God's creation.

WHAT IS THIS SYMBOL?



We've all seen this Christian symbol, but what does it represent? the CR symbol was a shorthand code used by early Christians to identify themselves to one another and to mark sacred places. This symbol is called the chi-rho (pronounced ky – row). It basically consists of the two Greek letters X (chi) and P (rho) overlapping. The letter X is the equivalent of our "ch" (pronounced hard as in 'choir'). The letter P is a capital "R".

The chi-rho symbol is thus the first two letters of the word 'Christ' in Greek:

Capital letters: XΡΙΣΤΟΣ Small letters: χριστος English: CHRISTOS

The chi-ro symbol is thus a simple way of representing Jesus himself: the Christ.

THE RETURN OF OUR MONTHLY YOUTH AND FAMILY MASS I

BOOKING

The current public health restrictions require us to keep numbers to the limit imposed by the four square metre per person rule (56 people for Killara church and 46 for Lindfield).

So it's necessary to make a booking to attend Mass each week – however this is very simple, taking only a few seconds. You can book up to 1 hour before each Mass. Or call the Parish Office and we'll book for you.

There's no restriction on how often you attend Mass—you just must book EACH time for each person attending.

COLLECTIONS

For health and safety we won't pass round the collection bowls – however there will be two boxes clearly labelled **FIRST COLLECTION AND SECOND COLLECTION** in a prominent position in the centre of each church. We hope that after the long period of church closure you can resume your weekly giving. There are also Tap and Go machines in Lindfield church (and soon at Killara also) and the homepage of our website gives details about **o**nline giving.

Of course, if you – or anyone at home in your household – has even the mildest sign of a cold or other respiratory infection

PLEASE DO NOT ATTEND MASS.

WE HAVE A COVID SAFETY PLAN

- We adhere to maximum number of person permitted in the church based on the four square metre rule (46 people at Lindfield and 56 at Killara)
- Green ticks on the seats indicating seating positions ensure maximum separation
- All are asked to sanitise their hands on entering & leaving
- We ask all who attend to wear a face mask
- The pews etc are sanitised after every Mass
- There is no congregational singing and no physical exchange of the sign of peace.
- All are asked to maintain 2 metre spacing when coming forward for Holy Communion (which is given on the hand only and not on the tongue).

For those who have health conditions

At each Mass we can accommodate either one person or one couple who need a greater physical distancing in the choir loft at Lindfield for Sunday or weekday Mass. There will be nobody else in the choir loft with you. Please contact the Parish Office to book a spot in the choir loft.

Even though the public celebration of Sunday Mass has resumed we are also continuing to have our online celebration of Mass because we know that there are many who at this time cannot resume coming to Mass either for reason of age or underlying health condition.

THE MANY FACES OF THE EUCHARIST

Christians argue a lot about the Eucharist. What does it mean? What should it be called? How often should it be celebrated? Who should be allowed to fully participate? So, there are lots of views on the Eucharist.

- For some it is a meal, for others it is a sacrifice.
- For some it is a ritual act, sacred and set apart, for others it is a community gathering, the more mess and kids the better
- For some it is a deep personal prayer, for others it is a communal worship for the world.
- For some its very essence is a coming together, a communion of those united in a single denominational faith, while for others part of its essence is its reaching out, its innate imperative to wash the feet of those who are different from ourselves.
- For some it is a celebration of sorrow, a making present of Christ's suffering and the thus the place where we can break down, for others it is the place to celebrate joy and sing alleluia.
- For some it is a ritual remembrance, a making present of the historical events of Jesus' dying, rising, ascending, and sending of the Holy Spirit, for others it is a celebration of God's presence with us today.
- For some it is a celebration of the Last Supper, something to be done less frequently, for others it is God's daily feeding of his people with a new manna, Christ's body, and is something to be done every day.
- For some it is a celebration of reconciliation, a ritual that forgives and unites, for others unity and reconciliation are pre-conditions for its proper celebration.
- For some it is a vigil act, a gathering that is essentially about waiting for something else or someone else to appear, for others it is a celebration of something that is already present, something that is asking to be received and recognised.
- For some it is understood to make present the real, physical body of Christ, for others it is understood to make Christ present in a real but spiritual way.
- Some call it the Lord's Supper, others call it the Eucharist, others call it the Mass.
- Some celebrate it once a year, some celebrate it four times a year, some celebrate it every Sunday, and some celebrate it every day.

Who's right? In truth, the Eucharist is all of these things, and more. It is like a finely-cut diamond twirling in the sun, every turn giving off a different sparkle. It is

multivalent, carrying different layers of meaning, some of them in paradoxical tension with others. There is, even in scripture, no one theology of the Eucharist, but instead there are various complementary theologies of the Eucharist.

For instance, we already see variations among the apostolic communities as to how they understood the Eucharist, what it should be called, and how often it should be celebrated. Some early communities called it the Lord's Supper, connected its meaning very much to the commemoration of the Last Supper, and celebrated it less frequently. But the apostolic community that formed around John connected its theology and practice very much to the concept of God feeding his people daily with manna and they celebrated it every day, given that we need sustenance daily.

As well, we see some of its paradoxical elements right within its central symbols, bread and the wine: bread is both is symbol of joy, togetherness, health, and achievement (the smell of fresh bread and the primal beauty of a loaf of bread) even as it is made up of broken kernels of wheat who had to be crushed in their individuality and be baked in fire to become that bread. Wine is both a festive drink, the drink of celebration, of wedding, even as it is crushed grapes and represents the blood of Jesus and the blood and suffering of all that is crushed in our world and in our lives.

How does one put this all together?

During my theological training, I took three major courses on the Eucharist and, afterwards, decided that I didn't understand it. But the fault was not in courses, which were excellent. The fault, which is not a fault at all but a marvel, lies in the richness of the Eucharist itself. In the end, it defies not just theology professors, but metaphysics, phenomenology, and language itself.

There is no adequate explanation of the Eucharist for the same reason that, in the end, there is no adequate explanation for love, for embrace, and for the reception of life and spirit through touch. Certain realities take us beyond language because that is their very purpose. They do what words cannot do. They also are beyond what we can neatly nail down in our understanding.

And that is true of the Eucharist. Any attempt to nail down its full meaning will forever come up short because it will always eventually get up and walk away with that nail!

FR RICHARD ROHR OFM'S MEDITATION ST FRANCIS: A MESSAGE FOR OUR TIMES: A COSMIC MUTUALITY

Jesus saw God in all that he saw. —James Finley

Let us place our first step in the ascent at the bottom, presenting to ourselves the whole material world as a mirror through which we may pass over to God, the footprints that reveal the divine DNA underlying all the supreme [Artisan]. —Bonaventure (1221–1274)

In stories of his life, Francis is quoted as talking to animals and natural elements. He does not speak to them just as birds or wolves, but as mutual spiritual beings who are worthy of being addressed. He was always telling them who they are, why they should be happy, and why they make him happy. He said they give glory to God just by being who they are! One of his early biographers wrote, "We who were with him saw him always in such joy, inwardly and outwardly, over all creatures, touching and looking at them, so that it seemed that his spirit was no longer on earth but in heaven." [1] That may sound sentimental to our modern ears, but perhaps that is what a saint looks like—completely attuned to God's presence everywhere and "reality" to it, rather than theological concepts or like—completely attuned to God's presence everywhere and at all times.

Francis talked to larks, lambs, rabbits, pheasants, falcons, cicadas, waterfowl, bees, the famous wolf of Gubbio, pigs, and hooked fish that he threw back into the water whenever possible. He addresses inanimate creation too, as if it were indeed ensouled, which we know because his Canticle of the Creatures includes fire, wind, water, Brother Sun, Sister Moon, and, of course, "our Sister Mother Earth" herself. So-called "nature mysticism" was in fact a worthy first path [3] Dawn M. Nothwehr, Ecological Footprints: An Essential Franciscan for Francis, and also for Bonaventure, the scholar who Guide for Faith and Sustainable Living (Liturgical Press: 2012), xx.

brought the vision of Francis and Clare to the level of a total theology, philosophy, and worldview. Bonaventure saw all things as likenesses of God (vestigia Dei, fingerprints and links in the Great Chain of Being. Both Francis and Bonaventure laid the foundation for what John Duns Scotus (1266-1308) would later identify as the univocity (one voice) of all being, and what Dawn Nothwehr, a Franciscan sister, calls "cosmic mutuality." [3]

Creation itself—not ritual or spaces constructed by human hands—was Francis' primary cathedral. His love for creation drove him back into the needs of the city, a pattern very similar to Jesus' own movement between desert solitude (contemplation) and small-town healing ministry (action). The Gospel transforms us by putting us in touch with that which is much more constant and satisfying, ritualisation of reality. Daily cosmic events in the sky and on the earth are the Reality above our heads and beneath our feet every minute of our lives: a continuous sacrament, signs of God's universal presence in all things.

! PLEASE READ THIS !



Just a few important reminders about how we can keep each other safe at Mass:

- Please sit only on the designated ticks \checkmark
- A MAXIMUM of two adults, or two adults and one young child can sit together where there is a tick. Otherwise the staggered spacing of the ticks becomes ineffective. If three adults attend together two can sit adjacent to a tick, but the third must sit in a separate spot.
- For families of FOUR OR MORE please sit in the pews where the sign reads 'For families of 4 or more people'. We have provided greater spacing between these pews and the next pew containing a member of the congregation. If you're unsure where these are please check with the Welcomer at the door who'll be happy to point out where
- When coming forward for Holy Communion please maintain a space of four pews between each person for the whole length of the queue both approaching the altar and returning. When you reach the celebrant please extend your arms at full stretch (as will the celebrant) so as to maintain a 1.5 metre separation. If you are wearing a mask (as we hope you do for the Communion procession), when coming forward to receive Holy Communion please keep the mask on as you receive the Host; then step 1.5 metres to the side before lowering the mask to place the Host in your mouth.

FACE MASKS

By way of explanation....

Hi all. I just thought it would be good to revise the context of some issues affecting our parish life during this time of Covid...

- as you know we sanitise the churches after each Mass. So that this doesn't have to be done to the sanctuary and sacristy Fr Thomas and I are currently confining ourselves to one church. This is simply a public health initiative—we of course are both serving our whole parish of Lindfield-Killara and share in all that happens in the background to sustain our parish life.
- As you know we are aiming to provide many more opportunities for you to take part in Mass on the weekends given the limited capacity of our churches. We celebrate 9 'live' Masses and I also celebrate the online Mass on Saturday mornings in readiness for Sunday. Because of these very full weekends we have cut back the number of weekday Masses and I hope you understand that I now take both Monday and Tuesday off. As a result, during Fr Thomas' current leave there is only weekday Mass from Wednesday—Friday.

I hope you understand the need for these changes during this time of Covid.




