Food for the soul

Measuring Ourselves in Love

This is my commandment: love one another as I love you. (Jn 15:12)

When I was younger, I was pretty confident that I knew But that's the real test. Jesus' command to love contains a way, being in love, loving someone, being loved by was unique in the way he loved us? someone. Virtually everyone has known the love of Where Jesus stretches us beyond our natural instincts and somebody, a friend, a family member, an acquaintance.

But the older I get the more I wonder sometimes whether I, or most anyone else, has much sense of what that over-used to those who are cruel to us, to do good to those who hate word, love, really means? When we are honest, we sense us, to forgive those who hurt us, to forgive those who won't our own distance from its full meaning. Why?

Because, the older we get, the more we also begin to know trying to kill us. love's dark side. Too common are these experiences: We fall That command, love and forgive your enemies, more than in love and think it will last forever, but then fall out of any creedal formula or other moral issue, is the litmus-test love, feel love go sour, feel love grow cold, see love for Christian discipleship. We can ardently believe in and betrayed, feel ourselves wounded by love, and wound defend every item in the creed and fight passionately for others. Finally, even more upsetting, we all find that there justice in all its dimensions, but the real test of whether or are always people in our lives who are cold, bitter, and not we are followers of Jesus is the capacity or non-capacity unforgiving towards us so that it is not always easy to feel to forgive an enemy, to remain warm and loving towards love for them and be loving.

In the light of this reticence, I would like to comment on We shouldn't delude ourselves on this. It is easy to Jesus' most important commandment: "Love one another as rationalise this away and, if we do, no doubt there will be I have loved you!"

We too easily read that simplistically, romantically, and in a contains the most important challenge of the whole gospel and, like the deepest part of the gospel to which it is linked, the crucifixion, it is very, very difficult to imitate. Why?

It's easy to consider ourselves as loving if we only look at one side of things, namely, how we relate to those people who are loving, warm, respectful, and gracious towards us. If we rate ourselves on how we feel about ourselves in our best moments among like-minded friends, we can easily conclude both that we are loving persons and that we are measuring up to Jesus' command to love as he did.

But, if we begin to look at the skeletons in our relational closets our naïve confidence soon disappears: what about the people who hate us, whom we don't like? What about the people whom we avoid and who avoid us? What about those people towards whom we feel resentment? What whom we feel suspicion, coldness, anger? What about those people whom we haven't been able to forgive?

But this command justify us in not loving our enemies. But the gospel is uncompromising: We are loving or non-loving not on the basis of how we respond to those who love us, but on the basis of how we respond to those who hate us, and are cold, hostile, and murderous toward us. That's the hard, nonnegotiable truth underlying Jesus' command to love and, when we are honest, we have to admit that we are still a long ways from measuring up to that.

> There's a sobering challenge in an old Stevie Nicks song, "Gold-dust Woman": she suggests that it's good that, at a point in life, someone "shatters our illusion of love," because far too often, blind to its own true intentions, our love is manipulative and self-serving. Too often, the song points out, we are lousy lovers who unconsciously pick our

What shatters our illusion of love is the presence in our about all those people with whom we are at odds, towards lives of people who hate us. They're the test. It's there where we have to measure up. If we can love them, we're real lovers; if we can't, we're still under a self-serving illusion.

UPDATE ON COLES DEVELOPMENT

Our Parish and Parish School had a meeting last week with the team involved in the Coles re-development and we can give you an update on what's on the timetable.

The redevelopment involves several stages:

- Stage 1: The relocation of Ausgrid cables so that the green transformer boxes in Balfour Lane can be re-located onto the Balfour St footpath. This will commence shortly and will take about 16 weeks to complete.
- Stage 2: The re-location of Balfour Lane to the western boundary of the current outdoor carpark (the existing lane will not close until the new lane is ready to open so we have continuous access to our site). This will commence once the above-mentioned cables have been re-located. During this period the southern end of the existing outdoor Coles carpark will remain in use (the northern end will be used for construction equipment)
- Stage 3: Once the lane re-location is complete the main part of the project will begin. supermarket will close and be demolished. The site of the present Coles plus all of the outdoor carpark will be a construction zone for: a. two levels of underground parking; above which will be the new expanded Coles supermarket; above which will be a level of residential parking; above which will be apartments. This main part of the project will commence around February next year and will take around two years to complete.

There'll be some pain getting to the end of this process but ultimately we will benefit from access to twice the amount of parking currently available in the outdoor carpark. Fr Colin



FR RICHARD ROHR OFM'S MEDITATION: HEALING TAKES PLACE HERE

Claude AnShin Thomas suffered for years from the trauma did the dishes, I was watching a squirrel busy doing of war as a Vietnam combat veteran. A retreat with whatever it is that squirrels do, when I had a powerful Buddhist teacher Thich Nhat Hanh set him on the path of experience. A voice inside me, the voice of awareness, said mindfulness and healing. He is now a Zen Buddhist monk. to me, "You can't sleep, so now what?" I began to laugh. It He recounts his story:

of my life since a nighttime attack in Vietnam in 1967. Since that time, I haven't slept for more than two consecutive hours in any one night. . . . My sleeplessness to learn how to live with the reality of who I was. In this became the central symbol of my not-all-rightness, of my deepest fears that I would never be all right. . . .

Part of the reason I had difficulty sleeping was because of my night terrors: the sounds of artillery (that isn't there) firing in the distance, of helicopters on assault, that special look of everything illuminated by artificial light, the sounds of small arms fire, of the wounded screaming for a medic. For me, this is what rises up out of the silence that is special to night. I hated the sun going down. I fought and struggled with my inability to sleep, and the more I fought, the more difficult the nights became. So I turned to alcohol and drugs (legal and illegal) for relief, but my suffering just got worse.

Some years after getting sober, I was standing at the kitchen sink in my cottage in Concord, washing dishes. Above the

was a moment of complete acceptance. I finally understood I suffer from a disturbed sleep pattern that has been a part that I just was how I was. To resist, to fight, to attempt to alter the essential nature of my life, was in fact making matters worse, and now I understood that I simply needed moment I discovered that it was here, in the midst of suffering and confusion, that healing and transformation can take place, if I can stop trying to escape.

But I'm not special, you know. You can do this, too. You can face your own sorrow, your own wounds. You can stop wanting some other life, some other past, some other reality. You can stop fighting against the truth of yourself and, breathing in and breathing out, open to your own experience. You can just feel whatever is there, exploring it, until you also discover the liberation that comes with stopping the struggle and becoming fully present in your own life. This is the real path to peace and freedom. You could do this for yourself; you could do this for your family. Our whole world will benefit.
