John's Gospel often uses the terms 'Spirit' and 'the world' as opposites, as enemies. But we have to be careful lest we equate John's use of 'the world' as simply meaning 'the world around us.'

John's community lived in a time of persecution and the word 'world' for him has a special meaning – the world which is blind to and opposes the Holy Spirit.

But the key thing is that it doesn't simply mean the world as such – as though everything outside of the Church is bad.



Because the simple fact of the matter is that many good people and many good things exist outside the Church – sometimes, sadly, better people and better movements than within the Church.

If we simply oppose 'the Church' and 'the world' then we become blind, blind to what goodness lies beyond our own walls – and above all blind to the challenges that the world offers us. To presume we own and hold a monopoly on the Holy Spirit is a gross spiritual arrogance and our challenge is to recognise the work, the promptings and the challenge of the Spirit wherever they may occur. Great News – the (partial) return of public Mass



As of Friday 15th May the NSW Government has permitted the resumption of public liturgical celebrations with a maximum of ten people. Subject to the public complying with remaining health restrictions and the infection rate not climbing, this number will be increased with time. Following Bishop Anthony's permission for public Mass to resume within these restrictions the following arrangements will begin in our parish commencing this Monday 18th May:

- our way of sharing in the Eucharistic celebration will be twofold: for Sundays we will continue to provide Mass online with a small choir; on weekdays we will provide either one or two Masses each day at which ten people can be in attendance on each occasion. These will be simple weekday Masses.
- It will thus be necessary to register to attend Mass so that a maximum of ten people are in attendance on each occasion. The NSW Government requires us to maintain a register of who is in attendance at each Mass—which would assist in tracking should someone later be found to be unwell.. To book in for Mass please go the special hotlink box on the homepage of our parish website. Please read all the instructions before booking.
- In this way hopefully everyone in the parish will be able to attend the celebration of Mass and share in Holy Communion once every several weeks. And of course everyone can take part in the online Sunday Mass.
- Keeping in mind the restriction that four square metres at a minimum should be kept for each person, we will mark the pews which are able to be used for Mass to ensure maximum separation of those participating. Sadly if there was a failure to comply with this arrangement Mass would not proceed as our first concern is of course for the health and safety of all. Hand sanitiser will be provided at the doors for use upon entry and departure.
- Our churches will now return to being open each day for personal prayer, though they will be locked when Mass is being celebrated as we must comply with the rule of a maximum of ten people.
- There will of course be no physical sharing of the Sign of Peace at Mass and we will have arrangements to ensure the safe reception of Holy Communion. In our parish Holy Communion will not be given on the tongue—this is a conscientious decision by Fr Thomas and myself for the sake of our own health and the health of the community.
- As you know our parish finances have been greatly affected by us not having our weekly collections and so the facility to contribute to both First and Second Collection will be available at all these Masses - for health reasons we will not pass around the baskets but boxes for the First and Second Collections will be available at the doors. And at Lindfield church the Tap and Go machines will also be available.
- At this stage our weekly Mass roster will be: Mondays 10am and 7pm at Killara; Tuesdays: 10am at Killara; Wednesdays: 10am and 12 noon at Lindfield; Thursdays - 10am usually at Killara, 12 noon at Lindfield; though at Lindfield this Thursday; 7:00pm usually at Lindfield, though at Killara this Thursday; Fridays ~ 10am 7pm at Killara; Saturdays: 10am and 12 noon at Killara. at Lindfield;
- Baptisms may now be celebrated with a maximum of 10 people and only one family at a time. The Sacrament of Reconciliation will be available for ten minutes after each of the Mass celebrations listed above.

It's wonderful that we can at least from to time now come together as smaller parts of our community to celebrate the Eucharist together. Fr Thomas and I look forward to being with you at these precious gatherings.

MEASURING OURSELVES IN LOVE

When I was younger, I was pretty confident that I knew what love meant.

After all, we all experience love in some way: being in love, loving someone, being loved by someone. Virtually everyone has known the love of somebody, a friend, a family member, an acquaintance.

But the older I get the more I wonder sometimes whether I, or most anyone else, has much sense of what that over-used word, love, really means? When we are honest, we sense our own distance from its full meaning. Why?

Because, the older we get, the more we also begin to know love's dark side. Too common are these experiences: we fall in all its dimensions, but the real test of love and think it will last forever, but then fall out of love, feel love go sour, feel love grow cold, see love betrayed, feel ourselves wounded by love, and wound others. Finally, even more upsetting, we all find that there are always people in our lives who are cold, bitter, and unforgiving towards us so that it is not always easy to feel love and be loving.

In the light of this reticence, I would like comment on Jesus' most important commandment: "Love one another as I have loved you!"

command contains the most important cold, hostile, and murderous toward us. challenge of the whole gospel and, like That's the hard, non-negotiable truth the deepest part of the gospel to which it underlying Jesus' command to love, and is linked, the crucifixion, it is very, very difficult to imitate. Why?

It's easy to consider ourselves as loving if measuring up to that. we only look at one side of things, namely, how we relate to those people who are loving, warm, respectful, and gracious towards us. If we rate ourselves in life, someone "shatters our illusion of on how we feel about ourselves in our love" because far too often, blind to its best moments among like-minded friends, own true intentions, our love is we can easily conclude both that we are manipulative and self-serving. Too often, loving persons and that we are measuring the song points out, we are lousy lovers up to Jesus' command to love as he did.

But if we begin to look at the skeletons in What shatters our illusion of love is the relational closets, our naïve confidence soon disappears: What about the people who hate us, whom we don't have to measure up: if we can love them, like? What about the people whom we we're real lovers, if we can't, we're still avoid and who avoid us? What about under a self-serving illusion. those people towards whom we feel resentment? What about all those people with whom we are at odds, towards whom we feel suspicion, coldness, anger? What about those people whom we haven't been able to forgive?

It's one thing to love someone who adores you, it's quite another to love someone who wants you dead!

But that's the real test. Jesus' command to

love contains a critical subordinate clause, "as I have loved you!" What was unique in the way he loved us?

Where Jesus stretches us beyond our natural instincts and beyond all selfdelusion is in his command to love our enemies, to be warm to those who are cold to us, to be kind to those who are cruel to us, to do good to those who hate us, to forgive those who hurt us, to forgive those who won't forgive us, and to ultimately love and forgive those who are trying to kill us.

That command—love and forgive your enemies—more than any creedal formula or other moral issue, is the litmus-test for Christian discipleship. We can ardently believe in and defend every item in the creed and fight passionately for justice in whether or not we are followers of Jesus is the capacity or non-capacity to forgive an enemy, to remain warm and loving towards someone who is not warm and loving to us.

We shouldn't delude ourselves on this. It is easy to rationalise this away and, if we do, no doubt there will be more than enough false friends around who will furnish us with both theological and psychological arguments that will justify us in not loving our enemies.
