The incident in today's Gospel is a powerful re-affirmation of our belief in eternal life and that that life is all about *union with God*, not simply an endless version of this present sort of life.

But as we reflect on our belief in eternal life

it's important that that belief doesn't insulate us from *this* life:

'sometimes Christians become 'other-worldly' in a way that is not faithful to the Gospel:

*' we can believe that becoming involved in the affairs and needs of the world is unnecessary and that all we have to do is to trust that it will all be sorted out in eternal life. But that's not the way Jesus lived. We need to keep our eyes focused *both* on eternity and on the now:*

Our call is to bring what part of the Kingdom we can into being here and now: through our work for justice, compassion, equity. Otherwise we end up with the ridiculous and un-Christian statement that 'religion should keep out of politics'.

'We look to eternal life – but our call as Christians is to bring the justice and love of God into being in our world today.

FOOD FOR THE SOUL.....FR RICHARD ROHR OFM'S MEDITATION: FORGIVING REALITY FOR BEING WHAT IT IS

The story of Noah and the flood is filled with insight. (Although I do not really believe God killed all the people on the earth and saved only one family!) God tells Noah to bring into the ark all the opposites: the wild and the domestic, the crawling and the flying, the clean and the unclean, the male and the female of each animal (Genesis 7:2-15).

Then God does a most amazing thing. God locks them together inside the ark (Genesis 7:16). Check it out.

Most people never note that God actually closed them in! God puts all the natural animosities, all the opposites together, and holds them in one place. I used to think it was about balancing all the opposites within me, but slowly I have learned that it is actually "holding" things in their seemingly unreconciled state that widens and deepens the soul. We must allow things to be only partly resolved, without perfect closure or explanation. Christians have not been taught how to live in hope. The ego always wants to settle the dust quickly and have answers right now. But Paul rightly says, "In hope we are saved, yet hope is not hope if its object is seen" (Romans 8:24). The virtue of hope widens and deepens our foundation.

Noah's ark is not meant to be a cute children's story; it is a mature metaphor for the People of God on the waves of time, carrying the contradictions, the opposites, the tensions, and the paradoxes of humanity—preserving and protecting diversity inside of a safe unity created by God. (Thinking of it merely as punishing "bad" people only appeals to our lowest instincts and

puts us back into meritocracy.) It is no accident that animals are deemed worth saving and that the covenant YHWH proclaims after the flood is "with every living creature," not just humans as we presume. (Read Genesis 9:10, 13, 15, where it is said three times!) This is no small point, although it has been largely ignored.

God's gathering of contraries is, in fact, the very school of salvation, the school of love. That's where growth happens: in honest community and committed relationships. Love is learned in the encounter with "otherness" as both Martin Buber and Emmanuel Levinas taught. Not coincidentally, they both were Jewish philosophers whose worldview was formed by the Hebrew scriptures.

Forgiveness becomes central to Jesus' teaching, because to receive reality is always to "bear it," to bear with reality for not meeting all of our needs. To accept reality is to forgive reality for being what it is, almost day by day and sometimes even hour by hour. Such a practice creates patient and humble people.

Forgiveness reveals three goodnesses simultaneously. When we forgive, we choose the goodness of the other over their faults, we experience God's goodness flowing through ourselves, and we also experience our own capacity for goodness in a way that almost surprises us. We are finally in touch with a much Higher Power, and we slowly learn how to draw upon this Infinite Source.

Food for the soul

That the dead will rise even Moses made known in the passage about bush, | when he called out 'Lord,' the God of Abraham, the God of Isaac, and the God of Jacob; and he is not God of the dead, but of the living, for to him all are alive (Lk 20:37-38)

THE POWER OF POSITIVE THINKING OR THE POWER OF GOD?

Classical writers in all religious traditions tell us that there is a secret to growth, namely, when we reach a certain point, we must let grace do the work. It isn't that we cease making an effort; it's just that we need to let our efforts be augmented by something beyond us.

Etty Hillesum, in her diaries, explains this: "I don't have to tinker with my life [anymore] for an organic process is at work. Something is growing, and every time I look inside, something fresh has happened, and all I have to do is to accept it."

Is this what we call "the resurrection"?

For many people the resurrection is a metaphor, the faith equivalent of the Phoenix-myth: deaths aren't final and we can, if we do it right, rise from our own ashes.

What gives us the power to rise from our own ashes? In this view, proper will-power and positive thinking. The idea is that if you think positively, good things will happen to you. If you believe strongly enough in something, it will happen. If you persevere long enough in hope the good thing wished for will be given you. Faith, hope, and positive thinking make good things happen and resurrect life from its many deaths.

This is the basis for many self-help philosophies and a lot of religious groups. They base themselves more on the power of the human spirit than on the power of transcendent grace. For them, the resurrection is the Phoenix-myth, upgraded a bit by psychological and religious language.

And there is some depth and truth in this. Among other things, the resurrection is about positive thinking and the belief that positive energy makes good things happen, just as self-defeating thoughts are also self-fulfilling. Positive thinking creates positive energy and that energy can help bring life out of ashes. This is true even physically. Sometimes in a serious illness the right attitude is just as important for a cure as the right medication. This is not just wishful thinking; proper attitude lets the right physical, emotional, and spiritual energy flow into the world and into the body.

For many people, this is what the resurrection means, it is a metaphor for the transformation that positive energy can bring into this world.

But resurrection is more than that. It is not just about the potential effect of positive human energy within us; it is too, and especially,

about the power of God, miraculous energy, energy that can do for us what we can't do for ourselves, energy that can do for us what nature, all on its own, can't. The resurrection is about power entering our world and our lives from beyond.

How might we understand that?

Paul Tillich once made a distinction between what he termed: Pseudo-religion, Quasi-religion, and Real-religion.

Pseudo-religion is when we use the language of religion (God, revelation, grace, resurrection) but in essence, use those words to refer to what is highest inside of our individual consciousness. And that, at its best, can take us to human maturity and altruism, just as at its worst it can take us to narcissism and grandiosity. In either case, in the end, we are recycling human consciousness, and will-power and positive thinking play the pivotal role in any growth and transformation.

Quasi-religion, on the other hand, does not use the language of religion but uses instead the language of social analysis, psychology, philosophy, economics, and anthropology. And what it calls us to is to what's highest, not in individual consciousness, but inside of the collective consciousness. Like Real-religion, it calls us beyond ourselves to the transpersonal. Quasi-religion, in its best expressions inside of some political and social ideologies (Marxism, Green Peace, NGOs, Social Justice ideologies), like Real-religion, calls us beyond ourselves, but, unlike Real-religion, it doesn't ultimately bring transcendent air into our lives. It still only touches what is highest inside of us and our own will-power and positive thinking remain the real driving force behind any transformation either in the world or inside of ourselves.

Real-religion might use or not use the classical words of religion, but, in either case, what it opens up for us is not just what's highest inside of ourselves and what we can achieve through will-power and positive thinking. Rather it opens us to a power and grace beyond us. It doesn't simply recycle the air inside of our universe; it brings in air from beyond, divine, transcendent air.

The resurrection has a place for positive thinking and emphasises the importance of appropriate will-power. But it's much more than that. Ultimately, it is about the transcendent power of God breaking into nature and into our lives and doing for us what we can't do simply through will-power and positive thinking. It is a power that can re-arrange the very atoms inside of our physical bodies, our aching emotions, and our divided world and raise up new life from the ashes. what's already best inside us.

Notes to the Finance Report for the Year Ended 30 June 2019

1 Father Colin and Father Thomas together with the Parish Pastoral Council and the Parish Finance Committee thank parishioners for your wonderful support in the continuing work of the Parish and your contributions to the collections. Our results for 2018/19 show a surplus both in operating activities and after servicing our loan and expenditure on capital projects. This expenditure was planned for in 2016/17 and 2017/18 after the surplus achieved in 2015/16.

2 The accounts do not include the First Collection and external collections e.g. CWF, Catholic Mission. These collections are remitted direct to the relevant body. The accounts only include monies received for the second collections, either from planned giving, envelopes or cash on the weekly plate. **Total second collections have decreased 3% from the prior year.**

3 In 2018/19 the Parish spent \$42,843 (for which the funds were raised by a special parish appeal—see note 4) on essential repairs and maintenance, including driveway repairs (which represented a danger to the public) and rectification of ground water and downpipe drainage at the presbytery at Lindfield.

\$3,100 was spent on replacing emergency lighting in the stairwell to make it compliant.

Essential works were also undertaken on asbestos removal.

4 Donations in 2018/19 for specific projects totalled \$44,149. \$42,649 was for the Presbytery Capital Works Appeal and \$1,500 for painting of Lindfield Church foyer.

5 The net income for Sacramental Programmes comes from the contribution charged to participating families. The employment costs of our Sacramental Coordinator and Assistant Coordinator (which are taken from this income) are recorded as part of employment costs. Sacramental Income fluctuates annually depending on the timing of the Sacraments and the number of children making their Sacraments.

6 Net income from functions of \$3,433 is from the Festival of Christmas.

7 The \$19,634 non-specific donations include \$4,850 donated for flowers, \$2,250 donated for printing and the balance of \$12,534 from general donations.

8 The Parish Rooms rental income is received from hiring out Mackillop Hall, St Brigid's Hall and the Basement. The demand for hiring these premises continued at the same level as requested in 2017/2018 resulting in rental income from Parish facilities remaining at the same level as in 2017/18.

There were \$6,169 of rental expenses incurred for repairs and maintenance, operating costs and utilities for MacKillop Hall—these expenses are included in 'Repairs and Maintenance' (see Note 10).

9 Other income of \$10,000 includes income received from advertisements in our newsletter (\$6,058), and the balance from candle, CCD and piety stall sales.

10 Repairs and maintenance costs of \$66,000 include \$6,169 of rental expenses related to Mackillop Hall, St Brigid's Hall and the Parish meeting room. In addition to the \$19,710 spent on repairs and maintenance at both Churches, the \$66,000 includes \$6,169 on gardening/grounds maintenance and \$18,504 on cleaning across both locations.

11 Administration costs have decreased \$21k due to a re-allocation of costs incurred for the Office Manager (\$11k to Employment costs) and a conscious reduction in printing and photocopier costs for the Parish.

12 Employment costs have increased 20% from 2017/18 to 2018/19 due to the re-allocation of the Office Manager's hours from administration to employment costs, her increased hours and CPI increase in all salaries.

13 In 2017/18 an extra \$2,000 was spent on Youth Ministries.


