This week's Gospel has Jesus teaching the disciples to pray and giving them the prayer that has become known as the Lord's Prayer:

the pattern for all Christian prayer.

But what is that pattern?

Above all, it's *outward looking* - rather than being primarily concerned with our own needs:

it begins with praise of God

its desire is the coming of God's Kingdom, not our own

when it does ask for something it's for basic needs: 'our daily bread'

its deepest request is for a spiritual gift – the gift of forgiveness: to be forgiven ourselves **and** to be able to forgive others

This is the prayer that is given by Jesus as the pattern for all prayer. Perhaps on this Sunday we could reflect on our own prayer in the light of this model which Jesus gives to us.

THE POWER OF PRAYER AND RITUAL INSIDE OUR HELPLESSNESS

In the movie based upon Jane Austen's classic novel, Sense but there's nothing we can do. some task to do, or I shall go mad!"

We've all had the feeling at times when in the face of a dire situation we need to do something, but there's nothing we can do, no magic wand we can wave to make things better. But there is something we can do.

I recall an event in my own life several years ago: I was teaching summer school in Belgium when, late one evening, just as I was getting ready for bed, I received an email that two friends of mine, a man and a woman recently engaged, had been involved that day in a fatal car accident. He was killed instantly and she was in serious condition in hospital. I was living by myself in a university dorm, thousands of miles from where this all happened, and thousands of miles from anyone with whom I could share this sorrow. Alone, agitated, panicked, and desperately needing to do something but being absolutely helpless to do anything, I was literally driven to my knees. Not being able to do anything else, I picked up the prayerbook that contains the Office of the Church and prayed, by myself, the Vespers prayer for the dead. When I'd finished, my sorrow hadn't gone away, my friend was still dead, but my panic had subsided, as had my desperate need to do Ritual: it's what we have to do. It's all we can do! It's the something (when there was nothing I could do).

It's these, prayer and ritual, which we have at our disposal at those times when, like the man in Sense and Sensibility, we need to do something or we will go mad. That's not only true for heavy, sorrowful times when loved ones are sick or dying or killed in accidents and we need to do something

deaf ritually. We don't understand ritual and therefore Unable to live with that response her says to her: "Give me mostly don't know what to do when we need to be doing something but we don't know what to do. That's a fault, a painful poverty, in our understanding.

> The Trappist monks who were martyred in Algeria in 1996 were first visited by extremists who would later kidnap and kill them, on Christmas Eve, just as they were preparing to celebrate Christmas mass. After some initial threats, their eventual murderers left. The monks were badly shaken. They huddled together as a group for a time to digest what had just happened. Then, not knowing what else to do in the face of this threat and their fear, they sang the Christmas mass. In the words of their Abbott: "It's what we had to do. It's all we could do! It was the right thing." He shared too, as did a number of the other monks (in their diaries) that they found this, celebrating the ritual of mass in the face of their fear and panic, something that calmed their fear and brought some steadiness and regularity back into their lives.



FR RICHARD ROHR OFM'S MEDITATION . . . **CONTEMPLATION CREATES COMPASSION**

A practice of contemplation is one of the surest ways to develop the virtue of compassion—for both ourselves and others. Father Richard speaks to how this loving gaze is developed between ourselves and God.

Much of the early work of contemplation is discovering a way to observe ourselves from a compassionate and nonjudgmental distance until we can eventually live more and more of our lives from this calm inner awareness and acceptance. In a contemplative stance, we find ourselves smiling, sighing, and weeping at ourselves, much more than needing either to hate or to congratulate ourselvesbecause we are finally looking at ourselves with the eyes of God.

Actually, what is happening is we are letting God gaze at us, and compassion. God initiates a positive gaze, which now all negative energy and motivation is slowly exposed and goes in both directions. Unfortunately, we seldom allow that to happen. Decades ago, Matthew Fox identified what it has There will be no mistrust, fear, or negativity in either gaze with God. I believe it is even more true of the world today. Fox writes:

Compassion is everywhere. Compassion is the world's 1 Corinthians 13:12). sake, but for survival's sake.

And yet, in human history of late, compassion remains an energy source that goes largely unexplored, untapped and you. This is foundational.

unwanted. Compassion appears very far away and almost in exile. Whatever propensities the human cave dweller once had for violence instead of compassion seem to have increased geometrically with the onslaught of industrial society. The exile of compassion is evident everywhere. . . .

In acquiescing in compassion's exile, we are surrendering the fullness of nature and of human nature, for we, like all creatures in the cosmos, are compassionate creatures. All persons are compassionate at least potentially. What we all share today is that we are victims of compassion's exile. The difference between persons and groups of persons is not that some are victims and some are not: we are all victims and all dying from lack of compassion; we are all surrendering our humanity together. The impact of the Angelus bell, enculturated into Lutheran practice, is beautifully evoked in Selma Lagerlöf's Jerusalem:

'Everyone in the parish knew that no parishioner neglected to say the Our Father when the church bells tolled; and that every afternoon, at the sound of the bells, work ceased both indoors and out of doors while the men removed their caps and the women curtised and everyone stood still for as long as it took to recite the Lord's Prayer. Everyone who had ever lived in the parish would further affirm that they never thought God greater or more worthily praised than on those summer evenings when they saw the seythes motionless, the ploughs at a standstill in the furrow, and a cartload of grain left right in the middle of discharging just for the sake of a couple of tintinnabulations. It was as if people knew, that Our Lord just then hovered over their parish on an evening cloud, immense and great and good, sowing blessings across the entire county.'

This isn't simply a mechanical statement about the origin of the universe, it's not a claim made in opposition to the scientific theory of evolution. It has nothing to do with the 'mechanics' of creation, and everything to do, once again, with love.
