"I say to you, love your enemies and pray for those who persecute you, that you may be children of your heavenly Father." (Mt 5:44-45a)

#### LOVE OF ENEMY AS THE TEST OF ORTHODOXY

In a (2001) issue of America magazine, John Donahue makes this comment: "Virtually no Christian group has adopted Jesus' teaching on love of enemy as the critical test of orthodoxy. Yet Jesus issues four ringing commands: love we haven't abandoned Jesus on this! your enemies; do good to those who hate you; bless those who curse you; pray for those who mistreat you."

That remark deserves to be highlighted, especially at a time when Christian circles are so painfully polarized and so many individuals and groups, from both the left and the right, are trying to impose on others their own view of what constitutes a true Christian.

Liberal circles, despite their protests, are generally no less and resurrection. What is revealed in Jesus' death and dogmatic. For them, the critical test of what defines who's resurrection? The rest are seen as caught up in a distracting piety. How they apply this as the litmus-test for Christian orthodoxy might look different from what the conservatives do, since liberals aren't much into accusing others of heresy, but in terms of attitude, there is little to choose between the left and the right. Both are highly selective and exclusive as to whom they define as actually living the gospel. There is more commonality between liberals and conservatives than first meets the eye.

Sadly, what is too common to both circles is anger, accusation, a giving back in kind, and a not-so-subtle hatred of those who hold a different view. What one sees too little of (both in terms of actual practice as well as in

terms of any kind of theoretical enshrinement of it as the guiding principle for Christian orthodoxy) is love of enemy, forgiveness, and compassion. One might also mention that very little humour emanates from either circle. What conservatives and liberals share today is certain grandiosity which makes them both believe that their causes are so cosmic and serious that all humour and playfulness are ex officio excluded. Thank God, both still drink wine; at least

All of this can be said without in any way denigrating the critical importance of the issues that liberals and conservatives put so much energy into defending. The right is right in defending the importance of proper dogma and private morality, just as the left is correct in singling out justice as a central piece in Jesus' message. These things aren't politically correct-they are correct. Jesus, as we For example, within conservative circles there is the know, makes both private morality and social justice non-

That is also the message that comes through in Jesus' death can come back from the grave (even physically), and God's patience and love are infinite and outlast all else.

All of that, the vindication of ancient hope, is revealed in Jesus' dying and rising. But the resurrection also has a startling new message. Because God can be absolutely trusted to love and redeem us, we need to love and forgive our enemies. We may not give back in kind, but must love those who hate us, bless those who curse us, and do good to those who do bad to us.

To love one's enemy is the acid-test of who's a Christian and who isn't. Everything else is an old tape, simply replaying itself over and over.

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### More Food for the Soul ... Fr Richard Rohr ofm's meditation:

#### KNOWING FROM THE BOTTOM

The vast majority of people throughout history have been poor, disabled, or oppressed in some way (i.e., "on the bottom") and would have read history in terms of a need for change, but most of history has been written and interpreted from the side of the winners. The unique exception is the revelation called the Bible, which is an alternative history from the side of the often enslaved, dominated, and oppressed people of Israel, culminating in the scapegoat figure of Jesus himself. We see in the Gospels that it's the lame, the poor, the blind, the prostitutes, the tax collectors, the sinners, the outsiders, and the foreigners who tend to follow Jesus. It is those on the inside and the top—the Roman occupiers, the chief priests and their conspirators—who crucify him. Shouldn't that tell us something really important about perspective? Every viewpoint is a view from a point. We must be able to critique our own perspective if we are to see a fuller truth.

Liberation theology—which focuses on freeing people from religious, political, social, and economic oppression—is mostly ignored by Western Christianity. Perhaps that's not surprising when we consider who interpreted the Scriptures for the last seventeen hundred years. The empowered clergy class enforced their own perspective instead of that of the marginalized, who first received the message with such excitement and hope. Once Christianity became the established religion of the Roman Empire (after 313), we largely stopped reading the Bible from the side of

the poor and the oppressed. We read it from the side of the political establishment and the usually comfortable priesthood instead of from the side of people hungry for justice and truth. Shifting our priorities to make room for the powerless instead of accommodating the powerful is the only way to detach religion from its common marriage to power, money, and self-importance.

When Scripture is read through the eyes of vulnerability what we call the "preferential option for the poor" or the "bias from the bottom"—it will always be liberating and transformative. Scripture will not be used to oppress or impress. The question is no longer, "How can I maintain the status quo?" (which just happens to benefit me), but "How can we all grow and change together?" Now we would have no top to protect, and the so-called "bottom" becomes the place of education, real change, and transformation for all.

The bottom, or what Jesus called "the poor in Spirit" in the Sermon on the Mount (Matthew 5:3), is where we have no privilege to prove or protect but much to seek and become. Jesus called such people "blessed." Dorothy Day (1897–1980) said much the same: "The only way to live in any true security is to live so close to the bottom that when you fall you do not have far to drop, you do not have much to lose." From that place, where few would expect or choose to be, we can be used as instruments of transformation and liberation for the rest of the world.

#### A FURTHER UPDATE ON THE IMPACT OF THE RECENT STORM ON THE PARISH

Following on from last weekend's report:

#### Lindfield:

- The saturated carpets in the sacristy were vacuum dried and then had industrial blowers drying them for a full week. There is still a strong odour of mildew and so at this stage it is unlikely that the carpets can be saved.
- Our electrician has repaired the electric light and fan switches in the sacristy which were flooded.
- We have now found that the leak in the sacristy roof has flowed onto the top of the cupboards in which Mass requisites are stored, ruining the cupboard ceiling and creating mould. The tops of the cupboards will have to be re-built and the sacristy ceiling will need to be replaced.
- The end wall of St Brigid's Hall and some other areas of the Shirley Wallace Parish Centre have suffered water damage and will need scraping back and re-painting. Water staining on the proscenium arch at the front of the sanctuary will also require painting.
- The source of the water getting into both St Brigid's Hall and onto the sanctuary has been identified as entering the great southern wall of the church, and our builder's advice is that the cause could be either entry into the wall cavity either via the very high windows, or via decaying lead flashing dating from the construction of the church (the church is now only 7 years off being 100 years old!). Our builder's advice is to first address the option of sealing the gaps where the windows provide access to the wall cavity. If water continues to enter in major storms we face the very expensive task of addressing the century-old flashing embedded in the brick wall further up above the windows.

The builder has also identified that in many places the mortar between the bricks on the great southern wall (again, nearly a century old) is decaying and has fallen out—another possible entry point for water.

Addressing all these issues is well beyond our financial ability. We will start with the sealing of the windows along with a good dose of prayer.

• The fallen tree branch on Pacific Hwy frontage has been removed by the arborist

#### Killara:

• We are grateful that Council removed the large tree on our property which was completely uprooted, blocking the footpath and one lane of Fiddens Wharf Rd.

#### Presbytery:

- Several very large branches fallen from trees have now been removed by the arborist.
- No permanent damage affected the laundry which experienced flooding.

Repairs to carpet, painting, sacristy ceiling replacement, cupboard damage and trees will be covered by our insurance. However parish policies in our diocese have a \$5000 excess so we still have that amount to pay. Additionally the work of addressing the cause of the worst area of water entry (the southern wall of the church) and repairs to ensure water does not flood the sacristy ceiling in future are of course <u>not</u> covered by insurance. *Fr Colin*
