

The parable in this week's Gospel is one of Jesus' most powerful: 'the widow's mite':

the rich man contributed much, but it was a tiny fraction of what he had to give;  
 the widow contributed just a little, but it was *everything* she had to give.

It's a parable which says that in our discipleship  
 we don't need to compare ourselves to others:  
**we just have to compare ourselves to ourselves!**

*How much of myself do I bring to my discipleship? Do I bring what's left over, what's spare? Is the Church a supermarket I shop at, or the mystery with which I entwine my life? Is it a club whose services I dip into, or a community in God to which I commit my life?*

The rich man gave an enormous amount from what he had left over to spare.  
 It was an empty gift. The widow gave from her heart.  
 Which disciple are we? Which member of the Church am I?

# 2 BITS AND PIECES ABOUT OUR RETURN TO MASS ...

## Welcome back !



- ◆ The wonderful news is that our parish Masses have resumed.
- ◆ From Monday our capacity will be increased to one person per two square metres rule. A decision will be made during the week whether to continue with weekend Mass in MacKillop Hall or to return to the church. Check the website for further details. Masses at Killara will of course be in the church.
- ◆ There is no need to book for Mass.
- ◆ The Public Health Order requires:
  - that masks be worn in church
  - that everyone 'signs in' using a QR code  
**if you don't have a smartphone to scan the code DON'T WORRY—our welcomers will have access to a phone which will be able to sign you in. You don't need to obtain your own QR code from Services NSW. Just turn up.**
  - that everyone sanitises their hands upon entry
- ◆ Singing is still not permitted, though we will of course ensure that music is provided at our celebrations as we have done in the past.
- ◆ **Please note that the parish will no longer provide face masks** since this has come at a considerable cost, and also because everyone now carries face masks due to their widespread requirement. Please don't forget to bring your face mask with you to Mass.

### ◆ Funerals

Despite there being no outright maximum number able to attend a funeral, the number is in fact subject to the one person per two square metre rule at present. Hence the number permissible in our Killara church will be 132 and at Lindfield 124.

In this stage of the easing of restrictions (until 1st December) these numbers are predicated on all people attending being fully vaccinated. If an unvaccinated person attends the permissible number drops to 10.

### ◆ The Parish Office

Our Parish Secretary, Philita, has returned to work (Tuesday - Friday) but the office will not be physically open just yet. However Philita will be contactable via both phone and email. Our other staff members will continue to work from home until December.

### ◆ Our online Masses

Our online *weekday* Masses have now come to an end since public weekday Masses have resumed. However our **Sunday online Mass will continue** - as it has since the advent of CoVid - for the sake of those who by reason of age or health are still unable to come to a public gathering. However, we hope that unless you are in that situation you will indeed come to our public celebrations of Mass where we can be together as a community of faith and share in the Eucharist in Holy Communion.

### ◆ Children's Liturgy of the Word

Our *online* Children's Liturgy of the Word has now come to an end since our public Sunday Masses have resumed.

### ◆ Parking

There is now reduced parking on the Coles carpark but at Lindfield there is also the following parking:

- ⇒ in the church grounds as usual
- ⇒ in the school playground (enter just inside our Balfour Lane gate)
- ⇒ in Highfield Rd
- ⇒ Lindfield Uniting Church (cnr Provincial Rd) have kindly made their grounds available to us for parking for the Vigil Mass and the Sunday 6pm Mass (they require their grounds for their own Services on Sunday mornings). Enter from Pacific Hwy.

## A couple of things regarding receiving Holy Communion...

- ◆ During the period when face masks are required to be worn, when coming forward to receive Holy Communion **PLEASE LEAVE YOUR FACE MASK ON**, receive the Host in your hand, then step to the side before lowering your mask and receiving the Host. Please then replace your mask and return to your seat.
- ◆ For conscientious reasons for the sake of our own health and that of our Eucharistic Ministers Fr Thomas and I have decided that, as was our practice since the advent of CoVid, **Holy Communion will NOT be given on the tongue in our parish**. We ask that in these unique days of pandemic that this decision is understood and respected.

### FR RICHARD ROHR OFM'S MEDITATION

#### Being "God's Somebody"

*Everybody is God's somebody.* —Bishop Michael Curry, *Love Is the Way*

*Episcopal Bishop Michael Curry, with whom Fr. Richard has worked on several occasions, shares how knowing we are "God's somebody" allows us to love ourselves and others.*

I've come to see that the call of God, the love that bids us welcome, is always a call to become the true you. . . . Not an imitation of someone else. The true you: someone made in the image of God, deserving of and receiving love.

There is a Jewish proverb, "Before every person there marches an angel proclaiming, 'Behold, the image of God.'" Unselfish, sacrificial living isn't about ignoring or denying or destroying yourself. It's about discovering your true self—the self that looks like God—and living life from that grounding. Many people are familiar with a part of Jesus's summary of the law of Moses: You shall love your neighbor as you love yourself. *Yourself*. Loving the self is a required balance. If we fail in that, we fail our neighbor, too. To love your neighbor is to relate to them as someone made in the image of the God. And it is to relate to *yourself* as someone made in the image of the God. It's God, up, down, and all around, and God is love.

The ability to love yourself is intimately related to your capacity to love others. The challenge is creating a life that allows you to fulfill both needs. I often speak of the loving,

liberating, life-giving God. Sharing godly love liberates the true self, so that we can more fully *live* and discover that place where "your deep gladness and the world's great hunger meet," as Frederick Buechner put it in *Wishful Thinking: A Theological ABC*.

I don't know exactly *why* it works that way, other than to channel my grandma: "We've got a good God and a good Gospel." . . .

All I know is that I have seen the wonderful personal transformations that happen when people start navigating with God's GPS. I've experienced it myself. . . .

My job is to plant seeds of love, and to keep on planting, even—or especially—when bad weather comes. It's folly to think I can know the grand plan, how my small action fits into the larger whole. All I can do is check myself, again and again: Do my actions look like love?

If they are truly loving, then they are part of the grand movement of love in the world, which is the movement of God in the world. . . .

It is impossible to know, in the moment, how a small act of goodness will reverberate through time. The notion is empowering and it is frightening—because it means that we're all capable of changing the world, and responsible for finding those opportunities to protect, feed, grow, and guide love.

## BISHOP ANTHONY RANDAZZO WRITES A LETTER TO US AS THE PEOPLE OF THE DIOCESE OF BROKEN BAY.....

Bishop Anthony has written to us about the 'synodal way' that Pope Francis wishes the Church to follow: a way of communal discernment.



A letter to the People of God in the Diocese of Broken Bay

Thursday 28 October 2021

My dear sisters and brothers,

On Sunday 10 October 2021, Pope Francis celebrated a Mass to commence a worldwide process for the XVI Ordinary General Assembly of the Synod of Bishops in 2023. The Synod has as its theme, "For a Synodal Church: Communion, Participation, and Mission." The Holy Father has invited the entire Church to participate in this journey, keeping before it in a particular way, the question: How does this "journey together" take place today on different levels (from the local level to the universal one), allowing the Church to proclaim the Gospel and what steps is the Spirit inviting us to take, in order to grow as a synodal Church?

The Church in Australia entered this journey through a range of means on Sunday 17 October. This engagement will culminate in each Diocese, submitting the fruit of its reflection at the end of February 2022, such that the Australian synthesis can be sent to the Secretariat of the Synod in April 2022. The Australian website for the Synod of Bishops is <https://www.catholic.org.au/synodalchurch>. There you will find many resources and, also, in time, the link to make an individual contribution to the process.

The Fifth Plenary Council of Australia, with the conduct of the First Assembly from 3-10 October 2021, has been an illustration and demonstration of the synodal processes into which Pope Francis invites us. As you will appreciate, the work of the Plenary Council is ongoing. Through the First Assembly, many members made personal contributions and ten small groups attended to fourteen of the questions presented as the Agenda of the Assembly. Now, through a process of discernment on all that was proffered, clear propositions will be formulated by the Plenary Steering Committee in consultation with many others for consideration at the Second Assembly in July 2022. From these, decisions will be made that fulfil the mandate of the Plenary to be at the service of increasing the faith, the organisation of pastoral action, the regulation of morals, and the observance of common Church practice. I thank the delegates of our Diocese who joined me at the First Assembly: Fr David Ranson VG, Mr Danny Casey, Mrs Alison Newell and Mr Raj Rajasingam. It was a very full week, and given that it was entirely online, quite demanding. However, all of us completed the week with hope that the Spirit of God was guiding us forward, even if the outcomes will take a little further to gain clarity. The work of the Plenary Council and its outcomes has now also been correlated with the intention and timeline of the General Synod of Bishops.

32nd Sunday in Ordinary Time, Year B

**Gospel**  
Mt 12:41-44

In his teaching Jesus said, "Teachers of the written law who like to walk about in long robes, to be greeted respectfully in the synagogues and the places of honour at banquets, these are the men who swallow the property of widows, while making a show of lengthy prayers. The more severe will be the sentence they receive."

## Food for the soul

Beware of the scribes,  
who like *seats of honor in synagogues,*  
and *places of honor at banquets.* (Mk 12:38)

### SEATS OF HONOR

We are besotted by celebrity.

For most of us, the rich and famous take on a god-like status and our own lives seem small, empty, and hardly worth living in comparison to what we imagine theirs to be. Fame, we believe, gives someone a life bigger than our own. We live in just one place, anonymous, domestic, unknown; but someone who is famous, whose face is recognized everywhere and whose name is a household word, it would seem, is everywhere, omnipresent like God. No wonder we view them as gods and give them worship.

But there's more. We also believe that fame gives immortality. Famous people may die, but they live on—Marilyn, Elvis, Diana, we don't even need last names. Something about them stays, more than a gravestone. Fame leaves an indelible mark. Our fear is that our small lives won't leave that. We disappear, the famous remain. So it isn't surprising that we are so besotted with the famous. They appear to us as gods—omnipresent and immortal.

But does fame really make one's life larger? If someone's face appears on billboards and magazine covers everywhere is he or she in some real way everywhere? Does a celebrity's larger-than-life status indeed make their lives larger than ours? Does fame accord some kind of immortality?

At a superficial level, yes. To be a household name and to leave a legacy ingrained inside of peoples' consciousness does, in a manner of speaking, make one omnipresent and does give one a certain kind of immortality.

But being larger-than-life and having immortality are very ambiguous concepts. There's something vaporous and unreal in the kind of omnipresence and immortality that fame brings. You can't eat it. And you aren't present just because your name is. At the end of the day, fame doesn't really enlarge you, nor give you the kind of immortality for which you really long.

There's enough loneliness, paranoia, fearfulness, breakdown, bitterness, drug abuse, and flat-out emptiness in the lives of celebrities to more than vouch for this. It's no accident the three celebrities mentioned above—Marilyn, Elvis, and Diana—died as they did. Celebrity, of itself, doesn't make one larger than life nor accord immortality. Then, what does enlarge our lives and give immortality? Compassion and contemplation.

*Compassion:* All the great religious traditions, from Hinduism to Christianity, teach that what makes our lives small is not place, anonymity, and occupation, but selfishness, self-preoccupation, ego, and narcissism. My life is small and petty precisely when it's centered upon myself. However, when I can, through empathy, break a little the casings of my own selfishness and connect myself to the

feelings and thoughts of others, by that very connection, my life becomes larger.

I know a hermit who has lived by himself for more than 35 years. He lives alone and his existence is known to few people. Yet, paradoxically, his life is really larger-than-life. He's the most connected man I know. When he prays alone at night, by his own description he "feels the very heartbeat of the planet, and feels the joys and sufferings of everyone." That's the very opposite of an experience we so commonly have when, inside the very buzz of social life, we feel nothing but our own obsessive restlessness and the smallness of our lives.

*Contemplation* works in the same paradoxical way: we connect ourselves most deeply to the world and we taste immortality when we are in solitude, in contemplation.

What is it?

Contemplation is not a state of mind where we think of nothing, a blankness beyond distraction. Nor is it necessarily thinking lofty, sublime, or holy thoughts. Contemplation is, as Thomas Merton so aptly defined it, a state within which we are present to what is actually going on in our lives, and to the timeless, eternal dimensions inside of that. We are in solitude and contemplation when we are really aware that we are drinking water when we are drinking water.

Here's how he, Merton, describes a graced moment of contemplation:

[Today] it is enough to be, in an ordinary human mode, with one's hunger and one's sleep, one's cold and warmth, rising and going to bed. Putting on blankets and taking them off, making coffee and then drinking it. Defrosting the refrigerator, reading, meditating, working, praying. I live as my ancestors have lived on this earth, until eventually I die. Amen. There is no need to make an assertion of my life, especially about it as mine, though doubtless it is not somebody else's. I must learn to gradually forget program and artifice.\*

We are so besotted by celebrities because we are always looking outside of ourselves to find what is timeless, what can enlarge us, what can give us immortality. But what we are looking for is already inside of us, something we must awaken ourselves to, namely, our union through compassion with everything that is and our tasting of what's immortal and eternal through being aware of the cold and the warmth inside of our own lives.

那時候, 厄里亞先知往匝爾法特去, 來到城門時, 看見一個寡婦, 在那裡拾木柴。厄里亞呼喚她說: 「請你用器皿, 取點水來, 給我喝!」她正要去取水的時候, 厄里亞又叫住她說: 「請你也順便給我拿點餅來!」

那寡婦說: 「我指著永生上主、你的天主起誓: 我沒有餅, 缸裡只有一把麵, 罐裡還有一點油。你看, 我正要去拾兩根木柴, 回去為我和我的兒子, 做點東西, 吃了等死。」

厄里亞對她說: 「你不用害怕, 儘管照你所說的去做; 只是, 先為我做一個小餅, 拿來給我! 然後, 再為你和你兒子做, 因為上主、以色列的天主這樣說: 直到上主使雨落在這地上的那一天, 缸裡的麵, 決不會用完; 罐裡的油, 也決不會缺少。」

那個寡婦就照厄里亞的話去做了; 她和厄里亞及她的孩子, 吃了許多日子; 缸裡的麵, 果然沒有用完, 罐裡的油, 也沒有減少, 正如上主藉厄里亞所說的。——上主的話。
