The series of short sayings by Jesus that constitute today's Gospel are particularly appropriate to ourselves as two communities who have been called upon to come together as one parish: they speak of the urgency of discipleship and the commitment involved.

But it is one saying in particular that has particular relevance for us:

"Foxes have holes and birds of the air have nests, but the Son of Man has nowhere to lay his head."

Jesus is reminding us that we are not called to build our *own* Kingdom, but *God's*.

We may wish to settle and remain stagnant but God may have other plans:

always calling us on to new things, to new ways, new challenges in building the Kingdom: new ways, new challenges that may not have been the ways and the challenges that we would have chosen.

Food for the soul ...

Jesus said, "No one who sets a hand to the plough & looks to what was left behind is fit for the kingdom of God." (Lk 9:62)

FOLLOWING JESUS—BE READY FOR SOME SURPRISES

Following Jesus is not without its surprises. It's best to be forewarned. Here's fair warning

Soren Kierkegaard once said that what Jesus wants is followers not admirers. He's right. To admire Jesus without trying to change our lives does nothing for Jesus or for us. Yet how exactly does one follow Jesus? Classically we have said that we do this by trying to imitate him. But that posits a further question:

How do we imitate Jesus?

A negative example might be useful here: some of us remember the "Jesus people" of the late 1960s, with their rather raw, literal approach to following Jesus. They tried to look like he looked. They put on flowing white robes, grew beards, walked bare-foot, and tried, in appearance and dress, to imitate the Jesus that centuries of Western artists painted for us. Obviously this is not what discipleship means, not only because we don't know what Jesus looked like (although we do know that he was not the fair-skinned, fair-haired young man of Western art), but, more importantly, because attempts to mimic Jesus' physical appearance miss the point of discipleship entirely.

More subtle is the attempt to imitate Jesus by trying to copy his actions. The algebra here works this way: Jesus did certain things, so we should do them too. He taught, healed, consoled the downtrodden, went off into the desert by himself, stayed up all night occasionally and prayed, and visited the homes of sinners. So we should do the same things: we should become teachers, nurses, preachers, counselors, monks, social workers, and non-judgmental friends to the less-than-pious. In this view, imitation is carrying on the actions of Jesus.

This kind of imitation, however valuable as ministry, still is not quite what is required in terms of real discipleship. In the end, it too misses the point because one can be preacher of the gospel and not really be imitating Jesus, just as one can be a truck driver (not something Jesus did) and be imitating him. True imitation is not a question of trying to look like Jesus, nor of trying to duplicate his actions.

What is it?

Perhaps one of the better answers to that question is given by John of the Cross, the great Spanish mystic. In his view, we imitate Jesus when we try to imitate his motivation, when we try to do things for the same reason he did. For him, that is how one "puts on Christ." We enter real discipleship when, like Jesus, we have as our motivation the

desire (*proper regnum Dei*) to draw all things into one—into one unity of heart, one family of love.

John of the Cross then offers some advice regarding how this can be done. We should begin, he says, by reading the scriptures and meditating the life on Jesus. Then we should pray to Christ and ask him to instill in us his desire, longing, and motivation. In essence, we should pray to Jesus and ask him to make us feel the way he felt while he was on earth.

Some surprises await us however, he points out, if we do this. Initially, when we first begin seriously to pray for this, we will fill with fervour, good feelings, a passion for goodness, & a warm sense of God's presence. We will feel that we feel like Jesus—and that will be a very good feeling indeed. However, if we persevere in our prayer & desire to imitate him, things will eventually change, and in a way that we least expect. The warm feelings, fervor, & passion—that snug feeling that we feel like Jesus—will disappear and be replaced by something infinitely less pleasant. We will begin to feel sterile, dispassionate, dry. God's presence will feel neither warm nor steady and we will be left wondering "what's wrong? How did I lose the way?"

But, as John of the Cross assures us, nothing is wrong. Rather our prayer has been answered. We prayed to Jesus, asking him to let us feel like he felt, and he granted our request. Exactly. For a large part of his life and ministry Jesus felt exactly as we are now feeling—dry, sterile, and not buoyed up by any warm feelings of God, even as he remained faithful in that darkness. Strange how it can feel, feeling like Jesus.

There's a fervour that comes from the wetness of fertility that can make the soul swell with feelings of creativity, warmth, and immortality. God is in that. But there is also an aridity that comes from a deeper place, a heat that threatens to dry out the very marrow of the soul, a dryness that shrinks all swelling, especially pride, and leaves us vulnerable and mortal by bringing the soul to kindling temperature. God is in that dryness no less than in the wetness of fertility because in that painful longing we feel the Eros of God and the motivation of Christ.


NEW SETS OF WEEKLY ENVELOPES

FR RICHARD ROHR OFM'S MEDITATION . . . EMOTIONAL MATURITY

Alcoholics Anonymous founder Bill Wilson (1895–1971) viewed emotional sobriety as where the Twelve Steps should finally lead. The goal is not simply to stop drinking, but to become a spiritually awakened person who has found some degree of detachment from their own emotional, narcissistic responses. How is it that all of us get so easily hooked, so easily snagged by often temporary or even irrational things?

Let me try to describe the process. The word "emotion" (from Latin *emovere*) means a movement. It's a body-based reaction in the moment that snags me immediately and urgently and feels like "me." Some people say we should call emotions "narcissistic reactions," and we have to recognize that they largely are! Since the body carries all our shame, our childhood conditioning and memories, our guilt, and our previous hurts, the addictive patterns of our emotions can be very hard to "unhook." Emotions feel like truth—but they're not necessarily.

That doesn't mean emotions should be ignored. They must be felt; their honest message must be heard. Only then can we release ourselves from their fascination over us. They are necessary weathervanes to help us read situations quickly and perhaps in depth. But they are also learned and practiced neural responses, often ego-based, which have little to do with truth and much more to do with the story lines we have learned and created. The ego loves to hold on to such emotions to justify itself, defend itself, and assert its power. There is nothing like an angry person to control an entire conversation!

Much of the work of emotional maturity is learning to distinguish between emotions that offer a helpful message about ourselves or the moment, and emotions that are merely narcissistic reactions to the moment. I dare to say that, until we have found our spiritual centre and ground, most of our emotional responses are usually too self-referential to be helpful or truthful. They read the moment as if the "I," with its immediate needs and hurts, is the reference point for objective truth. It isn't. The small, defensive "I" cannot hold that space. Reality/God/Creation holds that space. Persistent use of the small self as an objective reference point will only create deeper problems in the long run; it will not solve them.

If an emotion does not help us read a situation better and more truthfully, we must let it go—for our own well-being. Most of us are naturally good at attachment, but we have very little training in detachment or letting go. We must take the risk of legitimate attachment (fully feeling the emotion), learn its important message, and then have the presence and purpose to detach from that fascinating emotion after it has done its work. This is the gift and power of an emotionally mature person.

MEMORIAL ACCLAMATION

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NEVER CONFUSE

I recently happened on a letter Mother Thekla (Sharf), nun of Whitby, wrote to an imaginary convert to Orthodoxy. It probes the self-seeking that can lie hidden in religious aspirations — and indicates remedies. 'I have not been told why you are about to convert, but I assure you there is no point whatsoever if it is for negative reasons. Are you expecting a kind of earthly paradise with plenty of incense and the right kind of music? Do you expect to go straight to heaven if you cross yourself slowly, pompously and in the correct form from the right side? OR.... Have you feared Christ crucified?' This, Mother Thekla insisted, is the crunch. It's about resolving to believe, whatever happens, that Christ's redemptive work makes sense. And to act on it. That does not mean passive endurance, but it means constant vigilance, listening for what is demanded; and above all, love. Poor, old, sick, to our last breath, we can love. Not sentimental nonsense so often confused with love, but the love of sacrifice — inner crucifixion of greed, envy, pride. And never confuse love with sentimentality. And never confuse worship with affectation.'
