

THOUGHTS ON KEEPING LENT FROM POPE FRANCIS

1. REMEMBER CHRIST'S POVERTY

.... "confront" the destitution of "our brothers and sisters" and "take practical steps to alleviate it."

(from Pope Francis' 2014 Lenten message)

2. FIGHT THE "GLOBALISATION OF INDIFFERENCE"

The love of God breaks through that fatal withdrawal into ourselves which is indifference."

"Indifference to our neighbour and to God ...represents a real temptation for us Christians. Each year during Lent we need to hear once more the voice of the prophets "During this season of conversion, let us renew our faith, who cry out and trouble our conscience

Pope Francis called for the places "where the Church is present" to "become islands of mercy in the midst of the sea of indifference.

3. GOD'S BOUNDLESS MERCY CAN HELP US BE MERCIFUL IN TURN

"God's mercy transforms human hearts; it enables us, through the experience of a faithful love, to become merciful in turn."

(from Pope Francis' 2016 Lenten message)

4. THE IMPORTANCE OF SPENDING TIME WITH THE WORD OF GOD

"Lent is a favourable season for deepening our spiritual life through [...] fasting, prayer and almsgiving. At the basis of everything is the word of God, which during this season we are invited to hear and ponder more deeply," 'At the root of all [the rich man's] ills was the failure to heed God's word. [...] The word of God is alive and powerful, capable of converting hearts and leading them back to God.'

(from Pope Francis' 2017 Lenten message)

5. REMEMBER THE REDEMPTION OF CREATION

Lent is a time to renew our care for God's creation and to review what we do to respect and protect the environment. (Pope Francis' 2019 Lenten message)

6. LENT IS A PERIOD FOR CONVERSION

Lent is always a "favourable time for our conversion," which "should never be taken for granted."

Jesus' Easter "is not a past event; rather, through the

power of the Holy Spirit it is ever present, enabling us to see and touch with faith the flesh of Christ in those who suffer," he said.

Prayer is thus essential during Lent as it is "a heartfelt dialogue between friends" and an expression of our need to respond to God's love which always precedes and sustains us.

7. RENEWING OUR FAITH, HOPE AND LOVE AS WE PREPARE FOR EASTER

draw from the "living water" of hope, and receive with open hearts the love of God, who makes us brothers and sisters in Christ,"

8. "LET US NOT GROW TIRED OF DOING GOOD"

Let us not grow tired of doing good, for in due time we shall reap our harvest, if we do not give up. So then, while we have the opportunity (kairós), let us do good to all (Galatians 6:9~10).

"Lent invites us to conversion, to a change in mindset, so that life's truth and beauty may be found not so much in possessing as in giving, not so much in accumulating as in sowing and sharing goodness,"

9. LENT AS A MOMENT OF ASCENSION AND **TRANSFIGURATION**

"During Lent we are invited to ascend "a high mountain" in the company of Jesus and to live a particular experience of spiritual discipline - ascesis as God's holy people," Pope Francis also encouraged us to "listen to Jesus" by attending the liturgy and studuing the Bible.

He also underlined the similarities between the Synod on Synodality and Lent. In his message Pope Francis explained how the "Lenten journey of penance and the journey of the Synod alike have as their goal a transfiguration, both personal and ecclesial."

AN UPDATE ON OUR PARISH FINANCES

During the week our Parish Finance Committee had its first meeting of the year..

Our concern is that our income is not keeping pace with our outgoings. In the first place, like everyone else, the parish faces the pressures of the rising cost of living. Our collections have not risen with it.

We have a wonderful parish and, backed by our fantastic parish team, many good things are happening. But they can't continue happening if our income doesn't keep pace with expenditure. As an example, as a just and Christian employer our parish always ensures that its staff salaries keep pace with the rising cost of living. But we need everyone's help to match that.

Another challenge was that while we hoped that the income from the Killara development would supplement our normal income and allow even greater parish endeavours and ministry, the project only came online after the pandemic when many people sadly did not return to the practice of their faith. Our regular weekly income has of course suffered significantly from that to the extent that the income from the development is being in good part swallowed up in simply replacing that lost income. Indeed if the development had not taken place we would be in deep trouble! Ideally though, it should be helping us move forward, not merely to tread water!

Please consider whether you could give even just a little more each week on our two collections each week. It could make the world of difference!

ANNOUNCING THE NEW PRIEST TO JOIN US IN OUR PARISH: A LETTER FROM BISHOP ANTHONY

Very Rev Fr Colin Blayney PP VF Parish of Lindfield-Killara 15 February 2024



To the People of God in the Parish of Lindfield-Killara, Diocese of Broken Bay

Dear Fr Colin and my sisters and brothers in the Parish community of Lindfield-Killara,

As I announced to the Diocese in July 2023, the Holy Father, Pope Francis, has appointed me to the ministry and office of Apostolic Administrator of the Personal Ordinariate of the Southern Cross in Australia, and its communities (known also as Missions). The Personal Ordinariate of Our Lady of the Southern Cross (OLSC) was erected by Pope Benedict XVI on 15 June 2012. Ours was the third Personal Ordinariate to be erected as a pathway for former Anglicans to enjoy the fulness of communion in the Catholic Church. Equally, as all Catholics may worship in any Catholic parish, the doors of the Ordinariate are open to any and all within the Catholic Church. The Ordinariate's mission is particularly experienced in its celebration of liturgy, which draws upon the richness of the English Anglican traditions of worship while holding to Catholic doctrinal, sacramental, and liturgical norms. Through Divine Worship: The Missal — the liturgical form used for Mass by the three Ordinariates in England, Canada & USA, and Australia—the Ordinariate shares its distinctive commitment to praising God in the eloquence of the English language, liturgical prayer, and patrimony. Since taking up my responsibility as Apostolic Administrator, I have been discerning how best to provide pastoral support to the OLSC which extends to all of Australia, Guam, and Japan, & exercise my role as Shepherd to the People of God in our Diocese of Broken Bay. In fact, this dual responsibility highlights something of the essential character of the Catholic Church. The Church exists as a bond of communion between many different ecclesial communities. Being both the Bishop of Broken Bay and the Apostolic Administrator of the Personal Ordinariate of the Southern Cross brings these two ecclesial entities into a tangible co-existence, whilst maintaining the autonomy and character of both.

As one particular expression of this ecclesial co-existence, I have been in dialogue with Fr Colin Blayney, Parish Priest of Lindfield-Killara Parish about the possibility of the Vicar General of the OLSC, Very Rev Dr Stephen Hill, being resident in the presbytery at Killara, and ministering to the people of the Parish.

I extend my gratitude to Fr Colin for his receptivity to this consideration, and for his engagement with the Parish Pastoral Council introducing the OLSC and Fr Stephen. I convey my appreciation to the members of the Parish Pastoral Council for their own openness to this development and for the ways in which they have been discussing how they can further welcome this opportunity. Residing at Killara, Fr Stephen will be able to gather the Community of St Bede from various parts of Greater Sydney, for its Sunday celebration of Eucharist whilst being available for active participation in the life of the Parish of Lindfield-Killara. To assist this coexistence, I have drawn up a detailed Memorandum of Understanding so that the character, rights, and responsibilities of both the Ordinariate and the Parish are fully respected through a mutual covenant of understanding. I know that Fr Stephen is very much

I am confident that this development will bring a special pastoral opportunity to the Parish of Lindfield-Killara and commend it to the whole community and to your prayers.

WELCOMING THE NEW PRIEST TO JOIN US: FR STEPHEN HILL

Following on from Bishop Anthony's letter to us (on page 5) I would like to extend a warm welcome on behalf of us all to Fr Stephen Hill who will soon join us. However as Fr Stephen's role is a little different I thought it would be helpful to give you a little more background to the 'Ordinariate of Our Lady of the Southern Cross'.

An 'Ordinariate' is very much like a Diocese, except that unlike a diocese it doesn't have physical borders. For example in many countries there will be a 'Military Ordinariate', whereby the members of the armed forces belong to that 'diocese' regardless of the geographical diocese where their current posting places them, and are ministered to by the bishop and the priests of the Military Ordinariate.

Some years ago Pope Benedict XVI established the possibility of an Ordinariate whereby former members of the Anglican Church who sought to be received into the Catholic Church could retain many of the traditions and liturgical forms of their Anglican heritage while embracing the faith of the Catholic Church. We might be familiar with the 'Maronite Rite' to which many of a Lebanese heritage belong. It is fully part of the Roman Catholic Church but has its own distinct liturgical rites ~ the belief and theology are the same, the outward form varies. If your neighbour is a Maronite Catholic, they might live next door but they are in an entirely different diocese led by an entirely different bishop! Such is the rich tapestry of the Catholic Church.

The Ordinariate established by Pope Benedict now exists the Australia-Pacific region under the title of the Ordinariate of the Southern Cross. Last year Pope Francis appointed our Bishop Anthony Randazzo as Apostolic Administrator (essentially 'bishop') of the Ordinariate in addition to, and quite distinct from, his role as Bishop of Broken Bay. As in any diocese, the Bishop appoints a priest to be Vicar General to assist him (just as in addition to his role as Parish Priest of Chatswood, Fr David Ranson is Vicar General in Broken Bay).

And this brings us to our welcome to Fr Stephen Hill - who is Vicar General of the Ordinariate of Our Lady of the Southern Cross. Following the expiration of Fr Thomas' term as our Assistant Priest, Bishop Anthony proposed to me that Fr Stephen might reside in the presbytery at Killara (which would of course remain entirely and permanently the property of the parish) and carry out his ministry to the people of the Ordinariate by, amongst their things, celebrating Mass in the rite of the Ordinariate in our Killara church each Sunday afternoon.

While he would therefore not technically be an Assistant Priest in our parish (since he belongs not to Broken Bay but to the Ordinariate) Fr Stephen would in fact exercise that role in everything but name. In terms of population the Ordinariate is in fact very small and Fr Stephen would welcome a deep involvement in the life of our parish in addition to his Ordinariate ministry.

I personally felt that this appointment would be a great enrichment to our parish and that Fr Stephen would continue and build on the wonderful ministry of Fr Thomas as Assistant Priest in our combined parish of Lindfield-Killara. Our Parish Pastoral Council and our Parish Finance Committee also expressed strong support for the appointment of Fr Stephen. Bishop Anthony has therefore this weekend formally appointed Fr Stephen as Priest-in Residence' in our parish, with responsibility for the Ordinariate community, but on the understanding that Fr Stephen will be fully part of our Mass celebrant roster across the two churches in our parish - and more than that will assist me generally and widely in ministry in our beautiful parish. Indeed Fr Stephen has expressed great excitement and enthusiasm for that.

Fr Stephen will take up his appointment on 18th March and so will be with us in time to join us in our Easter celebrations. I know that you will make him warmly welcome. And while the small Ordinariate community will gather at a different time of day to us I hope that we will find many ways to make them welcome as adopted sisters and brothers in our parish.

Just to be clear - Fr Stephen's appointment as Priest-in-Residence is to our *whole*, combined parish of Lindfield-Killara (as of course was Fr Thomas as Assistant Priest) even though his residence will be adjacent to our Killara church.

I hope you will join me in embracing this new dimension in our life as a parish. While we of course will miss Fr Thomas, I'm sure new adventures lie ahead of us as we welcome Fr Stephen's ministry amongst us. Fr Colin

Please mark this date in your diary and please be part of this important opportunity for us as a parish to listen, discuss, discern and make plans.




