

'Have a care for justice' was Isaiah's challenge in the first reading.

In the Gospel, Jesus' response to the request of the foreigner by granting a miracle is an 'audio-visual' way, as it were, of reminding us that God's love isn't constrained by boundaries. God didn't create the different nations on this planet: what God did create was one single world. It was human beings who created nations — and all the other walls and divisions we set up between ourselves: walls, fences and boundaries ~ reasons to separate us from one another.

Each week we profess our belief in one God: but we can never forget the full ramifications of that profession of faith. If we profess faith in God, then we profess faith in what God has created; if we profess faith in one God, then we profess faith in a fundamental oneness in all that God create. To say, as we do, in the Creed that we believe in one God must mean that we likewise believe in one humanity, one human race, created by that one God. To be Christian surely means in the first place to try to look at the world, to look at other human beings, as God looks at them: that's at the core of being Christian and Catholic.

So today we can put that question before ourselves: are we people who erect walls and fences, reasons for seeing each other as different? Or are we a people who tear barriers down?


FACE MASKS

BOOKING

The current public health restrictions require us to keep numbers to the limit imposed by the four square metre per person rule (50 people for Killara church and 45 for Lindfield.

So it's necessary to make a booking to attend Mass each week – however this is very simple, taking only a few seconds. You can book up to 1 hour before each Mass. Either go to the special hotlink box on the homepage of our parish website (www.lindfieldkillara.org.au) or click on this link: https://www.bbcatholic.org.au/lindfield-killara/mass-and-prayer-times/the-return-of-sunday-and-weekday-mass-with-50-people

Or call the Parish Office and we'll book for you.

There's no restriction on how often you attend Mass—you just must book EACH time for each person attending.

COLLECTIONS

For health and safety we won't pass round the collection bowls — however there will be two boxes clearly labelled **FIRST COLLECTION AND SECOND COLLECTION** in a prominent position in the centre of each church. We hope that after the long period of church closure you can resume your weekly giving. There are also Tap and Go machines in Lindfield church (and soon at Killara also) and the homepage of our website gives details about **o**nline giving.

Of course, if you – or anyone at home in your household – has even the mildest sign of a cold or other respiratory infection

PLEASE DO NOT ATTEND MASS.

WE HAVE A COVID SAFETY PLAN

- We adhere to maximum number of person permitted in the church based on the four square metre rule (46 people at Lindfield and 50 at Killara)
- Green ticks on the seats indicating seating positions ensure maximum separation
- All are asked to sanitise their hands on entering & leaving
- ◆ The pews etc are sanitised after every Mass
- There is no singing as required by health regulations and no physical exchange of the sign of peace.
- All are asked to maintain 2 metre spacing when coming forward for Holy Communion (which is given on the hand only and not on the tongue).

For those who have health conditions

At each Mass we can accommodate either one person or one couple who need a greater physical distancing in the choir loft at Lindfield for Sunday or weekday Mass. There will be nobody else in the choir loft with you. Please contact the Parish Office to book a spot in the choir loft.

The Tyranny of Program

During my graduate studies in Louvain, I had the good fortune of having Cristianne Brusselmanns as a professor. Many will recognize that name and recognize as well the pivotal role this woman played in restoring the adult rite of initiation (RCIA) in the West. Cristianne was an exceptional teacher, one-in-a-million, who radiated catholicity, graciousness, and depth. One of the things she would say again and again about the restored rite for adult initiation, was that it was not meant as the one and only way of entering the church. It was meant as one way, an ideal way, even, but never, never as the only way. God, she would always affirm, works outside of programs, even of good ones. Sadly, we have fallen a long ways from both her catholicity and depth.

Today we are falling victim, I fear, to a new authoritarianism in the church, the tyranny of program. It may look different from the old authoritarianism, but it is not. Many of us remember only too well the days when all the power was concentrated in the hands of one man, the pastor, and where his ecclesiology, interpretation of church law, temperament, and whim, pretty much decided everything. The oral tradition abounds with stories (both horrific and humorous) of the classical, old pastor or monsignor, who ruled with an iron hand and by divine right.

But that kind of authoritarianism is now mostly the stuff of legends. Gone are the old pastor and monsignor of old who could do this. There is a new church, though it seems that things haven't changed much. People are still too much the victim of one narrow view of ecclesiology and church law. Sadly, too, temperament and whim still play a large a role in deciding who enters the church, how one enters the church, and who gets to receive the sacraments.

The old patriarchy has largely been replaced by a new absolutism, the tyranny of good program. A narrow authoritarianism still rules, except now it is the authoritarianism of the parish staff, freshly-trained in theology and liturgy but is not nearly as deeply schooled in catholicity and compassion. The absolutism of the new parish staff has replaced the unquestioned authority of the old monsignor.

It can of course be argued that the parish staff of today is certainly operating out of a better ecclesiology and theology of liturgy and sacraments than did the authority of the monsignor of old. Point granted. However: is Christ being made more accessible? Is our ecclesiology healthier in its Catholicity, depth, and compassion? Are many of the poor still being excluded from church and sacraments because of

our misuse of power? Is a false use of authority still blocking the full compassion of the gospel and giving God a bad name? Are there really fewer horror stories than before?

Certainly new horrors abound: "I wasn't allowed to join the church in this parish and diocese, except through one program, the RCIA." "There will be no eulogy at a funeral in this parish or diocese (no matter how painful the anthropological and emotional circumstances in this particular instance) because the funeral liturgy is complete in and of itself!" "All parents must take the pre-baptism program, even if they themselves have helped instruct those who teach these programs!" "No hymn that isn't approved by the parish team will be sung at a wedding in this parish, irrespective of background (religious, aesthetic, ethnic, and emotional) of the couple who are actually getting married!" The list goes on and on.

A new legalism is replacing the old and it parallels perfectly the old in its lack of compassion, catholicity, depth, and nuance—not to mention how, just like the old, it echoes the personality of the person or persons who are doing the adjudication.

We might all take a lesson in catholicity and good pastoral theology from the incident in the gospels where Jesus is confronted by a Canaanite woman, asking that he cure her daughter. Transliterated, this text, Matthew 15: 21-28 might read like this:

It was the night of the Easter vigil. Jesus had just helped to conduct an eight-month RCIA program and was helping set up things for the candidates who were to be baptized at the vigil liturgy, when I, a woman, who hadn't taken the program, came up to him and said: "Jesus, leader of this RCIA program, I would like to be baptized tonight, with these others." Jesus replied: "You never took the program! This is only for those who took it. It isn't fair to them to baptize you!" But the woman addresses Jesus a second time: "Jesus, you who are the compassion of God for the world and not just for this parish and program, I'm as ready as all those who did take the program!" And Jesus, after interviewing her, right then and there, concludes: "Amen. Indeed you are more ready than any of the candidates scheduled for baptism tonight. Step into line and be baptized ... even though you didn't take the program"!

There's a lesson here.!

FR RICHARD ROHR OFM'S MEDITATION

Mary Magdalene

One of the lessons we might learn from the Gospel stories of Mary Magdalene is that, in the great economy of grace, all is used and transformed. Nothing is wasted. God uses our egoic desires and identities and leads us beyond them. Jesus' clear message to his beloved Mary Magdalene in their first post-resurrection encounter is not that she squelch, deny, or destroy her human love for him. He is much more subtle than that. He just says to her "Do not cling to me" (John 20:17). He is saying "Don't hold on to the past, what you think you need or deserve. We are all heading for something much bigger and much better, Mary." This is the spiritual art of detachment, which is not taught much in the capitalistic worldview where clinging and possessing are not just the norm but even the goal. In ourselves reflected as in a mirror. We are shown that eventually even the greatest things in our lives—even our loves—must be released and allowed to become something new. Otherwise we are trapped. Love has not yet made us

Great love is both very attached ("passionate") and yet very detached at the same time. It is love but not addiction. The soul, the True Self or Whole Self, has everything, and so it does not require any particular thing or person. When we have all things in Christ, we do not have to protect any one

thing. The True Self can love and let go. The separate, small self cannot do this. I am told the "do not cling to me" encounter between Jesus and Mary Magdalene is the most painted Easter scene. The artistic imagination knows that a seeming contradiction was playing out here: intense love and yet appropriate distance. The soul and the spirit tend to love and revel in paradoxes; they operate by resonance and reflection. Our smaller egoic selves want to resolve all paradoxes in a most glib way. We only have to look around at all the struggling relationships in our own lives to see that it's true. When we love exclusively from our small selves, we operate in a way that is mechanical and instrumental, which we now sometimes call codependent. We return again and again to the patterns of interaction we her desire to cling to Jesus and his refusal to allow it, we see know. This is not always bad, but it is surely limited. Great love—loving from our Whole Selves connected to the Source of all love—offers us so much more.

> The ego would like Mary Magdalene and Jesus to be caught up in a passionate love affair. Of course they are, in the deepest sense of the term, but only the True Self knows how to enjoy and picture a love of already satisfied desire. The True Self and separate self see differently; both are necessary, but one is better, bigger, and even eternal.


