A FEW THINGS ABOUT OUR COVID~SAFE PRACTICES

- It is no longer mandatory to wear a face mask in church—though it is recommended if you are able to do that comfortably. However, in our parish it is mandatory to wear a mask when coming forward to receive Holy Communion.
- ♦ When coming forward to receive Holy Communion please <u>keep your face mask on</u> while the minister places the Host on your hands. Then step well to the side, lower your mask and receive Communion, and then replace your mask.
- When we have a Eucharistic Minister assisting the celebrant in giving Holy Communion at Lindfield (where there is just one central aisle) please come down the aisle <u>single-file</u> and 1.5m apart and then move to one or other minister when you reach the front.

The Parish Book Club meets on the fourth Wednesday of each month at 10am. On Wednesday 24th March we will meet for




the first time in over 12 months face to face in the Parish Library in the Shirley Wallace Parish Centre above the Lindfield church.

Reeping the time of Lent ...



Margret, 39, is a teacher at a vocational school for deaf students in the Solomon Islands. She was born deaf, so she knows the challenges it poses to education and employment.

The school faced water shortages for about half the year. Staff and students would walk for up to half an hour to collect water for drinking, cooking, washing and growing vegetables. Then in April 2020, amidst the threat of COVID-19, Tropical Cyclone Harold struck, damaging school buildings and its vegetable garden.

With Caritas Australia's support,
Margret's school installed eight large
water tanks and provided cycloneproof materials to repair the damage.
It also helped the school to implement
COVID-19 prevention measures,
providing fabric for students to make
face masks.

Margret's school now has enough safe water to supply the school's population of 150 and has the capacity to cater for more students. It plans to boost food security, by increasing its agricultural production. This will improve nutrition and boost the school's income, while building resilience to future disasters.

Margret hopes that the school can aspire to "Be More".

"I am proud that our school community works together with Caritas Australia as our partner in ensuring that we live in a healthier environment," Margret says.


ENTERING INTO THE SEASON OF LENT . . .

THE ANATOMY OF SACRIFICE

"Take your son Isaac, your only one, whom you love, and go to the land of Moriah. There you shall offer him up as a holocaust.' (Gn 22:2).

What do we mean when we say that we make a sacrifice? I more properly ours because, by trying to give it back, we have sacrificed my career for my children! I sacrifice a lot healthily recognised that it was a gift, unmerited, for my job! Love demands that we make many sacrifices! undeserved. Sometimes we must sacrifice life itself for the sake of That is the exact set of dynamics within the story of integrity! Christ sacrificed himself for our sins! The Eucharist is a sacrifice!

From what is common in all these expressions we can to sacrifice him parallels the instinctual gesture: "I don't extract Webster's definition of a sacrifice: the surrender of deserve this! I cannot accept this!" He offers the gift back to something of value for the sake of something else.

sacrifice in the Jewish and Christian scriptures. Take, for example, the famous story where Abraham is asked to sacrifice his son, Isaac. What is ultimately behind God's linvitation to Abraham to sacrifice Isaac on an altar?

Here are the outer elements of the story: Abraham has longed for a son for many years. Finally, after the situation was humanly hopeless, Sarah conceives and they are given a son, Isaac, who is the described as Abraham's "only one," his "precious one." But then God invites Abraham to take We see this as the dynamic underlying the ritual of ancient for the sacrifice.

When they arrive at the place of sacrifice, Abraham gathers the wood, lights the fire, binds Isaac, and then raises the knife to kill him. But God intervenes, stops the sacrifice, and gives Abraham a ram instead to offer. The story ends with guilt because, by trying to give it back to its author, they Abraham walking back to his own land together with Isaac. made themselves more aware that it was gift. They can now What is the deep lesson inside this story?

At one level, the lesson is that God does not want human sacrifice, but there is a deeper, more intimate, inner lesson that teaches us something about the innate need inside of us to offer sacrifice. Simply put, the lesson is this: In order for something to be received as a gift it must be received twice. What is implied here?

A gift, by definition, is something that is not deserved but given freely. What is our first impulse when we are given a gift? Our instinctual response is: "I can't take this! I don't understood that. deserve this!" In essence, that gesture, that healthy instinctual response, is an attempt to give the gift back to its Fr Ron Rolheiser omi, giver. But, of course, the giver refuses to take the gift back and re-gives it to us with the assurance: "but I want you to have this!" When we receive it the second time, it is now

Abraham offering to sacrifice Isaac. Isaac comes to him as the greatest, most-undeserved, gift of his life. His willingness its giver. But the giver, Love itself, stops the gesture and That is a good definition, but it contains more than first gives the gift the second time. Now Abraham can receive meets the eye, as is evident when we look at the concept of Isaac, without guilt, as gift. When they are walking back home, Isaac is now Abraham's son in a way that he never was before. Abraham had to receive the gift twice by sacrificing it the first time.

> That is the essence of sacrifice: to properly receive anything, including life itself, requires that we recognise it precisely as gift, as something undeserved. And to do that requires sacrifice, a willingness to give some or the entire gift back to

Isaac and offer him in sacrifice. Abraham, with a heavy sacrifice. For example: A farmer would harvest a crop. But, heart, agrees to the request and sets off with Isaac, carrying before he or his family would eat even mouthful of it, he wood, fire, and a knife, all the while having to answer his would take some of it (the "first-fruits") and offer it back to son's curiosity about why they were not bringing a victim God in the form of a sacrifice, usually by burning it so that that the smoke rising up to the heavens would take some of the crop back to God whom the farmer saw as the real giver of that crop. Like Abraham, it tries to give the gift back to the giver, but the giver stops the sacrifice and gives it back in even a deeper

FR RICHARD ROHR OFM'S MEDITATION: LEAN NOT ON YOUR OWN UNDERSTANDING

If you understand it, it is not God. —S Augustine, Sermon 117 on John 1:1

God is Mystery and not any "thing" we can wrap our little brains around. Brian McLaren shares how he realiSed this during a time of deep doubt and perplexity in his life:

A verse I had memorized in my childhood came to mind: "Trust in the Lord with all your heart, and do not 1 e a n on your own understanding" [Proverbs 3:5]. For the first time, it dawned on me: there's a difference between doubting God and doubting my understanding of God, just as there's a difference between trusting God and trusting my understanding of God. Would I be able to doubt my understanding of God while simultaneously trusting God beyond my understanding? In a strange way, that question for the first time in my life allowed me to see God as a mystery distinct from my concepts of God. [1]

It's wonderful to be blessed with such a clarifying insight! Yet, it sometimes takes a longer and more painful "dark night of the soul" to free us from our inadequate concepts of God. Author and Episcopal priest Barbara Brown

If you understand it, it is not God.—St. Taylor, another good friend, explains:

John of the Crossl says that the dark night is God's best gift to you, intended for your liberation. It is about freeing you from your ideas about God, your fears about God, your attachment to all the benefits you have been promised for believing in God, your devotion to the spiritual practices that are supposed to make you feel closer to God, your dedication to doing and believing all the right things about God, your positive and negative evaluations of yourself as a believer in God, your tactics for manipulating God, and your sure cures for doubting God.

All of these are substitutes for God, John says. They all get in God's way....

Yet it would be a mistake to attach the promise of more spiritual benefits to a night that is designed to obliterate them. Those who have come through dark nights of their own, not just once but over and over again, often cannot find the words to say why they would not trade those nights for anything. Yes, they were nights of great loss. Yes, the soul suffered from fearful subtraction. Yes, a great emptiness opened up where I had stored all my spiritual treasures, and yet. And yet what? And yet what remained when everything else was gone was more real than anything I could have imagined. I was no longer apart from what I sought; I was part of it, or in it. I'm sorry I can't say it any better than that. There was no place else I wanted to be. [2] (italics in original)

Richard again: This description of the "dark night" as a gift can be misleading because such times of unknowing are almost always endured more than enjoyed. However, the experience of mystery, paradox, and not-knowing brings to our lives a rich and unexpected grounding.

Recipe corner

French Tuna Tart

Line a tart/quiche dish 25x6 or 28x4cm) with pastry of your choice.

For the filling:

Olive oil

1 onion chopped

1 garlic clove crushed

1 tin whole peeled tomato

5ml dried oregano

100ml grated cheddar

3 eggs

250ml milk or half/half with cream

Pinch of salt

Black olives pitted

Sauté onion and garlic in the olive oil until golden and soft. Add the tomato and oregano and cook until most of the moisture has evaporated. Add the tuna and let it cool to room temperature.

Sprinkle half of the cheese on the prepare pastry. Cover with the tomato mixture and sprinkle the remaining cheese over. Whisk together the milk, eggs and salt. Pour over the tart and arrange about 10 olives on top. Bake at 180 degrees for about 30min or until crust is golden and filling is set. Serve warm with salad
