This parable today takes us to the heart of the Gospel because the question it asks is:

#### WHY are we disciples? What's our motivation? Why are we here?

The landowner was generous: he didn't cheat anybody, he didn't underpay anybody: he paid those who had worked the whole day exactly what he'd promised to pay them. But it wasn't enough for those labourers that they received that amount: what was also important to them was **that the others should receive less**.

And so the parable takes us right into our own heart and asks what is our motivation for our discipleship? If we were to find that someone else would get to heaven, enjoy God's love, share in eternal life, without having followed the Gospel, without coming to church week after week, without following all the rules, what would our response be?

Do we follow the Gospel, not because it will bring us a bigger reward than the person who doesn't or do we do it simply because we recognise that it's a good thing to do: that it's a life-giving way, because we recognise that it has the power to bring us life, and that through the life it brings us we're able to bring others life? Or do we do it for the reward at the end – and more to the point, for a reward that we'd like to believe is bigger than for those who don't.

'I came that they might have life and have it to the full': Jesus' invitation is to embrace and live a Gospel which brings life, and to turn our backs on any mean-spirited imitation of religion which crushes life and love, either in ourselves or others. *Fr Colin* 




#### PARISH BLESSING OF ANIMALS

#### **BOOKING**

The current public health restrictions require us to keep numbers to the limit imposed by the four square metre per person rule (56 people for Killara church & 46 for Lindfield).

So it's necessary to make a booking to attend Mass each week – however this is very simple, taking only a few seconds. You can book up to 1 hour before each Mass. There's no restriction on how often you attend Mass—you just must book EACH time for each person attending.

#### COLLECTIONS

For health and safety we won't pass round the collection bowls – however there are two boxes clearly labelled **FIRST COLLECTION AND SECOND COLLECTION** in a prominent position in the centre of each church. We hope that you can resume your weekly giving. There are also Tap and Go machines in Lindfield church (and soon at Killara also) and the homepage of our website gives details about online giving.

Of course, if you – or anyone at home in your household – has even the mildest sign of a cold or other respiratory infection

PLEASE DO NOT ATTEND MASS.

#### WE HAVE A COVID SAFETY PLAN

- We adhere to maximum number of person permitted in the church based on the four square metre rule (46 people at Lindfield and 56 at Killara)
- Green ticks on the seats indicating seating positions ensure maximum separation
- All are asked to sanitise their hands on entering & leaving and we ask all who attend to wear a face mask.
- The pews etc are sanitised after every Mass
- There is no congregational singing and no physical exchange of the sign of peace.
- All are asked to maintain 2 metre spacing when coming forward for Holy Communion (which is given on the hand only and not on the tongue).

#### For those who have health conditions

At each Mass we can accommodate either one person or one couple who need a greater physical distancing in the choir loft at Lindfield for Sunday or weekday Mass. There will be nobody else in the choir loft with you. Please contact the Parish Office to book a spot in the choir loft.

# ANNOUNCING A COMING CHANGE TO SUNDAY EVENING MASS...

Following feedback from regular participants at our Sunday evening Mass we will revert to having this Mass each week in Lindfield church, rather than alternating between our two churches (though Mass tonight, 20th September, will be at Killara as previously advertised - following this weekend however it will revert to being in Lindfield church each Sunday night).

# Food for the Soul.....

What if I wish to give this last one the same as you? Or am I not free to do as I wish with my own money? (Mt 20:14b-16a)

#### EMBITTERED MORALISING

In a masterful book on grace, Piet Fransen suggests that we can test how well we understand grace by gauging our reaction to this story:

Imagine a man who during his whole life is entirely careless about God and morality. He's selfish, ignores the commandments, ignores all things religious, & is basically consumed with pursuing his own pleasure—wine, sex, & song. Then, just hours before his death, he repents of his irresponsibility, makes a sincere confession, receives the sacraments of the church, & dies inside that conversion.

What's our spontaneous reaction to that story? Isn't it wonderful that he received the grace of conversion before he died? Or, more likely: the lucky beggar! He got away with it! He had all that pleasure & still got to heaven!

If we felt the latter emotion, even for a moment, we have never deeply understood the concept of grace. Rather, like the older brother of the prodigal son, we are still seeing life away from God's house as fuller than life inside God's house, are still doing the right things mostly out of bitter duty, and are secretly envying the amoral. But, if this is true, we must be gentle with ourselves. This is an occupational hazard for good, faithful persons.

Jesus, himself, expresses this in the parable of the vineyard workers. This parable was addressed to Peter in answer to a question. Peter, on behalf of the other disciples, had just asked Jesus what reward they were going to receive for their fidelity to him.

Jesus answers by telling him the story of very rich and generous landowner who goes out one morning and hires workers to work in his vineyard. He hires some early in the morning, promises them a good wage, keeps hiring others as the day progresses, each new group having to work fewer hours than the group before them, and ends the day by hiring a group of workers just one hour before work is to end.

Then he tells his foreman to pay everyone a full day's wage. But this leaves the workers who toiled the whole day somewhat bitter. "This isn't fair!" they protest. "We worked the whole day and bore the heat of the sun and this last group worked just one hour. It's unfair that we all receive the same wage!" The generous landowner, obviously representing God, is gentle in his response: "Friend, didn't you agree to this wage? And isn't a good wage? Are you envious and angry because I'm generous?"

Remember to whom those words are being addressed:

Jesus is addressing Peter ... and, in effect, through this parable, is addressing all good people who are morally and religiously bearing the heat of the day. And Jesus is assuring us that we will be rewarded richly for doing this. But, as the parable makes clear, there's a catch: simply put, we will be rewarded with heaven and it will be wonderful; but, and this is the catch, we can have everything and enjoy nothing because we are watching what everyone else is getting!

I sometimes try to highlight this point rather graphically when I give retreats to priests and religious. I have them consider this scenario: imagine you live out your life in fidelity to your vow of celibacy, metaphorically, and otherwise bearing the heat of the day and, when you get to heaven, the first person you meet there is Hugh Hefner, the founder of Playboy. In shock you protest to God: "How did he get in here? It's not fair, given the life he lived and the life that I was asked to live!" And God, the overgenerous landowner, gently replies: "Friend, didn't you agree to a life of celibacy, and isn't heaven a wonderful place? Are you envious and angry because I'm generous?" And, how different this reaction is to that of a true saint who, upon meeting someone like this in heaven, would, like the father of the prodigal son, rush over in joy, embrace the person, and say: "I'm overwhelmed with joy that you made it!"

Thomas Halik, a Czech writer, suggests that one of the reasons why so many people in the world reject the churches is that they see us as "embittered moralizers," older brothers of the prodigal son, doing our religious and moral duties, but bitterly, and criticizing those who don't live like us out of hidden envy. Nietzsche made a similar accusation more than a hundred years ago.

Sadly, there's more than a little truth in that accusation. Too often, we are embittered moralizers, secretly envying the amoral and criticizing our world out of bitterness. But that's an occupational hazard for the good and the faithful. Peter and first apostles struggled with it. Why should we be immune?

We needn't be immune, but we do need to be honest in admitting that, despite our real goodness and fidelity, this indicates that we are still far from being full saints.

# FR RICHARD ROHR OFM'S MEDITATION The Rhineland Mystics: Spark of the Divine

Eckhart, Fox writes:

In the soul, Eckhart maintains, there is "something like a spark of divine nature, a divine light, a ray, an imprinted exists. [2]

in similar terms:

Life's real and highest goal . . . [is] to discover this spark of the divine that is in our hearts. . . . When we realize this goal, we discover simultaneously that the divinity within ourselves is one and the same in all—all individuals, all creatures, all of life. [3]

Meister Eckhart was frequently criticized by his with each experience of God. contemporaries (and still is by some people today) because his language was far too unitive. We like our distinctions! We don't want to hear that we have the same soul as our enemies, not our personal ones and certainly not our cultural or global ones! We want to hate them, don't we? And far too often our religion seemingly gives us permission to do so. But mystics don't hate anyone. They simply can't. They pray, as Jesus does on the cross, "Father [3] Eknath Easwaran, Original Goodness forgive them, they do not know what they are doing" (Luke Beatitudes (Nilgiri Press: 1989, 1996), 9. 23:34). The mystic knows the other person doesn't know. It's not malice as much as ignorance and unawareness. Mysticism begins when we start to make room for a completely new experience of God as immanent, present here and now, with and within all of us. God isn't only

Matthew Fox has studied, written, and taught on theology transcendent, "out there," and separate from me. Augustine and the mystics for decades. In one of his books on Meister of Hippo (354-430) wrote that God is "more intimate to me than I am to myself." [4] St. Catherine of Genoa (1447-1510) said, "My me is God: nor do I know my selfhood except in God." [5] Like all mystics, they overcame the gap, picture of the divine nature." [1] . . . But we have to make and we can too. When God is no longer out there or over contact with this divine spark by emptying ourselves or there, we have begun the mystical journey. It's not simply letting go. And then we will know the unity that already that we have a new relationship with God. It's as though we have a whole new God!

Indian-born teacher Eknath Easwaran (1910-1999) puts it That's what Meister Eckhart meant when he said, "Let us pray to God that we may be free of God." [6] That's not sacrilege; that's a beautifully humble prayer because we know that our present notion of God is never all God is. As Augustine boldly stated, "Si enim comprehendis, non est Deus" ("If we comprehend it, it is not God"). [7] Our present experience is never enough, but it is gratefully where we begin, and these mystics teach us that we grow
