In today's Gospel Luke continues to draw together some of Jesus' reflections on what discipleship involves. As Jesus sends the 72 out on their first mission we can draw several messages for ourselves:

- * *he sends them in pairs:* discipleship is not something we can do on our own. *We're called to be community, to be Church.* For a Christian, the journey to God must involve a journey to others; and with others.
- * he tells them to 'carry no purse, no haversack, no sandals': discipleship involves having an unencumbered heart that there is <u>one</u> God in our life, not many.
- * 'stay in the same house' in other words, don't shop around for where your heart and your service will be given. Do we constantly need to be entertained as we are trained to be by the media so that unless we are our heart and our attention and our commitment wanders? And yet discipleship is about doing the same thing for a lifetime: keeping focussed following the Gospel because it's enriching, not because it's entertaining.

Are these the marks of our own discipleship?

Food for the soul ... "Yet know this: the kingdom of God is at hand." (Lk 10:11) BREAKING THE EUCHARISTIC BREAD

There is a parable that I heard some years ago from John the gates. Shea about a Cretan peasant. It runs this way:

There once lived a peasant in Crete who deeply loved his him, lay all of Crete! life. He enjoyed tilling the soil, feeling the warm sun on his naked back as he worked the fields, and feeling the soil under his feet. He loved the planting, the harvesting, and the very smell of nature. He loved his wife and his family and his friends, and he enjoyed being with them, eating with them, drinking wine, talking, and making love. And he loved especially Crete, his tiny, beautiful country! The earth, the sky, the sea, it was his! This was his home.

One day he sensed that death was near. What he feared was not what lay beyond, for he knew God's goodness and had lived a good life. No, he feared leaving Crete, his wife, his children, his friends, his home, and his land. Thus, as he prepared to die, he grasped in his right hand a few grams soil from his beloved Crete and he told his loved ones to bury him with it.

He died, awoke, and found himself at heaven's gates, the soil still in his hand, and heaven's gate firmly barred against him. Eventually St Peter emerged through the gates and spoke to him: "you've lived a good life, and we've a Buddhism suggests that everything that is wrong the world place for you inside, but you cannot enter unless you drop can be explained in one image, that of the group photo. that handful of soil. The man was reluctant to drop the soil and protested: first looks how he or she turned out and, only afterwards, "Why? Why must I let go of this soil? When Jesus gave us the Eucharist, he left it to us with the words: receive, give thanks, break, and share. With these words, he was referring to a lot more than ritual and rubrics for the reception of the Eucharist at a liturgy. How do we break so as to become a Eucharistic person? Parable and story can touch deep affective levels in us and move us in rationally inexplicable ways, and so a story of this kind shouldn't be given too much explanation. It should be more an object for meditation than explanation. Nonetheless, a tiny application might be helpful.

RECONCILIATION

JUNC 22

This evening the World Meeting of Families began in Rome. What impressed me most was the testimony of Paul and Germaine Balenza, a couple from Congo, married since 1995. Twenty-six years into marriage, Germaine discovered that her husband, a public figure, had been unfaithful. 'I felt', she said, 'that power had gone to his head, that he was no longer interested in me.' She left him, and set about publicly shaming him on social media. It was a miserable time for both. With the help of a Catholic couple, Paul began to do serious work on himself. Germaine was drawn into the process. 'We were able', she says, 'to tell each other hard truths, to empty our hearts of hatred and anger.' Gradually, they resolved, in Christ's name, to be reconciled. They assembled their families and asked forgiveness of their children; then, in church, they renewed their marriage vows. We sometimes place the ideal of a Christian family on such a pedestal that it seems to be unreachable – or even to vanish into the realm of fiction. Mr and Mrs Balenza, meanwhile, tell a story that fits into a Biblical paradigm, where families as a norm are dysfunctional and for that reason display the work of grace palpably and credibly. Paul and Germaine remind us with authority that the world can begin anew even when all seems lost.
