Today is the Octave Day of Easter, the day which completes the Easter Octave. In the liturgy the eight days of the Octave are like *One Day*. Since the Octave begins and ends on the same day of the week (Sunday) it is as though the days in between are subsumed within it and we celebrate one great Sunday as Easter breaks upon us. Each day of the Octave is (liturgically) still Easter Sunday – thus all this last week the Gloria was prayed at every Mass, the Easter Dismissal is given (*Go in the peace of Christ, alleluia, alleluia! Thanks be to God, alleluia, alleluia!*).

Today then is still Easter Sunday in our liturgy, a Day too great to be confined to one day. And after today we continue the *Season of Easter*: 50 days which do not come to their end until Pentecost as we celebrate the great fruit of Easter – the outpouring of the Spirit of God. As we took 40 days to prepare for Easter let's not forget to take even longer – 50 days – to *celebrate* it.

LIVING BEYOND DOUBT

There is a story about St Christopher, probably more legend than truth, which runs this way:

As a youth, Christopher was gifted in every way, except faith. He was a big man physically, powerful, strong, goodhearted, mellow, and well liked by all. He was also generous, using his physical strength to help others. His one fault was that he found it hard to believe in God. For him, the physical was what was real and everything else seemed unreal. However, he yearned to believe in God and deeply respected those who did believe. And so he lived his life in a certain honest agnosticism, unable to really believe in anything beyond what he could physically see, feel, and touch.

This, however, did not prevent him from using his gifts, especially his physical strength, to serve others. This became his refuge, generosity and service. He became a ferryboat operator, spending his life helping to carry people across a dangerous river. One night, so the legend goes, during a storm, the ferryboat capsized and Christopher dove into the dark waters to rescue a young child. Carrying that child to the shore, he looked into its face and saw there the face of Christ. After that he believed, for he had seen the face of Christ. The very name, Christopher, contains the legend. Christopher means Christ-Bearer.

Fact or fiction? In either case, the story contains, within its very simplicity, a profound lesson. It gives us an answer, a practical one, to one of the most difficult questions of all: What should we do when our faith is weak? What should be our reaction in the face of the fact that God often seems silent, distant, dead? How do we move from believing only in the physical, from believing in the reality of only what we can see, feel, touch, taste, and smell, to believing in the existence of deeper, spiritual, realities?

Christopher's answer? Live as honestly and respectfully as you can and use your gifts to help others. God will appear. Faith is not so much a question of feeling as of selfless service.

That is also the lesson in the biblical account of the apostle, Thomas, and his doubt about the resurrection of Jesus. Remember how he protests: "unless I can (physically) place my finger in the wounds of his hands and stick my finger into the wound of his side, I will not believe." It is

noteworthy that Jesus offers no resistance or rebuke in the face of this remark. Instead he takes Thomas at his word: "Come here, and (physically) place your finger in the wounds of my hand and the wound in my side; see for yourself that I am real and not a ghost."

That is an open challenge for all of us: "Come and see for yourselves that I am real and not a ghost!" The challenge, however, has a couple of conditions: honesty and generosity.

Skepticism and agnosticism, even atheism, are not a problem as long as one is honest, non-rationalising, non-lying, ready to efface oneself before reality as it appears, and generous in giving his or her life away in service. If these conditions are met, God, the author and source of all reality, will eventually become evident, even to those who need physical proof. The stories of Christopher and Thomas teach us that and they assure us that God is neither angered nor threatened by an honest agnosticism.

Faith is never certainty. Neither it is the sure feeling that God exists. Conversely, unbelief is not to be confused with the absence of the felt assurance that God exists. There are, for everyone of us, dark nights of the soul, silences of God, cold lonely seasons, bitter times when God's appearances to us cannot be truly grasped or recognised.


The history of faith, as witnessed by the life of Jesus and the lives of the saints, shows us that God often seems dead and, at those times, the reality of the empirical world can so overpower us that nothing seems real except what we can see and feel right now, namely our own pain.

Whenever this happens, we need to become Christ-bearers, Christophers, honest agnostics who use their goodness and God-given strengths to help carry others across the burdensome rivers of life. God does not ask us to have a faith that is certain, but a service that is sure. We have the assurance that, should we faithfully help carry others without first thinking of ourselves, we will one day find ourselves before the person of Christ who will gently say to us:

See for yourself, that I am real, and not a ghost. (Lk 24:39)





FR RICHARD ROHR OFM’S MEDITATION . . .

RESURRECTION: THE INVINCIBILITY OF GOD’S LOVE

Archbishop Desmond Tutu (1931–2021) shares a hopeful vision for the transformation of all death into new life, all evil into good.

Dear Child of God, it is often difficult for us to recognise the presence of God in our lives and in our world. In the clamour of the tragedy that fills the headlines we forget about the majesty that is present all around us. We feel vulnerable and often helpless. . . . But we are not helpless and with God’s love we are ultimately invincible. Our God does not forget those who are suffering and oppressed.

Tutu shares an experience he had when gathered with other church leaders during the most difficult days of apartheid:

We met at a theological college that had closed down because of the government’s racist policies. During our discussions I went into the priory garden for some quiet. There was a huge Calvary—a large wooden cross without a corpus, but with protruding nails and crown of thorns. It was a stark symbol of the Christian faith. It was winter: the grass was pale and dry and nobody would have believed that in a few weeks’ time it would be lush and green and beautiful again. It would be transfigured.

As I sat quietly in the garden I realized the power of transfiguration—of God’s transformation—in our world. The principle of transfiguration [Richard: very similar to how I describe resurrection] is at work when something so unlikely as the brown grass that covers our veld in winter

becomes bright green again. Or when the tree with gnarled leafless branches bursts forth with the sap flowing so that the birds sit chirping in the leafy branches. Or when the once dry streams gurgle with swift-flowing water. When winter gives way to spring and nature seems to experience its own resurrection.

The principle of transfiguration says nothing, no one and no situation, is “untransfigurable,” that the whole of creation, nature, waits expectantly for its transfiguration, when it will be released from its bondage and share in the glorious liberty of the children of God, when it will not be just dry inert matter but will be translucent with divine glory. . . .

All over this magnificent world God calls us to extend [God’s] kingdom of shalom—peace and wholeness—of justice, of goodness, of compassion, of caring, of sharing, of laughter, of joy, and of reconciliation. God is transfiguring the world right this very moment through us because God believes in us and because God loves us. What can separate us from the love of God? Nothing. Absolutely nothing. And as we share God’s love with our brothers and sisters, God’s other children, there is no tyrant who can resist us, no oppression that cannot be ended, no hunger that cannot be fed, no wound that cannot be healed, no hatred that cannot be turned to love, no dream that cannot be fulfilled.

An Easter Reflection

...Let's not yield to the temptation of regarding Easter as the happy ending of a film that for a while looked to end sadly. He isn't dead after all! Those who were upset are wiping their tears! The discouraged face the future with fresh hope! We breathe a sigh of relief, put away our paper tissues, discard the left-over popcorn. Do we then carry on as normal, as if nothing had happened and everything is back to normal?

We can't. Easter changes *everything*. Our chains, too, have burst. And so we face the question: How do we make use of our liberty?

Regarding the power of sin in our lives, we know we need conversion. We go to confession; we resolve to become better human beings. This is excellent, of course; but a Christian is not first and foremost a *better* human being; he or she is a human being made new. The opposite of sin is not virtue. The opposite of sin is freedom. The freedom Christ has won for us. Virtue is a fruit of freedom, not the other way round.

Paul puts it all in a nutshell when he says: 'For freedom Christ has set us free'. He continues, 'stand fast therefore, and do not submit again to a yoke of slavery' (Gal 5:1). Easter Sunday doesn't mark the end of a sad story. It constitutes the beginning of a new exodus, an exodus from everything in our existence that blocks in us the life of Christ, who *is* for us the promised land — an exodus from addiction, from behaviour degrading to ourselves or others, from all that, despite our best intentions, is of death and of the night. In the collect we prayed that we might 'through the renewal brought by [God's] Spirit, rise up in the light of

life'. This is why Christ fought such a fierce battle for our sakes, why he, 'the most beautiful of the children of men' (Psalm 45:2) let himself be so disfigured that he 'lacked human semblance' (Isaiah 52:14), as we read on Good Friday. The victory he won is for everyone, as Cornelius learns. May it not have been won in vain for us!

I am always touched when we read, on Easter Morning, of the shroud our Lord left behind, and of the cloth that had been over his head, 'rolled up in a place by itself'. It affords us an image of the Lord of Life rising up out of death with ordered peace, putting death aside, tidily folded, like pyjamas for which he has no further need. In the same way, Brothers and Sisters, Christ enables us to leave death behind, and to enter into life. It does not have to happen with explosive gestures. The life of the Spirit in us resembles all other life and follows life's laws: it develops organically, sometimes seemingly unnoticeably. However, growth is assured; for the grain of wheat, cast into the earth once for all, is bringing forth a generous harvest. Let us take strength from it in order to be part of it, that by our lives, lived in union with Christ's, the world may be nourished. This is the task of our lives, fundamentally speaking; all else is circumstantial.

'Christ our Passover has been sacrificed, therefore let us keep the feast with the unleavened bread of purity and truth', freed to live freely in time and eternity. Amen.
