Hospitality. It's one of Jesus' favourite themes.

It appears in his parables AND it appears in his actions – eating and drinking with those who are considered to be not respectable, to be sinners. It's the theme of today's Gospel.

Hospitality is about who we share our table with -

- and Jesus constantly presents this image of a God who has room at the table for all those people who don't fit at normal tables.

The question which this Gospel presents is whether we live in the image of the God we claim to believe in:

whether our hearts are marked by hospitality – an ability to have an open heart toward those who are not considered respectable, who are labelled as sinners, who are on the fringe, not part of the mainstream (that 'mainstream' which is so valued in contemporary Australian culture and politics as the criterion for all that is acceptable).

Jesus proclaimed the hospitality of God. As his disciples, as his Church we've often failed to live up to that image in the past. What will we do in our present? Fr Colin

# Food for the soul ... For every one who exalts himself will be humbled, but the one who humbles himself will be exalted. (Lk 14:11) STRUGGLING WITH OUR OWN INADEQUACY

It is hard to measure up. In our lucid moments we admit the evil I want to avoid, I end up doing! this. Rarely is there a day when we could not echo the following words by Anna Blaman:

I realized that it was simply impossible for a human being to be and remain good or pure. For instance, if I wanted to be attentive in one direction, it could only be at the cost of neglecting another. If I gave my heart to one thing, it left another in the cold. No day and no hour go by without my being guilty of inadequacy. We never do enough, and what we do is never well enough done, except being inadequate, which we are good at because that is the way we are made. This is true of me and of everyone else.

Every day and every hour brings with it its weight of moral guilt, as regards my work and my relations with others. I am constantly catching myself out in my human failings and, in spite of their being implied in my human imperfection, I am conscious of a sort of check. And this means that my human shortcomings are also my human the Eucharist. guilt. It sounds strange that we should be guilty where we can do nothing about it. But even where there is no set purpose, no deliberate intention, we have a conviction of our own shortcomings, and of consensual guilt, a guilt which shows itself all too clearly in the consequences of what we have done or left undone.

Henri Nouwen occasionally expressed similar feelings: There is a nagging sense that there are unfinished tasks, unfulfilled promises, unrealized proposals. There is always something else that we should have remembered, done or said. There are always people we did not speak to, write to, or visit. Thus, although we are very busy, we also have a lingering feeling of never really fulfilling our obligations. A gnawing sense of being unfulfilled underlies our filled lives. Jesus, the Eucharist and the Liturgy of the Hours, regularly

When we are in touch with ourselves, we can relate to these words, these expressions of inadequacy. At the end of the day, we cannot measure up and cannot not disappoint others and ourselves. Generally the fault is not that we are not sincere or that we do not put out the effort. The fault is that we are human. We have limited resources, we get tired, we experience feelings we cannot control, have only 24 hours in our day, have too many demands on us, have wounds and weaknesses that shackle us, and thus we know exactly what St. Paul meant when he said: woe, to me, wretch that I am, the good I want to do, I cannot do; and

That may sound negative, neurotic, and stoic, and it can be those things, but, appropriated properly, it can generate hope and renewed energy in our lives. To be human is to be inadequate, by definition. Only God is adequate and the rest of us can safely say to ourselves: fear not you are inadequate! But a God who made us this way surely gives us the slack, the forgiveness, and the grace we need to work with such a state. Personally, I take consolation from the gospel parable of the ten bridesmaids who, while waiting for the bridegroom, all fell asleep, the wise and the foolish alike. Even the wise were too human and too weak to stay awake the whole time. Nobody does it perfectly and accepting this, our congenital inadequacy, can bring us to a healthy humility and perhaps even to a healthy humor about it.

But it should bring us to something more: prayer, especially

The Eucharist is, among other things, a vigil of waiting. When Jesus instituted the Eucharist he told the disciples to keep celebrating it until he returned again. A biblical scholar, Gerhard Lofink, puts it this way: the early apostolic communities cannot be understood outside of the matrix of intense expectation. They were communities imminently awaiting Christ's return. They gathered in Eucharist, among other reasons, to foster and sustain this awareness, namely, that they were living in wait, waiting for Christ to return.

I try to celebrate Eucharist every day. I do this because I am a priest and part of the covenant a priest makes with the church at his ordination is to pray the priestly prayer of for the world. But I do it too, more personally, for another reason: The older I get, the less confident, in some ways, I am becoming. I don't always know whether I'm following Christ properly or even know exactly what it means to follow Christ, and so I stake my faith on an invitation that Jesus left us on the night before he died: To break bread and drink wine in his memory and to trust that this, if all else is uncertain, is what we should be doing while we wait for him to return.

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### MATERNITY

Not long ago, I had occasion to remark that society increasingly lacks a conceptual framework for behaviour geared towards the supernatural. In Norway, during last year's lockdown, it became apparent that the law had no way of categorising worship as a distinct form of human activity. It was classed alongside tango classes and bingo nights.

A recent article by Andrea Mrozek observes that the natural, too, is being phased out of public discourse. Referring to a report in The National Post, she notes that female athletes now risk finding pregnancy listed in their contracts under 'injuries'. Her example comes from Canada. The trend it represents seems universal. Mrozek writes: 'We don't have a category for [women having children]. We struggle with how to make special arrangements around it, and frankly, whether to do so at all. Pregnancy and childbearing are confusing propositions today', increasingly seen 'as something that inhibits real life rather than contributes to it.'

# FR RICHARD ROHR OFM'S MEDITATION . . . FREEDOM FROM OUR PASSIONS

Blessed are the pure of heart; for they shall see God-Mt.5:8 fully alive and engaged, the Desert tradition saw passion as Episcopal priest and CAC teacher emerita Cynthia a diminishment of being. It meant falling into passivity, into Bourgeault writes of the difference between our modern a state of being acted upon (which is what the Latin passio understanding of emotions and the teachings of the Desert actually means), rather than clear and conscious Fathers and Mothers:

In the psychological climate of our own times, our emotions are almost always considered to be virtually identical with our personal authenticity, and the more freely they flow, the more we are seen to be honest and "in touch." A person who gravitates to a mental mode of operation is criticized for being "in his head"; when feeling dominates, we proclaim with approval that such a person is "in his heart."

In the Wisdom tradition, this would be a serious misuse of the term heart. Far from revealing the heart, Wisdom journey of spiritual life....[1] teaches that the emotions are in fact the primary culprits Bourgeault describes contemplation and letting go as the that obscure and confuse it. The real mark of personal authenticity is not how intensely we can express our feelings but how honestly we can look at where they're heart to its organ of spiritual seeing, becomes supremely, in coming from and spot the elements of clinging, manipulation, and personal agendas that make up so much of what we experience as our emotional life today....

In the teachings of the Christian Desert Fathers and to let go, to sacrifice ... your personal drama, the letting go Mothers, these intense feelings arising out of personal issues at that level, so that you can begin to see. [2] were known as the "passions," and most of the Desert spiritual training had to do with learning to spot these land mines and get free of them before they did serious psychic damage. In contrast to our contemporary usage, which tends to see passion as a good thing, indicating that one is

engagement. Instead of enlivening the heart, according to one Desert Father, the real damage inflicted by the passions is that "they divide our heart into two."...

The heart, in the ancient sacred traditions, has a very specific and perhaps surprising meaning. It is not the seat of our personal affective life-or even, ultimately, of our personal identity-but an organ for the perception of divine purpose and beauty....

Finding the way to where our true heart lies is the great

pathway back to the heart's wholeness:

The core practice for cleansing the heart, for restoring the Christianity, the path of kenosis, of letting go. The seeing will come, and it's a part we still have to work on in Christianity, but the real heart of emotion is the willingness
