Today's Second Reading carries the encouraging message that when it comes to our prayer life it doesn't all depend on what \underline{we} do – that the heart of what happens in prayer is in God's hands. 'The Spirit comes to help us in our weakness.'

This is in fact the message of the great saints and mystics in our tradition. So often we feel that prayer is all about what \mathbf{we} do – and since we so often are unfocussed, distracted or inattentive when we try to pray then the conclusion we draw is that our prayer is deficient and mediocre. If we sit down and try to give fifteen minutes to prayer and at the end realised that our mind must have wandered for thirteen of those minutes then we do a quick mental calculation and decide that we only really prayed for two minutes.

Wrong! Is the message of the great teachers of prayer. We prayed for <u>fifteen</u> minutes, because from our side of things the heart of prayer is that we <u>tried</u>, that we <u>wanted</u> to pray, that we <u>desired</u> to pray. And the real heart of the prayer is that once we tried, once we sat down to pray, it was <u>God</u> who prayed in us. The true heart of prayer is what God does in us, despite the wandering mind and fidgety legs. If we at least want to and try to pray God does the rest – slowing working in us to change us and help us grow.

It's an encouraging message and it urges us to keep praying – even when we don't **seem** to achieve anything – because the true test is not what **we** do, but what **God** does, in us.

A LITTLE NOTE ABOUT THE CHANGES TO RESTRICTIONS WHICH WERE INTRODUCED ON 1ST JULY

As you're no doubt aware, from 1st July the NSW Government increased the numbers who can attend church and funerals. However the caveat is that the requirement that there must be four square metres of space per person must still be observed.

Unfortunately this means there will be no increase to the permissible numbers for our two churches as the 4m² requirement means that our Killara church will still be limited to 50 people and our Lindfield church will still be limited to 45 people—both for Masses in general and for funerals.

ANNOUNCING A CHANGE WITH REGARD TO OUR SACRAMENTAL PROGRAMMES AND CELEBRATIONS OF THE SACRAMENTS WITH THE CHILDREN

Bishop Anthony Randazzo, after consultation with the Council of Priests, has announced a change with regard to the celebration of the Sacraments of Initiation. Bishop Anthony remains deeply committed to our diocesan tradition of celebrating the sacraments in their proper order - Baptism, then Confirmation, then First Holy Communion - but feels that the children would be better placed to celebrate the sacraments if they were just a year older than at present. This affects the ages therefore at which the children will celebrate Confirmation, First Reconciliation and First Communion. From next year the children will celebrate these sacraments when they are in Years 3 and 4: they will celebrate Confirmation in Year 3 and First Holy Communion in Year 4 (with First Reconciliation coming somewhere between those two celebrations, as at present).

This of course does not affect our current group of children who have recently completed their preparation for First Holy Communion and who will, as planned, celebrate that wonderful sacrament in September this year.

Thus there will be no celebration of First Holy Communion next year as the next group coming through will firstly celebrate their Confirmation in 2021 (in Year 3) and their First Communion will follow in 2022 (when they are in Year 4).

Hopefully this change will enrich the children's experience of these precious sacraments in their lives. *Fr Colin*

BEING BORN FROM ABOVE

In a wonderful series of commentaries on Scripture, John dramatic, religious gesture, no matter how deep our Shea presents a powerful story on what it means to be born sincerity. There is more involved than falling at the feet of again, to be born from above, as Jesus says. A man he some evangelist or of answering an altar call, albeit these knows, tells how he was born twice of the same woman.

This man's story:

One day he was driving his aged mother to a funeral. She had been already at many funerals, having had to bury her own husband, a brother, and most of her friends. She also by the minute. As they drove along, she talked about her giving up on fear. Everybody dies. Nothing is left."

Her son protested, telling her that giving up on fear isn't easy to do, even as he realized at that very instant how much his whole life was bound up precisely by fear—fear exactly what she had just said.

They never had that conversation again, but from that moment on he noticed his mother began to change. She was no longer afraid to speak her mind on anything, and she spoke it calmly, wisely, without pomp, with great patience, and with an ever-growing compassion. She became stronger and more gentle, both at the same time.

People were attracted to her and drew strength from her. Her son was one of those people, and he began to visit her more frequently, now not out of obligation but because he needed the nourishment she was giving him. It was like a new umbilical cord had been forged between them. Slowly, just as she had once given birth to his body, she now gave birth to his spirit. He felt himself begin to change, to have less fear. This second gestation took more than nine months, but a new life was slowly born in him. He was able to "give up on fear" and move into life with a freedom that, as Jesus says, comes only from above. (John Shea, Gospel-Light, "Crossroads," 1998, pp. 94~95)

To be born again, to be reborn from above, is not something that we can do, at least not fully, in one instant or in one

can be an important beginning.

To be born again, from above, involves a gestation process, namely, being hooked up to a new umbilical cord, one that begins to nurture us in such a way that our old support systems (the meaning and security we draw from our found herself without much money, in failing health, and on the edges of a serious depression—not exactly one of the "Golden Girls" on the top of her game, spinning off laughs attractiveness) are no longer what ultimately gives us life. Life in the spirit is not a precarious thing that can slip away from us like the things of this world. Like its author, it is immune from threat. We can give up on fear.

> This doesn't happen all at once, although there can be some dramatic, break-through moments along the way. Being born again is about seeds growing silently when nobody is watching, about unseen yeast leavening a batch of dough, and about an umbilical cord inside a dark womb supplying nutrients for an unknowing child to grow and be born. Gestation takes time. Growth works slowly. Life, whether in the body or in the spirit, has the same dynamics.



and so we are called to imitate what we celebrate:

And it finds its foundation in the Eucharist in which the sacrifice, the self-giving, of Jesus is made present amongst us, challenging us to become what we celebrate.



FR RICHARD ROHR OFM'S REFLECTION...

SIMPLICITY: GOD'S SIMPLE PLEASURE

The land is God's. . . . Caring for the land, every day, is my way to be close to God. [God's] land must be honoured. —Eli, an Amish farmer

Poet, author, and farmer Wendell humility and simple living. He's made it his life's concern to commit to one beloved plot of land he's learned has been through his faithfulness to that commitment. Assisi in that he loves nature deeply and takes the Gospel seriously. Berry writes of the profound pleasure that can come from simple things—if we can attune ourselves to them:

It is astonishing, and of course discouraging, to see economics now elevated to the position of all the affairs of our daily life, and sovereign principle and ideal of It is impossible economics. . . . not to notice how little the proponents of the ideal of competition have to say about honesty, which is the fundamental economic virtue, and how very little they have to say about community, compassion, and mutual help. . . . For human beings, affection is the ultimate motive, because the force that powers us, as [John] Ruskin [1819 -1900] also said, is not "steam, Ruskin was an artist, teacher, author, social magnetism, or gravitation," but "a Soul."...[1]

Is it possible to look beyond this all -consuming "rush" of winning

and losing to the possibility of countrysides, a nation countrysides, in which use is not synonymous with defeat? It is. But in order to do so we must consider our pleasures. . . . [There are] pleasures that are free or without a permanent cost. . . . These are the pleasures that we take in our own lives, our own wakefulness in Berry is a shining example of this world, and in the company of people and other other creatures—pleasures innate in the Creation and in our own good in Kentucky. He says everything work. It is in these pleasures that we possess the likeness to God that is spoken of in Genesis. [God He reminds me of St. Francis of looked upon all that God had created and saw that it was very good (Genesis 1:31).] . . .

The passage suggests . . . that our truest and profoundest religious experience may be the simple, unasking pleasure in the existence of other creatures that is possible to humans. It suggests that God's pleasure in all things must be ultimate justifier and explainer of respected by us in our use of things. . . . It suggests too that we competition enshrined as the have an obligation to preserve God's pleasure in all things. . . .

> Where is our comfort but in the free, uninvolved, finally mysterious beauty and grace of this world that we did not make, that has no price? Where is our sanity but there? Where is our pleasure but in working and resting kindly in the presence of this world?
