With last Sunday's celebration of Pentecost we brought the Easter Season to a close. On Monday we moved back into the Ordinary Time of the Church year.

However, the first two Sundays of this Ordinary Time are always celebrated as great feasts – today, Trinity Sunday, and next week, the Solemnity of the Body and Blood of Christ (Corpus Christi).

Trinity Sunday celebrates the God we experience in the Easter mystery: the **Father** who reaches out in love to the world in the incarnation, death and resurrection of the **Son**, who by the power of the **Holy Spirit** draws us with him to share in the life of the Father.

Ordinary Time reminds us that we discover God and that we minister God's love to others in the ordinary: in the simple things, where we live, where we work, just by who we are and how we relate.

Ordinary Time calls us to be a people filled with the life of the Trinity and who bring that life to others.

#### HOW APPROPRIATE!



Next weekend, as Sunday Mass returns to our parish, is the Solemnity of the Body and Blood of Christ (Corpus Christi), celebrating the great gift of the Eucharist which flows out of ~ and makes present ~ the Easter mystery we have just celebrated.

### THE RETURN OF SUNDAY MASS !!....



Following the latest easing of restrictions we will begin offering Mass both on weekdays <u>AND ON SUNDAYS</u> (HURRAHI) with the increased number of participants, starting this Monday 8th June. So **next weekend** we can return to having Sunday Mass together (albeit in smaller gatherings). **PLEASE BE THEREI** We've missed you!

### The government is re-starting the economy—we have to re-start the Church!

Just a few points to clarify:

- The government directive requires that there must be four square metres of space in the building per person (and of course that there is a minimum 1.5 metre separation between people). With these two requirements factored in our Killara church can accommodate the maximum of 50 people, and our Lindfield church can accommodate 46 people. We are providing a little more than the 1.5 metre separation for your safety.
- We hope that you will now be able to re-join us for the celebration of Mass on the Lord's Day! To make this possible, Fr Thomas and I will celebrate ten Masses each weekend (5 at Killara and 5 at Lindfield) which enables us to provide the opportunity for nearly 500 people every weekend.
- While we are very much one parish we hope you understand that for the time being Fr Thomas and I are in general confining ourselves to a separate church each—which saves the effort and the cost of cleaning and sanitising sacristies and sanctuaries after each celebration. For simplicity we are working out of the church nearest to where we reside—thus, Fr Thomas at our Killara church and myself at our Lindfield church. But this is just a practical and temporary measure—we're both here to serve the whole parish.
- It will still be necessary to make a simple **online booking** for Mass to ensure that we don't exceed the maximum number permissible. It will not be possible to just 'turn up' ~ we live in very different times! If you're not proficient at online bookings (although it is a very simple system) just give Philita a call in the Parish Office and she will do it for you.
- I won't set out the full Mass timetable here as that will be evident when you go online to book. In summary however we will have:

   three Vigil Masses, from 4pm onwards
  - five Sunday morning Masses
  - ~ two Sunday evening YOUTH Masses

We're one parish so please feel free to move between our two churches and book a place at a Mass that suits you and/or has places vacant.

- We will also continue to have our parish online Mass for the sake of those who, perhaps for health reasons, cannot yet attend Mass physically.
- The government health restrictions do not permit us to have congregational singing at present (when we sing we aspirate more droplets). However our music ministry teams will be recording hymns which will be played at our Masses so that our celebrations are enhanced with music. But the most important thing is that we can gather as a faith community and celebrate and share in the Eucharist.
- We hope that you understand that with the very busy weekend schedule of Masses (in addition to those listed above there is also the online Mass each weekend and the Chinese Community Mass twice per month—on the second and fourth Sundays) we will be reducing the number of weekday Masses to just one per day (with one exception as outlined below). Mass (at which up to 45 people can be in attendance) will be at 10am Monday to Friday (at Killara on Mondays and Tuesdays; at Lindfield from Wednesday to Friday). There will be no Saturday morning Mass.
- Finally, for the sake of those who may not feel they are able to come to Mass with a larger number of people, either by reason of age or underlying health condition, we will continue to provide one Mass per week with a maximum of 10 people in attendance. This will be celebrated at 12 noon on Tuesdays at Killara—however please do not book for this Mass unless you are over 70 or have an underlying health condition which puts you at greater risk).



OUR MONTHLY HEALING MASS be celebrated this Friday 12th June at the 10am Mass at Lindfield. Although we can't celebrate the Sacrament of the Sick we will have prayers and a blessing for the sick and for those who seek God's healing **Charist** strength as part of the Mass. Sadly we are not able to have morning tea after Mass at this stage.

### A few more points about our new Masses with 50 people....

The pews will be marked with cards with a green tick on them. You must sit ON THE CARD, not just anywhere in the pew. We've spaced them very carefully.

> Immediate family members can of course sit together. Everyone else must sit separately on one of the cards.

The churches will be sanitised after each and every Mass wherever people have been sitting, handrails, doorknobs etc. We can't afford to have this professionally done after ten Sunday Masses (!) so we can only continue with all the Masses if we have sufficient volunteers on a roster to do this sanitising after each Mass. Please contact Alison in the Parish Office asap if you can help. We also need volunteers to act as warden at the doors.

> We likewise cannot afford to have the toilets cleaned after every Mass and so the toilets will only be available on a restricted basis: they will be closed for weekday Masses and will be open on Sundays only for the 8:30am Mass at Lindfield and the 9:00am Mass at Killara.

For the health reasons the churches need to be well ventilated and so a number of the windows will be open for Mass—wear warm clothes!

> The Collections! Our parish finances have been sorely affected and we hope that you can resume your parish contributions. However for health reasons the collection bowls will not be passed around—instead there will be separate boxes for contributions to the First and Second Collections which will be situated in the centre of each of our churches. The Tap and Go machines are also in Lindfield church.

It's great that we can gather again for the Eucharist and we hope that you understand that things however are still far from normal and so there are measures like these in place to ensure the health and safety of all.

In addition there will be a 12 noon Mass at Killara church on Tuesdays. This Mass however will be limited to ten people and is reserved for those over 70 or with an underlying health condition.

On both weekdays and weekends the churches will be opened twenty minutes before the coming celebration of Mass and closed again afterwards until twenty minutes before the next celebration. They will also be closed during the celebration of each Mass (exiting the church is of course possible at any time).



### KILLARA DEVELOPMENT APPROVAL GRANTED

Well after so much hard work by members of our parish the Development Approval for our Killara Development was granted the week before last - so it's full steam ahead. Thanks are especially due to McGregor Grant, who chaired the original Killara Development Committee, and to the other members of that committee, with special thanks to Kylie O'Connor for her tireless work on this project and to our Parish Facilities' Coordinator, Anthony Cassidy, for all that he has done to steer this project to this stage.

Group Homes Australia will shortly begin the works to construct the two dwellings. We should see work underway in the next couple of months. There is no income coming to the parish until the dwellings are occupied—perhaps a year away—but after that our parish finances will receive a much needed and very substantial boost from the rent received—and of course the land itself—and ultimately the houses themselves at the end of the lease term—remain the property of the parish.

### THE WONDERFUL JULIAN OF NORWICH PART 4

### THERE IS NO ANGER IN GOD

Author and Episcopal priest Mary Earle explores the difficult questions that beset individuals during Julian's time as well as our own. She writes,

In a social and cultural context [the fourteenth century was] so saturated with suffering and death, it is no wonder that many believers interpreted these [plagues] as clear signs of God's anger with humanity. (Certainly, we still see vestiges of this way of interpreting events) . . . The underlying theology draws on a medieval doctrine known as substitutionary atonement . . . [which] held (as it still does today) that because of our many sins, we owe God a debt we can never repay—our burden of debt is so vast and we are finite. That is why Jesus, by dying on the cross, offers himself . . . as a sacrifice in order to satisfy the Father's wrath. It is easy to see how this theology in its crudest form evolved into a belief in an angry and vengeful God, visiting humanity with punishing events.

Thus in Julian's day popular devotional art often depicted horrific scenes of the Last Judgment, scenes in which souls were being cast into hell, tortured endlessly by devils. Laymen and [lay]women of the fourteenth century would have constantly been wrestling with the "Why?" of suffering and the wrath of God. . . When someone receives a terminal diagnosis, or a sudden death occurs, or a natural disaster

devastates a region, the first question that occurs is usually, "Why me?"... The context out of which Julian writes, although in some ways so remote from our own, is one full of universal questions and themes....

One of Julian's most radical insights, with which I fully concur, is that there can be no wrath in God. Mary Earle continues,

Julian's radical insistence that we know there is "no anger in God" directs us all to look at ways in which we project our own bitterness, anger, and vengeance upon God. In a resolutely maternal way, she encourages us to grow up, to cast aside our immature and punitive images of God, and to be honest with ourselves about our own actions that have their roots in spiritual blindness...


Julian tells us, again and again, in a variety of ways, that God is our friend, our mother and our father, as close to us as the clothing we wear. She employs homely imagery and language, the vocabulary of domesticity, to tell us her experience. At the same time, she demonstrates a degree of sophisticated theological language. Julian is firm and steady on these points: God is One.

Everything is in God. God is in everything.

God transcends and encloses all that is made.

The only point I would add to that list from my own study of Julian is that she really believes that God is Love.

### THE RICHNESS OF THE MYSTERY OF GOD

GK Chesterton once said that one of the reasons he believed in Christianity was because of its belief in the trinity. If Christianity had been made up by human person, it would not have at its very centre a concept that is impossible to grasp or explain: the idea that God exists as one but in three persons.

How do we understand the trinity? We don't! God, by definition, is ineffable, beyond conceptualisation, beyond imagination, beyond language. Christian belief that God is a trinity helps underscore how rich the mystery of God is and how our experience of God is always richer than our concepts and language about God.

This is already evident in the history of religion. From the beginning, humans have always had an experience of God & have worshipped God. However, from the very beginning too, humans have also had the sense that God is too rich & toobeyond any one set of categories to be captured in any human conception.

Hence most ancient peoples were simplistic conception of monotheism. polytheistic. They believed in many gods and goddesses. They experienced divine energy and the need to celebrate divine energy in many different areas of their lives and had gods and goddesses to accommodate that. Thus they had gods and goddesses for every longing and every circumstance, from war, through growing crops, through sex, through understanding why your father wouldn't bless you, there was a god or goddess to whom you could turn.

Sometimes they believed in one supreme god who ultimately ruled over lesser gods & goddesses, but they sensed that divine energy was too rich a reality to be contained in a single being. They believed too that sometimes the gods were at war with each other. As well, their gods & goddesses often times messed around within human lives, making special deals with humans, having affairs, sometimes even having children with them.

Many of the most powerful myths ever told arose out of the experience of God's overwhelming richness and the ancient peoples' incapacity to conceptualise God and God's activity in any singular way. gods and goddesses, ancient religious mythology that these produced speak of at all simplistic conceptions of God. how rich, untamed, and beyond simplistic Thank God, for the complexity of the imagination and language is the human doctrine of the Trinity! experience of God. The ancients believed Fr Ron Rolheiser omi (The Centre for that their experience pointed to the Liturgy, University of St Louis) existence of many deities.

And then a massive shift took place: Judaism, soon followed by Christianity and Islam, introduced the strong, clear, doctrinaire idea that there is only one God. Now all divine power and energy was seen as coming from a single source, monotheism, Yhwh, the Father of Jesus, Allah. There were no other gods or goddesses.

But from the time of Jesus' resurrection onwards, Christians began to struggle with simple monotheism. They believed that there is still only one God, but their experience of God demanded that they believe that this God was somehow "three." Stated simply, when Jesus rose from the dead Christians immediately began to attribute divinity to him, yet without identifying him as God the Father. Jesus was understood to be God, but somehow different from the Father. Moreover, inside of their experience, they sensed still a third divine energy which they couldn't fully identify with either Jesus or God the Father, the Holy Spirit.

This experience left them in a curious and sometimes perplexed state: They were monotheists, God alone was God. Yet, Jesus too was God, as was the Holy Spirit. Their experience of grace and God's action in the world was at odds with their

God was one and yet God was somehow three. How to fit this together? It took Christianity three hundred years to finally arrive at a formula that somehow honored the richness of the Christian experience of God. The Council of Nicea in 325 gave us the creedal formula we profess today: there is one God in three persons; except they wrote that formula in Greek and the words there state literally that God is one substance in three subsistent relations.

That formula isn't meant to give us perfect clarity. No formula can ever capture the reality of God because God is too rich to ever be captured, even half adequately, in imagination, thought, and word. The God that atheism rejects is precisely a conceptualised God, a God captured in a picture. In the end, atheism is less faithful to human experience than was polytheism which more rightly sensed deity, gods and goddesses, hidden under every rock.

To what does this call us? To humility.

All of us, believers and atheists, need to be more humble in our language about God. Whatever else might be said about The idea of God needs to stretch, not polytheism and ancient myths about the shrink, the human imagination. Our actual experience of God, just as for practices and the incredible canon of ancient polytheism, is forever eating away



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
