SOLEMNITY OF THE ASCENSION OF THE LORD SEVENTH SUNDAY OF EASTER 21 - 5 - 23 The season of glad song has come' (Song of Songs 2:12)

This week: Acts 1:1-11; Eph 1:17-23; Mt 28:16-20 Next week: Acts 2:1-11; 1 Cor 12:3-7, 12-13; Jn 20:19-23

While Easter Sunday and Pentecost Sunday clearly speak of the *presence* of Jesus and his power in our lives, the feast of the Ascension seems to speak instead of absence: Jesus leaves his disciples, he leaves the world - they feel bereft of his presence.

But the Ascension is very much an Easter feast. It is integrally a part of the Easter Season, and its meaning for our lives can only be understood in reference to Easter itself:

The risen Jesus is no longer *physically* present in the world which challenges us to consider *how* he *is* present. The Ascension, as it were asks us 'to look elsewhere':

The risen Jesus is no longer *physically* present in the world, but he is present:

in the depths of our prayer and contemplation;

in the person who needs our love, our forgiveness, our compassion

in the person who is judged, condemned, and shunned;

in ourselves in our times of pain, of vulnerability, of rejection and dejection.

When seen with Easter eyes, when seen as an Easter feast, the Ascension is not about the departure of Jesus but rather about his *arrival*. Fr Colin

Roads to Rome - a gradual awakening....

My road to Rome (or indeed Damascus) begins in a rather didn't think I was doing the right thing, than because it nondescript late 1960s parish church in Tiverton, Devon. required a very public admission that my previous views We were gathered on an overcast autumn day to celebrate were wrong. But inspired by divine grace & with a due the baptism of my two daughters, who were then nine sense of humility, I eventually swallowed my pride. months and two years old respectively. I'd been looking I contacted our parish priest, Fr Kristian Paver, who forward to seeing family & friends at the event, but hadn't given much thought to the religious element. As the child of an agnostic father & an atheist mother, I was raised without any real understanding of sacramental life-& indeed, without any sense of spirituality. I had no objection to my daughters being baptised, as I knew this was important to my wife (a cradle Catholic). But it was very much something we were doing for her. She'd been in touch with the local parish priest. She'd talked through the details with him, while I walked with our daughters in the presbytery garden. And she'd been the driving force behind arrangements for the day. So it was with considerable surprise that I found myself standing in church & wishing that I, too, was taking part in the rite. It was clear to me that our daughters were embarking on a voyage, one I sincerely wanted to join them on. In the preceding weeks & months, we'd been making a concerted effort to attend Mass. As fellow parents will be only too aware, this is no simple matter with small children, particularly at a time of Covid restrictions when children's liturgy had yet to be reinstated. So I'd been going with my wife & helping keep our daughters entertained.

Yet, as it is meant to do, the liturgy got under my skin. What bits of readings & homilies I caught between nappy changes & demands for food & drink resonated. I didn't yet make much of this. For some time, I'd identified as agnostic, not atheist. And I'd always thought the message of the gospels a worthy one, which is why I'd been happy to have our daughters baptised. Why should I not identify with gospel readings & homilies based on them? Thus, even before I knew it, the Spirit had begun working in me.

I did not, therefore, experience a single Damascene moment, but rather a gradual spiritual awakening. At our daughters' christening, I became aware of a process that had already started. When discussing how much we'd enjoyed the day that evening, my wife asked whether I would ever consider getting baptised myself. In over 10 years together, it was a question she'd never put, and I'd never considered. Yet it was posed kindly, without any pressure. To my surprise, I found myself saying "maybe ...'

The central challenge lay not in values precisely because I couldn't be certain there was no God. How could I now be so confident there was one, and that Jesus Christ was his only Son?

me. The answer, as I came to appreciate, had been staring journey I was on. me in the face all along. Faith is a different way of knowing. This may sound trite for those raised in religion; but to me, it was a revelation. The whole point of faith, I realised, is that it's not easy. You can never know that Christ died, was buried & rose again in the same way you know that your Victorian terraced house is made of bricks. At some point, you have to make the leap. Belief is only meaningful without definitive proof. That's what makes it hard; that's also what makes it rewarding.

As soon as I left behind my doubts, it became clear what I needed to do. By the end of summer, I'd all but decided. Yet even so. I found myself hesitating. Hesitating less because I

responded with the kindness & humanity I'd already come to expect of the Church. He was delighted by my interest & we arranged a set of regular meetings. By profession, I am a lecturer in medieval history, a subject which demands a basic understanding of church history & Scripture. I'd read the Bible cover to cover during my doctoral studies; & I also had a grounding in elements of doctrine. What I didn't have was a sense of the active life of the modern Church. So at our meetings, we began with the basics, discussing what it is that distinguishes Catholicism from other branches of Christianity, before starting to work our way more systematically through the catechism.

Fr Kristian had made it clear that I shouldn't feel any pressure—that this was a process I could stop or put on pause at any point. But each step along the way, it became clearer that the Church was where I belonged. The community at our local parish of St James played an essential part. The church itself resembles an aeroplane hangar more closely than the grand monasteries I'm accustomed to study. It's frankly the last place I'd have expected to find religion. Yet precisely on this account, it was the perfect place for me to take the leap of faith. It was not pretty buildings & quaint nostalgia that lured me away from agnosticism & cultural Protestantism; it was the living faith of those within the walls of St James. It was the smiles & generosity of the parishioners, who -happily excused the periodic outbursts of our daughters (typically timed to coincide with the Eucharist) & sympathised with their sleep -deprived & occasionally exasperated parents.

To an outsider, it may seem like a most inauspicious moment to join the Catholic communion. Barely a day passes without fresh revelations of misdeeds past & present. But, in Fr Kristian and our parish, I found a Catholicism that was true to tradition without being reactionary, one that welcomes not only the poor, but also the marginalised - refugees, immigrants & minorities. It is a community that is catholic in the original sense of the term, encompassing the full gamut of political opinion and embracing members of every conceivable age and background. While it's sometimes easy to forget the wider world in small-town What turned a hesitant "maybe" into a firm "yes" was an Devon, at St James' every Sunday morning we are visibly

> The baptism itself went by in a blur, a heady mix of joy and adrenaline. When it was over, I felt relief and exaltation. But above all, I felt belonging. The last time I'd felt so certain of my actions was the day of my wedding. I knew that here I stand and here I shall stay.

> Looking back, there is a beautiful symmetry to the entire affair. My spiritual rebirth began with that of my daughters; their salvation is mine. And when I reflect on the process, one word comes to mind time and again: love.

Christ's central message was one of love. And it was love that drew me to his pilgrim Church. The love of my wife and daughters, that brought me through church doors on that fateful day in November 2021. The love of Fr Kristian, that nurtured my faith in the weeks and months that followed. And the love of my sponsor and the wider parish community, that sustained me through the Lenten period of fasting and preparation. In the end, I'm tempted to rephrase the old Beatles refrain as theological truism: to find God, all you need is love.



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FR RICHARD ROHR OFM'S MEDITATION . . . EVIL IS A SOCIAL REALITY

collective realities:

Over the years, it has become increasingly clear to me that we are confused about the nature of evil. We don't seem to understand what evil is, how it operates, or what we can do When small, easily forgivable transgressions are labelled Our planet's life-sustaining systems disintegrating. Authoritarianism is emerging all over the world. Evil is clearly at work, but what can we do about it?

I do not pretend to have the answers to such a big question, but what I can offer is the wisdom of the Christian tradition. For the first thousand years of Catholic Christianity, it was assumed that there were three sources of evil: the world, the flesh, and the devil. [

Over centuries, we became very used to equating evil with individual "sins" and we lost a sense of its collective nature. The word "sin" often serves as a label applied to various cultural taboos and expectations, frequently having to do with purity codes. That seems very different from the real evils destroying the world! Of course, moral development We are all guilty with one another's sin and not just our and impulse control are important individual disciplines, own. but the conflation of personal sin with the source of evil is a terrible misunderstanding which has led to tragic consequences. Perhaps so many of us stopped using the

Richard Rohr clarifies how evil, sin, and salvation are word "sin" because we located it inside of our own small, cultural categories, with little awareness of the true subtlety, depth, and importance of the much more devious

personally or collectively to reduce its power over us and its "sins" and equated with evil, we trivialize the very real impact on our world. We really must face these questions, notion of evil and divert our attention from the real thing. even though they are difficult and unpleasant to think Before it becomes personal and shameable, evil is often culturally agreed upon, admired, and deemed necessary. The apostle Paul already had the prescient genius to recognise this, and I believe he taught that both sin and salvation are, first of all, corporate and social realities. In fact, this recognition could and should be acknowledged as one of his major contributions to history. I believe it still will

Therefore, we also lost out on the benefit of a corporate notion of salvation that far exceeded anyone's individual worthiness or unworthiness.



WHAT ENDURES

This ieon of the Pormition was the one intact object left in a house in Lukhansk bombed to pieces by Russian occupying forces last year. It now hangs on the wall of the Greek Catholic Patriarchate in Kyiv. From the beginning of recorded time, wars have provoked existential questions: What is the point of suffering and destruction? Can there be meaning in it? It is difficult to formulate propositional answers; but one can sometimes see the contours of a response in transformed lives and gracious deeds. I am moved by the Ukrainian Catholic community's commitment to humanitarian action. In the midst of war there is blossoming practical charity. The Gospel is gracted. Wounds are healed on the part of those who receive and on the part of those who give. Christian faith in the resurrection is personal and concrete, rooted in an historical, transformative event; but it also has symbolic, corporate power. It is not vain to speak of the resurrection of a society. One can see signs of it in Ukraine. Certain things cannot be destroyed; attempts to do so will simply manifest their indestructibility.

Why is it being proposed as an adaption to the Australian Constitution?

The second webinar on June 29 will be given by Fr Frank Brennan SJ, who will look at how the Church has engaged in Aboriginal affairs, and why Catholics should take serious interest in the referendum.

The final session on July 27 will feature three different voices of First Nations peoples who will consider what the Voice means for them, for their communities and for Australia.
