Food for the spirit.... This week's appointment with the Doctor...



Pope Leo recently named St John Henry Newman, the famous 19th century convert from the Church of England to the Catholic Church, a Doctor of the Church - becoming one of the only 38 members of the Church in its 2000 year history to receive that title.

'Doctor' in this context comes from the original Latin meaning of that word - 'Teacher'. The Doctors of the Church are saints whose exemplary wisdom has been judged to offer a perennial teaching to the Church well beyond their own context and time.

The Catholic bishops of England and Wales have released a series of six short articles which explore the life, wisdom and teaching of St John Henry Newman, Doctor of the Church. We are publishing them here each week....

Part V: Scripture, the Fathers and Ecumenism

The philosophical and theological thought and the spirituality of Cardinal Newman, so deeply rooted in and enriched by Sacred Scripture and the teachings of the Fathers, still retain their originality and value. As a leading figure of the Oxford Movement, and later as a promoter of authentic renewal in the Catholic Church, Newman is seen to have a special ecumenical vocation, not only for his own country, but also for the whole Church.[1].

Newman is at first sight an improbable ecumenist. His most famous work is an autobiographical account of how he became to believe that the Church of England was "not part of the Catholic Church", and that the Roman Catholic Church by contrast was "the one fold of Christ".[2]

After his conversion he could and did publish dismissive statements about Anglicanism that were wounding to his former Anglican friends. But at a more fundamental level, Newman was a bridge figure between Catholicism and Anglicanism. His Apologia pro Vita Sua insisted on the reality and permanent value of his teenage Evangelical conversion, and the book is pervaded by affection and gratitude for the Anglican mentors from whom he learned and deepened his Christian faith. More fundamentally, he never abandoned the historical, scriptural and patristic studies that shaped his Anglican writings. His 1866 open Letter to Pusey formulated a rich Marian theology based entirely on Scripture and patristic rather than the pious legends writings, emotion that partly extravagant characterised nineteenth-century Catholic Mariology. That reliance on Scripture and the Fathers would prove fruitful for

the twentieth-century movement, "nouvelle theologie," which helped revitalise Catholic theology, and influenced the theological idiom of the Second Vatican Council – for instance, the chapter in *Lumen Gentium* on the role of Mary in salvation history owes a great deal to Newman's example.

That same patristic emphasis had informed one of Newman's most important Anglican writings, the 1837 Lectures on Justification, intended as a distinctive Anglican alternative to the standoff between polarised Catholic and Lutheran theologies of Justification. In them Newman deployed instead the Greek patristic notion of deification, making the indwelling presence of Christ through the Holy Spirit the agent of Justification, breaking an impasse and greatly influencing modern Roman Catholic / Lutheran dialogue.

But perhaps Newman's greatest contribution to Ecumenism is the extraordinary fact that after his conversion, instead of repudiating his Anglican writings, he republished most of them, with only minor changes, a body of work shaped by Anglican theological method, which has proved a new and fertilising force for the ongoing renewal of Catholic theology.

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A reflection for the Second Sunday of Advent

Integral to the season of Advent is the person and ministry of John the Baptist. He was, in every way, a strange character. His clothing was made of animal hair. He ate locusts and wild honey for breakfast, lunch, and dinner. He spent much of his time in the wilderness, far from human company. When he came to town—that is, to where people lived—it was usually to scream at the top of his lungs, calling everyone to repentance in preparation for the coming of the Messiah.

No one was spared. He challenged the soldiers and the tax collectors. He called out the Pharisees and the Sadducees. Not even the commoners were exempt. While many of them were pious, some were not. And none were free from sin. John the Baptist was intolerant of sin and even less patient with hypocrites. His invitation to everyone was simple: produce fruits as evidence of righteousness.

We appreciate John the Baptist better when we understand his mission in relation to the ministry of the promised Messiah, whose coming he dedicated his entire life to heralding. John knew what the coming of the Messiah meant for his people, who at that time were languishing under an oppressive Roman regime. He was deeply concerned about the pervasiveness of injustice in the land, especially the suffering of the poor—those at the receiving end of military brutality, extortion, and all other forms of dehumanisation. He was saddened that so many of his people had abandoned the path of righteousness and had succumbed to despair. Above all, he understood the urgency of his mission. He was preparing the way for



the Messiah, the only true king of justice & prince of peace.

In this season of Advent, the church presents John the Baptist to us as a model. John teaches us that waiting for the coming of Christ is not merely a joyful expectation—it is also careful preparation. It requires a commitment to making the world more just for everyone. It involves fearlessly challenging the structures of sin and oppression. Often, it means standing courageously against abusive power, protesting if necessary. Most importantly, it demands that our lives, at every moment, embody the fullness of the gospel of Christ, especially its emphasis on love, justice, mercy, and peace.

John the Baptist's total commitment to his mission as the herald of the Messiah is therefore very instructive. Pope Francis reminds us, in his 2013 apostolic exhortation *Evangelii Gaudium (The Joy of the Gospel)* that, through our baptism, God has called us all to be missionary disciples. This means that, like John the Baptist, everything about us must point to the Christian message. It is not enough to proclaim the gospel with our lips; we must live it.

As in the Baptist's time, our world today faces a myriad of challenges. Many parts of the world experience violent crises: Nigeria, Sudan, Ukraine, Israel-Palestine. Numerous people continue to live under repressive regimes & inhuman conditions. We must never forget that we are the hands, feet, & voice of Jesus to a world desperately in need of peace, justice, & mercy. The good news is not just the imminence of justice & peace, but that it is through our lives that God's justice & peace will flourish.

Brain studies have shown that we may be hardwired to focus on problems at the expense of a positive vision. The human brain wraps around fear and problems like Velcro. We dwell on bad experiences

Richard Rohr explores how our brains are wired to hold increase authentic spirituality is to deliberately onto negativity, and how contemplative practice helps us choose positivity instead: practice actually enjoying a positive response and a grateful heart. And the benefits are very real. By following through on conscious choices, we can to focus on problems at the expense of a positive New responses toward love, trust, and patience. Neuroscience calls this neuroplasticity. This is how we increase our bandwidth of freedom, and it is surely

vision. The human brain wraps around leaf with problems like Velcro. We dwell on bad experiences long after the fact and spend vast amounts of energy anticipating what might go wrong in the future. Conversely, positivity and gratitude and simple happiness slide away like cheese on hot Teflon. Studies like the ones done by the neuropsychologist Rick Hanson show that we must consciously hold on to a positive thought or feeling for a minimum of fifteen seconds before it leaves any imprint in the neurons. The whole dynamic, in fact, is called the Velcro/Teflon model of the mind. We are more attracted to the problem than to the solution, you might say.

Please don't simply take me at my word. Watch your own brain and emotions. You will quickly see there is a toxic attraction to the "negative," whether it's a situation at work, a bit of incriminating gossip you overheard, or a sad development in the life of a friend. True freedom from this tendency is fined we are ruled by automatic "control." Many of us just call it "contemplation."




