# An end and a beginning ...



Today with the celebration of Pentecost the Easter Season draws to a close. This great Easter feast of Pentecost stands as the second greatest day in our Church year after Easter Sunday itself, outranking by far even Christmas itself.

Pentecost is often looked at as just a feast day standing by itself. But it's not. It is an Easter day, intimately bound up with Easter itself. Pentecost celebrates that what happens at Easter belongs also to us – that the Spirit poured out by the Father on Jesus, raising him to life, is poured out on us.

And the Spirit is the Spirit of unity. As the Spirit is the bond of love uniting Father and Son in the Trinity, so the Spirit unites us, brings us into one body. For that reason Pentecost is often called 'the birthday of the Church' for the Church is born, the Christian community is born, in the great outpouring of the Holy Spirit. For that reason too the week leading up to Pentecost is observed as 'The Week of Prayer for Christian Unity'. This is a day which invites us to participate in the great unifying



work of the Holy Spirit 'who builds the body of Christ'. A Pentecost people is an ecumenical people. Fr Colin



# A letter from Fr Colin Masses with 50 ?

Well, I'm sure you all know by now that on Thursday evening the NSW Government announced that effective Monday (ie three days later) the number who can attend a church Service would increase to 50.

I have to say that I found that announcement extremely frustrating. In a public health emergency forward planning is a crucial element. That announcement brings with it a moral pressure and an expectation as to its immediate implementation. But life is not so simple, as I'm sure you understand. We have to work out how we allocate the 50 seating spaces so as to maintain the 1.5m separation between participants and install appropriate seating signage; we have to set up and maintain a revised booking system to ensure that the maximum number is not exceeded; and most importantly we have to ensure the appropriate sanitisation of our two churches after every celebration. We have already been doing that since Masses with ten people became possible, but there is a world of difference between sanitising ten pews and fifty pews, and between doing that once a day and perhaps four or more times a day. And there is also the question of how we afford that level of sanitisation given the decline in our parish income.

Well, there, I've had my rant ! Which I think is entirely justified! I hope you all know that we have been working hard to sustain and nourish the life of our parish and so we of course welcome this new possibility for our life as a parish community. We just need some time however to ensure we implement it in the best and the safest way. To that end our parish won't be implementing this till the week after this coming one so that we can think this through properly and be well-prepared.

During this coming week therefore we will maintain our new 'Masses with ten people' and next Sunday there will just be the online Mass as usual. However by next week's bulletin we can then announce our new Mass arrangements commencing Monday 8th June. It is likely that we will offer a range of possibilities in the course of each week so that we can provide opportunities for those with need to take greater care of their health to be able to attend (eg we may continue to have some days on which we still have Mass limited to ten people for the sake of those in such a health situation).

Fr Thomas and I look forward to seeing you and celebrating the Eucharist with you in even greater numbers. Just give us a week to get ready and make sure it's safe for everybody. Fr Colin

# Come to Mass!



On page 1 you'll find information about the forthcoming increase in numbers able to attend Mass to 50. However, as you'll read there, this won't be taking effect in our parish until the week beginning Monday 8th June.

We hope that you will take the opportunity now already available to come to the actual physical

celebration of the Eucharist in each of our churches, to gather with (a small part of) our community and to share in the precious gift of Holy Communion in groups of 10. We are making these available from Mon-Sat.

So that we may comply with the restriction of a maximum of ten people it is necessary to make a booking to attend Mass. To do this please go the special hotlink box on the homepage of our parish website. Please be sure to read all the instructions before booking.

This week our Masses will be: **Mon**: 10am at Killara; **Tues** - 10am at Killara; 12 noon at Lindfield; **Wed**: 10am and 12:30pm at Lindfield; **Thur**: 10am at Killara and 7:00pm at Lindfield; Fri: 10am at Lindfield; 7pm at Killara; Sat: 10am & 12 noon at Killara.

Keeping in mind the restriction that four square metres at a minimum should be kept for each person, we will mark the pews which are able to be used for Mass to ensure maximum separation of those participating. Hand sanitiser will be provided at the doors for use upon entry and departure.

There will of course be no physical sharing of the Sign of Peace at Mass and in our parish Holy Communion will not be given on the tongue-this is a conscientious decision by Fr Thomas and myself for the sake of our own health and the health of the community.

There will also be boxes available in the church for contributions to the First and Second Collection & at Lindfield the Tap & Go machines will also be available.

It's wonderful that we can at least from to time now come together as smaller parts of our community to celebrate the Eucharist together. Fr Thomas and I look forward to being with you at these precious gatherings.

#### GETTING TO KNOW THE WONDERFUL JULIAN OF NORWICH

.....PART 3

#### GOD IS OUR TRUE MOTHER

In Chp 54 of Julian's Showings, we find what I consider the best description I have read of the union of the soul inside of the Trinity. Julian writes, "[God] makes no distinction in love between the blessed soul of Christ & the least soul that will be saved." [1] God can only see Christ in us, it seems, because we are the extended Body of Christ in space & time. Christ is what God sees & cannot not love & draw us back into the Divine Dance of Love. Julian continues:

And I saw no difference between God and our substance, but, as it were, all God; and still my understanding accepted that our substance is in God, that is to say that God is God, and our substance is a creature in God. For the almighty truth of the Trinity is our Father, for he made us and keeps us in him. And the deep wisdom of the Trinity is our Mother, in whom we are enclosed. And the high goodness of the Trinity is our Lord, and in him we are enclosed and he in us. [emphasis mine —RR). [2]

Describing God as both mother and father was quite daring in Julian's time. She called Jesus our "true Mother" from whom we receive our beginning, our true being, protection, [1] Julian of Norwich, The Fourteenth Revelation, ch. 54 (Long Text), Julian of and love. Even in terms of gender, mystics tend to be expansive. In chapter 59 she reflects:

*Our high Father almighty God, who is Being, he knew us* and loved us from before-any-time. Of which knowing, in his full marvelous deep Charity, by the foreseeing endless counsel of all the blessed Trinity, he willed that

the second Person should become our Mother, our Brother, and our Saviour.

Whereof it follows that as truly as God is our Father, so truly is God our Mother. Our Father wills, our Mother works, our good Lord the Holy Ghost confirms. And therefore it belongs to us to love our God, in whom we have our being . . . for in these three is all our life. . . .

And therein is a forth-spreading, by the same grace, of a length and breadth, of a height and a deepness without end [see Ephesians 3:18–19]. And all is one love. [3]

After spending years contemplating her visions, Julian finishes her text with this confident description of God's meaning:

So I was taught that love is our Lord's meaning. And I saw very certainly in this and in everything that before God made us [God] loved us, which love was never abated and never will be. And in this love . . . [God] made all things profitable to us, and in this love our life is everlasting. . . . In this love we have our beginning, and all this shall we see in God without end. [4]

Well after so much hard work by members of our parish the Development Approval for our Killara Development was granted the week before last ~ so it's full steam ahead. Thanks are especially due to McGregor Grant, who chaired the original Killara Development Committee, and to the other members of that committee, with special thanks to Kylie O'Connor for her tireless work on this project and to our Parish Facilities' Coordinator, Anthony Cassidy, for all that he has done to steer this project to this stage.

Group Homes Australia will shortly begin the works to construct the two dwellings. We should see work underway in the next couple of months. There is no income coming to the parish until the dwellings are occupied—perhaps a year away—but after that our parish finances will receive a much needed and very substantial boost from the rent received and of course the land itself—and ultimately the houses themselves at the end of the lease term—remain the property of the parish.

#### THE LANGUAGE OF THE SPIRIT

Lorenzo Rosebaugh, a Missionary Oblate of Mary Immaculate (OMI), was shot to death as he was driving with a number of his fellow missionaries to a community meeting in Guatemala.

The real motive behind his killing may never be known. On the surface, it appeared to be nothing more than a violent robbery, but given the circumstances of Lorenzo's life and his life-long fight on behalf of justice for the poor, everyone, myself no exception, wants to believe that his being shot was more than a question of being at the wrong place at the wrong time. Too many things suggest that this was more than an accident. If nothing else, his death by gunshot is somehow symbolic: Lorenzo wasn't meant to die of old age in a comfortable bed.

I first met Lorenzo at our mother-house at Aix-en-Provence in France years ago. It is too easy for us to simply write this off as a miracle, an exceptional foundational intervention by God which helped found the church. That may also be true, but there is another point to this: language functions at different levels.

At its most obvious level, language depends upon the spoken word and that word is always in a particular language, e.g., French, English, Spanish, Chinese. At this level words have a relative power, but they can also deceive and lie. Words don't always accurately mirror the heart. Moreover, they invariably fail us just when we need them most, especially in depth situations where tragedy, death, and betrayal render us mute.

But we have other languages besides these. Beyond the spoken word there is body language. Our bodies speak louder and more honestly than do our words. Through our bodies, through its gestures and the nuances of its countenance, we speak more deeply and more truly than we do with our words.
