This week: *Ezek 18:25-28; Phil 2:1-11; Mt 21:28-32* Next week: *Isa 5:1-7; Phil 4:6-9; Mt 21:33-43*

The parable in today's Gospel presents us with two responses:

a hearty 'yes', followed up by no response at all; and a hesitant 'no', which in fact was followed by a response.

Jesus is offering the challenge that sometimes those who seem to be saying yes those who claim to be his disciples –

can in fact not be willing to take up the demands of the Gospel (and a very central part of that demand is the call to *want* justice and to be prepared to *work* for it)

And that sometimes those who seem to have said no, those who don't name themselves as disciples,

those whom we might look at askance because they've left, or are outside, the Church,

may in fact be the ones who in fact are living the Gospel's call to justice most faithfully.

Jesus is reminding us that it's about more than simply *calling* ourselves disciples. It's about what we *do.* Fr Colin

AUSTRALIAN CATHOLIC BISHOPS CONFERENCE

TOWARDS THE REFERENDUM A Statement from Australia's Catholic Bishops

In 1842, Australia's first Catholic bishop, John Bede Polding, criticised the treatment of Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander peoples: "The life of an (Aboriginal) human being is valued no more than the life of a kangaroo, and far less ...than that of a bullock". In 1849, he wrote to the people of Sydney in his Lenten message, "The wretched unfortunate Aborigines of the country – the first occupants of the lands over which your flocks and herds now roam – have a very strong claim upon you".

There emerged in time a policy of assimilating Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander peoples into mainstream Australian culture. However well-intentioned it may have seemed, the policy led to the dissolution of Indigenous culture. Within our nation's history, the Church was regrettably part of that policy's implementation.

We are now familiar with the concept of terra nullius (the view that before European settlement the land belonged to no one), the tragedy of the Stolen Generation and the fact that the prior habitation of the Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander peoples was not recognised in the Australian Constitution.

We need to see the truth of what Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander peoples have suffered and the disadvantage many experience to this day. Justice demands that we seek to rectify this disadvantage.

Australians are now being asked to consider a constitutionally enshrined Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander Voice as one way to address this disadvantage. This was asked for in the Uluru Statement from the Heart. The hope of those who prepared the Uluru Statement is that this will not only offer constitutional recognition, but also assist progress towards a more just and equitable Australia, helping to tackle not just the symptoms but the causes of chronic disadvantage.

Pope Francis wrote recently of the Indigenous people of the Amazon, and how best to engage with them on issues particular to them: "They are our principal dialogue partners, those from whom we have the most to learn... Their words, their hopes and their fears should be the most authoritative voice at the table... Otherwise, the result would be, once again, 'a plan drawn up by the few for the few'." The same could be said of the Indigenous peoples of Australia.

In 1986 at Alice Springs, Pope St John Paul II said to the Aboriginal people: "You are part of Australia and Australia is part of you. And the Church herself in Australia will not be fully the Church that Jesus wants her to be until you have made your contribution to her life and until that contribution has been joyfully received."

Pope Francis and Pope John Paul ask us to listen to the Indigenous peoples and to receive joyfully what they have to offer the whole nation and the world.

The Australian Catholic Bishops Conference's statement on the Voice in May urged that the debate be conducted civilly and respectfully; there are some who strongly support the Voice and others who have concerns, including whether the Voice would benefit those most in need or could stifle good governance.

However differently they are viewed, the issues surrounding the Voice are not just political; they are moral and ethical. Therefore all Australians need to educate themselves One way we might do this is by a careful reading of the Uluru Statement from the Heart and this year's Social Justice Statement, Listen, Learn, Love: A New Engagement with Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander Peoples.

We urge all Australians to listen to the hopes and fears of each other. We urge people to act in a way that commits to redressing the disadvantage suffered by the Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander peoples and will allow them to reach their potential, thus promoting reconciliation for the good not just of some but of the whole nation.

May the Holy Spirit who opens locked doors give us light and strength to keep working for a better and more equitable Australia. Let us walk together.

The National Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander Catholic Council (NATSICC) expresses our support for a constitutionally enshrined Indigenous Voice to Parliament. We acknowledge that the Indigenous Voice represents a significant stride towards empowering Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander Peoples in addressing the deepseated inequities prevalent in numerous social, economic and health indicators. By working in tandem with truthtelling, a robust First Nations Voice will serve as the bedrock for the journey towards reconciliation. This journey may encompass treaties, sovereignty, and various opportunities that the First Nations Voice can explore and advocate for.

In 2017, the Council endorsed the Uluru Statement from the Heart, which has a Voice to Parliament as a fundamental tenet. The broader Catholic Church followed that lead by endorsing the Uluru Statement during the historic Fifth Plenary Council of Australia held in 2022.

As people of faith, we firmly believe in the inherent dignity and worth of every individual. A constitutionally enshrined Indigenous Voice supports and promotes this belief by providing a platform for consultation with Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander Peoples on a local level.

NATSICC upholds the principle of subsidiarity, in line with Catholic Social Teaching, as a fundamental framework for developing policies and constitutional reforms that benefit Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander Peoples. In this regard, the Voice serves as a mechanism that can bridge the gap between intentions and implementation, aligning with the principles of social justice and human dignity.

Proverbs 31:8-9 states: "Speak up for those who cannot speak for themselves, for the rights of all who are destitute. Speak up and judge fairly; defend the rights of the poor and needy."

The Indigenous Voice represents a powerful and necessary stride towards rectifying the systemic and historical injustices endured by Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander people. For far too long, our voices have been marginalised and our rights disregarded. Despite our ancestral connection to this land spanning over 60,000 years, our presence is not acknowledged in the Constitution. It is imperative that we are actively involved and consulted in the decision-making processes of this nation, particularly on matters that significantly impact our lives. Our inclusion and representation are essential for genuine progress and the pursuit of justice.

Pope John Paul II stated in his address to Aboriginal people in 1986: "You are part of Australia and Australia is part of you. And the Church herself in Australia will not be fully the Church that Jesus wants her to be until you have made your contribution to her life and until that contribution has been joyfully received by others."

A constitutionally enshrined Indigenous Voice is a way for Indigenous Australians to make their contribution to the life of the nation and to have that contribution joyfully received by others.

By enshrining a Voice, we would be following the call of Pope Francis, who reminds us that respecting Indigenous Peoples and cultures "demands the constant and active involvement of the local people within their own culture". Through the Indigenous Voice, we will be facilitating the constant and active involvement of Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander people in Australian culture.

Within the Catholic Church, that involvement has been ensured through the trust and collaboration evident between ourselves, the National Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander Catholic Council, and the Australian Catholic Bishops Conference. It is a model that could provide lessons for the Indigenous Voice.

Pope Francis, speaking about the Amazon region, explained that when we make resolutions that affect the Traditional Custodians of the lands we inhabit, "we should do this in the first place with the [Indigenous]. They are not just another party to be won over, or merely another individual seated at a table of equals. They are our principal dialogue partners, those from whom we have the most to learn, to whom we need to listen out of a duty of justice, and from whom we must ask permission before presenting our proposals. Their words, their hopes and their fears should be the most authoritative voice at any table of dialogue ... Otherwise, the result would be, once again, 'a plan drawn up by the few for the few'."

Those selected to form the Indigenous Voice must be grounded in their communities and have a strong sense of their community's needs. We encourage the Government to consult with First Australians to ensure that proposals are respectful, inclusive and equitable. It is important that the needs of all Australians are considered. We acknowledge that people of goodwill who care for First Nations Peoples can come to different conclusions and form differing opinions from the same information. We must accept these opinions and respect each other's rights to express them.

However, we offer these comments to encourage Australians to consider the benefits of the Voice to Parliament for helping to achieve reconciliation with Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander Australians.

We urge all Australians, including our Members of Parliament, to engage in respectful and constructive dialogue on this issue. By working together in a spirit of solidarity, we can create a more just and equitable society for all.



In Marilynne Robinson's Jack the eponymous hero, persuaded of his dissoluteness, ever expecting the worst, is told by a preacher: 'Mr Ames, if the Lord thinks you need punishing, you can trust thim to see to it. He knows where to find you. If the's showing you a little grace in the meantime, the probably won't mind if you enjoy it.' I thought of this while watching a decent documentary about Mahalia Jackson. Thomas Porsey said: 'The key to Mahalia was very simple: she enjoyed her religion.' Having grown up with Jackson's voice (my mother had LPs), still feeling immensely comforted by it, I wonder if this is not what I've always sensed, somehow, without articulating it. Mahalia, a key player in the civil rights movement, had known hardship; she had few illusions about life; yet the visceral vocal power of this woman, who 'took the beat from the nightelubs back to the church' is charged with joyful zest. Coming to think of it, most of us could probably risk enjoying our religion a little more.


