The Gospel reading today takes us to the heart of the Gospel itself – Jesus' great command to love. It was where he came to his greatest conflict with the Pharisees.

It wasn't that they didn't believe in the value of love.

It was just that they saw it in relative terms – it could be overridden by the Law, the religious law. Following the Law was their great absolute.

Jesus' shocking message was that love was the absolute consideration that could even override the Law.

The challenge of the Gospel is to ask ourselves whether we ever allow law and regulation to ever excuse us from the absolute command to love:

to love God, to love our neighbour, to love ourself.

HOW TO ATTEND MASS

The current public health restrictions limit the number who can be present in each of our churches (56 people for Killara church and 46 for Lindfield).

We also must keep a record of everyone who attends for contact tracing purposes by the government in the event of an outbreak.

The easiest way for us to get that information and for you to ensure a spot at Mass is to make an online booking — this is very simple, taking only a few seconds. Just go to the special hotlink box on the homepage of our parish website (www.lindfieldkillara.org.au). Or call the Parish Office and we'll book for you.

Of course you can just turn up for Mass and provide your contact details to the welcomer—though sadly if we have reached our maximum number you wouldn't be able to stay (so it's always best to book if you can).

Of course, if you – or anyone at home in your household – has even the mildest sign of cold or flu -like symptoms PLEASE DO NOT

ATTEND MASS.

WE HAVE A COVID SAFETY PLAN

- We adhere to maximum number of person permitted in the church based on the four square metre rule
- Green ticks on the seats indicating seating positions ensure maximum separation
- All are asked to sanitise their hands on entering & leaving We ask all who attend to wear a face mask
- The pews etc are sanitised after every Mass
- There is no congregational singing and no physical exchange of the sign of peace.
- All are asked to maintain 2 metre spacing when coming forward for Holy Communion (which is given on the hand only and not on the tongue).

KILLARA CARPARK DEVELOPMENT -- AN UPDATE

After so much work over the last few years and the project being fully approved, we have now heard that work will begin in a few weeks' time. Group Homes Australia hopes to have laid the slabs for both dwellings before Christmas.

As a result, once work begins the carpark will be fenced off during the construction period. When the houses are finished the onsite parish parking agreed in the contract will become available.

During the first phase of construction some onsite parking will still be available on our internal slip road which one enters near the Charles St front door of the church; egress will be via the lower carpark driveway further up Charles St.

Apart from that of course there is ample street parking—particularly as the numbers at each Mass are reduced at present.

At this point however the main car park remains available and we will keep you posted as to when the works will begin.

We owe a great deal of thanks to the many parishioners who served on the Killara Development Committee during the planning phase of this project. The income which will come to the parish once the homes are completed will be a strong resource for our parish facilities and ministries.

Food for the Soul.....

You shall love the Lord, your God, with all your heart, with all your soul, and with all your mind.

This is the greatest and the first commandment.

The second is like it: You shall love your neighbor as yourself. (Mt 22:36-40)

Love's DNA

Recently, in a theology class, I was asked this question: "Why is it that whenever we talk about love we soon end up talking about rules and commandments? Invariably we end up talking about what we can't do! And it's the same thing with faith: We begin talking about faith and then end up talking about dogma, creeds, and heresies. Why can't we just talk about love and faith without immediately bringing in a bunch of 'dos' and 'don'ts'?"

Fair enough. A good question. This is not unlike the famous ecclesiological query of a century ago when a French theologian asked: "Jesus came preaching a kingdom, how did we end up with the church?" Where do commandments, creeds, dogmas, and structures come from? First off, we should admit that, sadly, sometimes they come from the wrong places. Rules, laws, and dogmas too frequently come from administrative offices that are too concerned with their own power. As well, they come from fearful, jealous, and petty places inside of ourselves. Small wonder that they do not always serve love and faith very well. However, in their best expression they come from love and faith themselves, just as an oak tree comes from an acorn and a mature man or woman develops out of a single set of chromosomes. Love and faith, like an acorn or a set of chromosomes, carry a clear, determined DNA.

We see this with faith: Bernard Lonergan once said that faith is the brand of the first principles inside the human soul. Henri Nouwen, using a different language, said the same thing. For him, faith is the primal memory of the kiss of God in the soul, the dark remembrance of true first love, of having once, before conscious memory, been caressed by hands far gentler than our own. These are wonderful, helpful images for faith. Faith is a brand, a kiss. However once we begin to try to touch that kiss in any way—through words, imagination, or even through feeling—we find that not all expressions of what we think this kiss is remain true to its DNA and that only certain things can grow out of that acorn.

The thing itself—however inchoate, dark, & beyond our imagination—dictates the lines within which it can validly be taken. As soon as we try to give expression to the kiss of God in us we find that some things we say are true to that kiss & others are not & soon enough that makes for creeds, dogmas, & heresies. We see this right in the way our Christian creeds developed. Immediately after the resurrection, the earliest Christians had only a one-

line creed: Jesus is Lord! That's a powerful little acorn! It says it all. However, as they tried to un-package what that meant, while all the time remaining true to its DNA, they eventually ended up with a couple of lengthy creeds & a whole series of dogmas that were needed to challenge a number of false understandings along the way.

Love works the same way. It too is a symbol inside of the heart, an acorn with a unique DNA. Love can grow legitimately only in certain directions. What is its DNA? At one level this is clear. Love, in order to be love, must contain gratitude, respect, selflessness, and a willingness to let the other be free. Selfishness, envy, taking-another-for-granted, disrespect, and violation of all kinds can never pass themselves off as love. They are its antithesis. All of this is already written into the acorn. Hence there are some non-negotiable "dos" and "don'ts" within love. These are not arbitrary, humanly-imposed dictates that limit love, but are rather the inherent lines for health and growth written right into love's DNA. Thus, love, like faith, necessarily ends up with a number of commandments, creeds, and dogmas.

Sometimes today we are too easily seduced by a naive concept of love and freedom. This naiveté would have us believe that faith and love can exist without boundaries, that there is not within them a defined DNA that may not be violated. The belief here is that love and faith can mean whatever we want them to mean.

But, as we know, something that means everything means nothing. Love that is potentially anything, that exists without any non-negotiable protective principles, can also then mean incest, rape, and murder. The same is true of faith. Faith without boundaries, without creed and dogma to specify it, can then just as easily mean racism, Nazism, and bigotry.

Why do we inevitably end up talking about creeds, dogmas, commandments, and boundaries? Because love and faith have a set DNA. Every acorn is meant to be a very specific kind of tree. So too with love and faith. Already in their nascent forms, as in any tiny seed, there is present a fairly complete script for health and growth. Good creeds, dogmas, and commandments simply lay out that script so that it can be consciously read.

FACE MASKS

- to ensure they're effective please make sure they cover the nostrils as well as the mouth
- when coming forward to receive Holy Communion please keep the mask on as you receive the Host; then step 1.5 metres to the side before lowering the mask to place the Host in your mouth. Many thanks.

FR RICHARD ROHR OFM'S MEDITATION: WHAT DO WE DO WITH EVIL? JESUS' SOCIAL PROGRAMME


Jesus does not directly attack the religious and institutional he did not concentrate on personal, "flesh" sins nearly as sin systems of his time until his final action against the much as the sins of "the world" and "the devil," but few of money changers in the temple (see Matthew 21:12-13; us were taught to see him that way. Mark 11:15-17; Luke 19:45-46). Because of this, Jesus' primary social justice critique and action are often a disappointment to most radicals and social activists. Jesus' social program, as far as I can see, is a quiet refusal to participate in almost all external power structures or domination systems. His primary action is a very simple lifestyle, which kept him from being constantly co-opted by those very structures, which I (and Paul) would call the "sin system."

Jesus seems to have avoided the monetary system as much as possible by using "a common purse" (John 12:6; 13:29). His three-year ministry, in effect, offers free healing and healthcare for any who want them. He consistently treats women with a dignity and equality that is almost unknown in an entirely patriarchal culture. At the end of his life, he surrenders to the punitive systems of both empire and religion by letting them judge, torture, and murder him. He is finally a full victim of the systems that he refused to

wisely called the "domination system." [2] These systems (Matthew 11:23), not necessarily Corey from Capernaum. usually wield power over the poor, the defenseless, and the How did we miss that? It is crucial in our understanding of outsider in every culture. When he does take on the temple evil as being, first of all, a social agreement. system directly (Mark 11:15–18), Jesus is killed within a week. Contrary to history's interpretation of Jesus' practice,

In fact, Jesus is always forgiving individual sinners, which was a problem for the righteous from the beginning (Luke 7:34). In contrast, I do not once see him "forgiving" the sins of systems and empires. Instead, he just makes them show themselves (Mark 5:8) and name themselves (Mark 5:9)—as did Desmond Tutu in South Africa and Martin Luther King, Jr. in America.

Significantly, Jesus says "Woe to you, Chorazin! Woe to you, Bethsaida!" (Matthew 11:21) and "Alas for you [cultures of the] lawyers, scribes, and Pharisees" (most of Matthew 23 and Luke 11:37-54). He didn't warn Bill from Bethsaida, Cathy from Chorazin, or Simon the Pharisee, with whom he engages and eats (Luke 7:36-47). He laments over "Jerusalem, Jerusalem" (Luke 13:34-35) instead of attacking Jerry from Jerusalem. Today we would call that making an "unfair generalisation"; but if what I am saying here has any truth to it, maybe it is a much more truthful and fair diagnosis of the problem. It is Bethsaida and Jerusalem that should fear judgment more than Bill Jesus knew the destructive power of what Walter Wink and Jerry! It is "Capernaum" that is to be cast into hell

In terms Of the Platonic distinction between "knowledge" and "opinion," it has to be said that we live in an age in which opinion reigns supreme. The internet has spawned thousands of websites in which opinions are vented with great assurance but with little attention to science, logic or alternative possibilities. Our online activity can easily degenerate to a smash-and-grab raid for unsourced information rather than engaging in a reasoned review of available evidence.... In the early days of computers specialists used to emphasise on the importance of the careful inputting of data with the maxim GIGO: "Garbage In Garbage Out." The same applies to our own minds. If we fill our minds with garbage then, when it comes time for serious thought or prayer, we are liable to reap what we have interiorly sewn... Instead of being reflective persons of some depth, we can easily become preoccupied with things of little or no importance and weaken our capability for sustained reasoning. When asked what he considered to be the most serious problem of our time, the General of the Jesuits, Fr Adolfo Nicolás, replied, "the globalisation of superficiality."

Ronald Burke 15th July 1932—2nd September 2020



Many parishioners will remember Ronald Burke, who passed away on 2 September 2020, aged 88. Ron and his family had a long association with the Holy Family Parish which began when his family moved into Highfield Road in the early 1940's. Ron attended Holy Family primary school, before moving to St Aloysius' College for the remainder of his schooling. He attended Sydney University and graduated with a Batchelor of Dental Surgery in 1955.

For many years Ron lived in Wahroonga and had a dental practice in Roseville, from where he attended to the teeth of many fellow parishioners, as well as many of the clergy and nuns of the north shore.

Ron had a strong faith and was an active parishioner at the Holy Name Priory at Wahroonga, then later back at Holy Family at Lindfield. He was a volunteer for St Vincent de Paul, helped at St Edmund's school for the blind, and in later years, an active member of the Catenians. He will be remembered by his many friends for his enthusiasm, optimism, generosity and interest in life.
