FIFTH SUNDAY IN LENT

21 – 3 – 21

This week: Jer 31:31-34; Heb 5:7-9; Jn 12:20-33
Next week: Is 50:4-7; Phil 2:6-11; Mk 14:1-15:47

'Wherever I am my servant will be there too.'

Is that true? Are we to be found where Jesus is?

From the Gospels it's clear that Jesus hangs around
the poor,
the outcast,
the socially unacceptable person,
and above all, around the ones everyone else calls sinners.

Today's question is: do we?

Jesus' band of followers included extortionists, political extremists and prostitutes: the sort of people that many of his followers today tend to despise and judge.

'Wherever I am, my servant will be there too.' Not long after saying that Jesus' arms were stretched wide on the Cross. His love wasn't abstract – it was very concrete. This Sunday of Lent asks us whether love is just a four-letter word for us or whether it takes on very real flesh and blood in our life: whether it's true that *'wherever I am, my servant will be there too.'*

Following today's celebration of the Fifth Sunday in Lent the Season of Lent begins to take a new course:

while the focus so far has been on the Lenten call to conversion of heart the final fortnight of Lent becomes more explicitly a time of preparation for Easter.

From this Monday morning the Preface of the Eucharistic Prayer becomes the Preface of the Passion, and the Gospel readings begin to sound a drumbeat, as the tension leading to the Passion begins to build.

The invitation of this final fortnight – 'Passiontide' – is to enter even more deeply into the spirit of Lent, to stir up a longing for the celebration of Easter and the life it celebrates, to become more aware of the Cross so that its transformation into resurrection may be all the more powerful in our own life.

A FEW THINGS ABOUT OUR COVID-SAFE PRACTICES

- ◆ It is no longer mandatory to wear a face mask in church—though it is recommended if you are able to do that comfortably. However, in our parish it is **mandatory to wear a mask when coming forward to receive Holy Communion.**
- ◆ When coming forward to receive Holy Communion please keep your face mask on while the minister places the Host on your hands. Then step well to the side, lower your mask & receive Communion, & then replace your mask.
- ◆ When we have a Eucharistic Minister assisting the celebrant in giving Holy Communion at Lindfield (where there is just one central aisle) please come down the aisle single-file and 1.5m apart and then move to one or other minister when you reach the front.



HOLY SATURDAY


MORNING PRAYER: 10AM in both of our churches

Since it is the principal celebration of the entire Church year we will again have a single celebration of the Easter Vigil for the whole parish. This will be celebrated in MacKillop Hall at Lindfield and we hope that everyone from both the Killara and the Lindfield communities in the parish can come:

This year we will once again have a single celebration of Mass on Holy Thursday so that on the very night that Jesus gathered with his disciples for the Last Supper we too can gather as one parish around one altar. Our celebration on this night (7:30pm) will be in our church at Killara.

Halima's story ...



Halima is raising two children under seven in a refugee camp in Bangladesh, while caring for her mother who has a disability.

Widowed at just 21, Halima fled violence in Myanmar's Rakhine State in 2017, arriving at the camp with nothing. Caritas Australia, through its partner, Caritas Bangladesh, helped Halima out with a shelter and cooking equipment so that she could feed her family. She participated in hygiene and sanitation training and took on the role of community trainer herself, organising the cleaning of washrooms, wells and toilets.

Halima's training became all the more invaluable as the COVID-19 pandemic struck, when safe hygiene and preventative measures suddenly became lifesaving. Halima is proud that she is able to earn a small income, while maintaining the health of her family and the cleanliness of the camp community. Her children are adapting to life in the camp and are now at school. Halima aspired to "Be More" for her family and for the community around her.

"My hope is that our children will be able to do a job, to live with pleasure, they will find their happiness – that will bring wellbeing for them," Halima says.

FR RICHARD ROHR OFM'S MEDITATION:

THE GOD OF WELCOME

The Rev. Stephanie Spellers is a leader in the Episcopal Church, working with Bishop Michael Curry to spread a message of God's inclusive and expansive love. She tracks how we move from a love of self, and those like us, to a generative love for all:

Looking closely at the witness of Scripture, we see a God who not only seeks relationship and union with the creation but who reaches out intentionally for everyone, and in particular for the outcast. Regardless of how unclean, unworthy, insignificant, or marginalized we may feel or others may claim we are, the God of grace and welcome shatters every barrier to embrace us and draw us home.

Lest we think the welcome is meant for us or our group alone, the Scriptures are filled with reminders to God's chosen ones that they are not the only ones God welcomes. In Deuteronomy, Moses speaks to the Israelites as they journey from slavery in Egypt and through the wilderness. The frightened, tired and confused clan no doubt sought comfort in the knowledge that their covenant with God made them special. They soon learned that there is no rest for God's chosen ones. Instead, God's people are called out for a special mission.

The Lord your God is God of gods and Lord of lords, the great God, the mighty and awesome, who is not partial and takes no bribe, who executes justice for the orphan and the

widow, and who loves the strangers, providing them with food and clothing. You shall also love the stranger, for you were strangers in the land of Egypt. (Deut. 10:17-19)

It is true that God stands with God's people through every trial, but not so that they will sit comfortably with the privilege of apparent divine favor. Now they have to stand in solidarity with, graciously receive and welcome the vulnerable ones within their community and beyond it whom they might find it most difficult to accept: the orphan, the widow, the stranger, The Other. God has done it for them. Now they are called to respond in kind, literally imitating the God who graciously welcomed them. . . .

Is not this the fast I choose: to loose the bonds of injustice, to undo the thongs of the yoke, to let the oppressed go free and to break every yoke? Is it not to share your bread with the hungry, and bring the homeless poor into your house; when you see them naked, to cover them, and not to hide yourself from your own kin? (Isaiah 58:6-7)

God has made it clear: if you love me you will work for liberation with the oppressed and marginalised in your midst, and you will share your home and food with those who have none. You will not hide from the brothers and sisters I have placed near you. Rather, you will actively go out to meet them and draw them to yourself, even if it is risky, even if you feel uncomfortable.

THE POWER OF HELPLESSNESS

I am troubled now. Yet what should I say? "Father, save me from this hour"? (Jn 12:27)

In her book, *Dead Man Walking*, Helen Prejean describes her feelings as she watches her first execution. Everything inside her is sick & confused. She knows that the taking of this man's life, whatever his crime, is wrong & yet she can appreciate the feelings of those who are about to take that life. She understands the complex web of history & emotion that has led up to this moment & to the belief that we somehow serve justice through capital punishment.

She doesn't agree with the conclusion of course, but she knows that her protest of this is not the same as protesting Hitler; she can't just throw her body in front of the executioner in an attempt to save this man, as you might do if you see a child attacked on the street. Thus, part of her frustration is not just that she is powerless to stop this killing, it also has to do with being helpless to even protest it effectively. So she is reduced to silence, to interior dissent, to prayer, to helplessness. In essence, what she does as she watches this execution is "to ponder" in the biblical sense.

As we know, in the mindset out of which the gospels were written—the Hebrew conception of things—"pondering" meant something quite different than what it did to the Greek philosophers (Socrates, Aristotle, and Plato) and St Augustine, whose conception of things helped constellate what we call common sense in the Western world. The gospel writers conceived of things very differently and so when they describe Mary as "pondering" they are not depicting her as cerebrally entertaining the kind of abstract, reflective thoughts that Socrates asked for when he said that "the unexamined life is not worth living." What they are describing rather is that painful wrenching of heart, of soul, that you feel when you stand helpless in the face of suffering, sickness, death, misguided sincerity, or anything else that is so overwhelming as to let you know that you are no longer in control. To ponder is to stand begging for God's insight and strength when things overwhelm you.

Thus, pondering is what Helen Prejean did as she watched that execution, it's what Mary did when she stood under the cross & watched Jesus die, it's what Jesus did in the Garden of Gethsemane when he sweated blood, it's what we do whenever we stand helplessly by the bedside of a loved one who is dying of cancer or AIDS, it is what we do when

we are unable to offer words of consolation to someone who has suffered the loss of a loved one, it's what we do when we see one of our own children misuse their freedom in destructive ways, it's what we should do at those times when we're inadequate to the task of love & forgiveness.

Pondering, in the biblical sense, isn't so much active as passive (in the sense of the Latin, *passio*). When we speak of "the passion of Jesus Christ" we're not talking so much about anything that Jesus actively did, but rather about what was done to him, what he endured, what he submitted to, & what he carried in silence during his last hours on earth.

But what is the value of such "passivity"? How does silent suffering change anything, suffering that does not actively intervene and alter a situation? Why do we value so much Jesus' passion when it was precisely the time in his life and ministry—and a very short time it was in fact—when he was not preaching, teaching, feeding, healing, and actively helping others? How can one help anyone by standing helplessly by as injustice unfolds?

What is the value of such things: sweating blood in a garden? Silent tears? Prayers that aren't publicly manifest? Interior dissent that is powerless to change the actual situation on the outside?

Jesus answered this with another question: "Wasn't it necessary?" Doesn't defeat sometimes mean victory? Aren't silent suffering, interior protest, & helpless empathy sometimes the real weapons for change? Isn't the sweating of blood the key to sustaining all of our commitments? Isn't carrying of tension the key to love & family life? Isn't it only when we admit our helplessness that God finally enters?

"Why is this necessary"? The answer to that questions lies at the heart of all wisdom, all Christian revelation, all depth, all maturity. But it is an answer that we will not find in books, nor in Socratic reflection. We will find it precisely when we "ponder" in the biblical sense, namely, when we stand helpless, muted, and frustrated, but listening to a pain, an illness, or an injustice that so overwhelms us that we are unable to rely on any power except that of God.

What is taught to us there holds the key to everything.
