TWENTY-FIFTH SUNDAY IN ORDINARY TIME

This week: Is 55:6-9; Phil 1:20-24, 27; Mt 20:1-16 Next week: Ezek 18:25~28; Phil 2:1~11; Mt 21:28~32

This parable today takes us to the heart of the Gospel because the question it asks is: WHY are we disciples? What's our motivation? Why are we here?

The landowner was generous: he didn't cheat anybody, he didn't underpay anybody: he paid those who had worked the whole day exactly what he'd promised to pay them. But it wasn't enough for those labourers that they received that amount: what was also important to them was that the others should receive less.

And so the parable takes us right into our own heart and asks what is our motivation for our discipleship? If we were to find that someone else would get to heaven, enjoy God's love, share in eternal life, without having followed the Gospel, without coming to church week after week, without following all the rules, what would our response be?

Do we follow the Gospel, not because it will bring us a bigger reward than the person who doesn't or do we do it simply because we recognise that it's a good thing to do: that it's a lifegiving way, because we recognise that it has the power to bring us life, and that through the life it brings us we're able to bring others life? Or do we do it for the reward at the end – and more to the point, for a reward that we'd like to believe is bigger than for those who don't. 'I came that they might have life and have it to the full': Jesus' invitation is to embrace and live a

Gospel which brings life, and to turn our backs on any mean-spirited imitation of religion which crushes life and love, either in ourselves or others. Fr Colin



This of course is in no way meant to impinge on each person's right to form their own view on the referendum question, but as a significant leadership body in our community the members of the PPC wish to express their own support for the Voice.

EMBITTERED MORALISING

What if I wish to give this last one the same as you? Or am I not free to do as I wish with my own money? (Mt 20:14b-16a)

In a masterful book on grace, Piet Fransen suggests that we can test how well we understand grace by gauging our is addressing Peter ... and, in effect, through this parable, is reaction to this story:

addressing all good people who are morally and religiously

Imagine a man who during his whole life is entirely careless about God & morality. He's selfish, ignores the commandments, ignores all things religious, & is basically consumed with pursuing his own pleasure—wine, sex, and song. Then, just hours before his death, he repents of his irresponsibility, makes a sincere confession, receives the sacraments of the church, and dies inside that conversion.

What's our spontaneous reaction to that story? Isn't it perfect that he received the grace of conversion before he died? Or, more likely: the lucky beggar! He got away with it! He got to have all that pleasure & still got to heaven!

If we felt the latter emotion, even for a moment, we have never deeply understood the concept of grace. Rather, like the older brother of the prodigal son, we are still seeing life away from God's house as fuller than life inside God's house, are still doing the right things mostly out of bitter duty, and are secretly envying the amoral. But, if this is true, we must be gentle with ourselves. This is an occupational hazard for good, faithful persons.

Jesus, himself, expresses such in the parable of the vineyard workers. The parable was addressed to Peter in answer to a question. Peter, on behalf of the other disciples, had just asked Jesus what reward they were going to receive for their fidelity to him.

Jesus answers by telling him the story of very rich and generous landowner who goes out one morning & hires workers for his vineyard. He hires some early in the morning, promises them a good wage, keeps hiring others as the day progresses, each new group having to work fewer hours than the group before them, & ends the day by hiring a group of workers just before work is to end.

Then he tells his foreman to pay everyone a full day's wage. But this leaves the workers who toiled the whole day somewhat bitter. "This isn't fair!" they protest. "We worked the whole day and bore the heat of the sun and this last group worked just one hour. It's unfair that we all receive the same wage!" The generous landowner, obviously representing God, is gentle in his response: "Friend, didn't you agree to this wage? And isn't a good wage? Are you envious and angry because I'm generous?"

Remember to whom those words are being addressed: Jesus is addressing Peter ... and, in effect, through this parable, is addressing all good people who are morally and religiously bearing the heat of the day. And Jesus is assuring us that we will be rewarded richly for doing this. But, as the parable makes clear, there's a catch: simply put, we will be rewarded with heaven and it will be wonderful; but, and this is the catch, we can have everything and enjoy nothing because we are watching what everyone else is getting!

I sometimes try to highlight this point rather graphically when I give retreats to priests and religious. I have them consider this scenario: imagine you live out your life in fidelity to your vow of celibacy, metaphorically, and otherwise bearing the heat of the day and, when you get to heaven, the first person you meet there is Hugh Hefner, the founder of Playboy. In shock you protest to God: "How did he get in here? It's not fair, given the life he lived and the life that I was asked to live!" And God, the over-generous landowner, gently replies: "Friend, didn't you agree to a life of celibacy, and isn't heaven a wonderful place? Are you envious and angry because I'm generous?" And, how different this reaction is to that of a true saint who, upon meeting someone like this in heaven, would, like the father of the prodigal son, rush over in joy, embrace the person, and say: "I'm overwhelmed with joy that you made it!"

Thomas Halik, a Czech writer, suggests that one of the reasons why so many people in the world reject the churches is that they see us as "embittered moralisers," older brothers of the prodigal son, doing our religious and moral duties, but bitterly, and criticizing those who don't live like us out of hidden envy. Nietzsche made a similar accusation more than a hundred years ago.

Sadly, there's more than a little truth in that accusation. Too often, we're embittered moralisers, secretly envying the amoral, criticising our world out of bitterness. But that's an occupational hazard for the good & the faithful. Peter & the first apostles struggled with it. Why should we be immune? We needn't be immune, but we do need to be honest in

admitting that, despite our real goodness and fidelity, this indicates that we are still far from being full saints.



DENNOCH

In this week's keynote introduction to the Dennoch conference in Hannover – a collaborative undertaking – Dr Thomas Arnold addressed features of western modernity that pose challenges to the Church's proclamation. Challenges are not necessarily obstacles. Though he pointed out that a rhetoric of deficit will not take us far. (I had occasion to reflect on this on my way home last night, when a man approached me on the tram and told me: "Religion is psychiatric illness!") To go around proclaiming that contemporaries, for whom the question of the diving seems irrelevant, are missing out on something is unlikely to engage them. Furthermore, it plays into an attitude of condescension which the Holy Father often condemns. In Lisbon he reminded us: 'the only valid reason I have for looking down on someone is if I am helping him or her up'. Christian evangelisation, today as in antiquity, must testify to a superabundance of life, to a plus ultra. This something is not of human making. It must stem from an encounter with God through the Church that results in a transformed life. Ultimately, the only thing that will truly impact on our self-sufficient world is the testimony of sanctity


