Amos calls us to always ensure that our love and devotion for God, our celebration of the Eucharist, our prayers and meditation, are inseparably tied to a real and practical concern for justice, a respect for those who are weakest, an insatiable desire to see the common-wealth shared for the good of all. We regret that there is one imperfection in our live-streamed Masses. As the sound system at Lindfield is quite old we have an analogue mixer which means that all the sound—celebrant's mike, Reader's mike, choir mike feed in equally and so the choir/cantor sound is somewhat distorted. The only solution to this is a new digital mixer but as we can't afford that we hope that you'll understand that the sound has some imperfections.

I'd like to express my thanks to Michael Walker who has overseen the whole installation, to Anthony Cassidy who has worked closely with him from the parish side, and to those parishioners who have agreed to be the 'operators'. Fr Colin

Often enough, we are conscious that this harmony and the beneficent rest it induces are absent from our lives. What to do then? An avenue is indicated by the poet Reiner Kunze, who once wrote that a poem is unrest come to rest: *Das gedicht ist zur ruhe gekommene unruhe*:

What if the fundamental human task were poetic, if the chief challenge before us were to make of our lives such a poem?
