We are an Easter people and we are living in the Easter Season. What does that mean for our lives?

The word 'Easter' comes from 'Oestre', the Anglo-Saxon goddess of fertility, of Spring. The Christians of England retained that pagan name for their greatest feast because of the appropriateness of the connotations within it: Easter celebrates a new springtime for the world through the resurrection of Jesus.

And that resurrection proclaims the Father's validation of the message of Jesus, that religion and indeed life itself is about more than slavish following of laws and regulations as espoused by the Pharisees.

Easter proclaims the new springtime of a religion and of life to be lived out of love, not out of law; to be lived from the heart, not from a rulebook.

So let's be a people of that new springtime. Let's be an Easter people.

Reflecting on our Easter and its message for our lives.... Part V

We continue to print the various homilies by Fr Colin and Fr Stephen over the Easter Triduum in the hope that they may offer some food for thought during this Easter Season.

This week we print Fr Stephen's homily at the Easter Sunday......



Life is full of the unexpected.

Sometimes, the unexpected can bring us moments of great joy. Other times, it may bring great angst and even despair. But either way, it is part of life.

And I think we would all agree that life would be incredibly boring if only things that we expected ever happened to us.

Imagine that ~ every day, exactly what was expected happens and nothing else. Sounds like living one long "Groundhog Day" to me.

And so at the human level, what really defines us as human beings is not so much what unexpected events take place in our lives, but how we respond to the unexpected events of our life.

I had something unexpected happen to me this morning, which caused me to throw away the homily I was going to give you, and give you this one instead.

You see, you weren't expecting me to be here. I'm supposed to be at Killara now, not here at Lindfield.

I went over to the church early to set up, and have some time to pray.

Then, my phone unexpectedly rang.

The conversation went like this...

"Hello Stephen, It's Colin.

Happy Easter.

Cough Cough.

I've got COVID".

And so here I am at Lindfield.

This really got me thinking about the unexpectedness of Jesus himself.

I'm sure you can think of many unexpected events in the Bible that took place during the three years of Jesus' earthly ministry.

Jesus was not what many people expected.

Some people left Jesus because of the unexpectedness of Jesus.

Again, we see here that it is how people respond to unexpectedness that matters.

And then we think of the unexpectedness of the Resurrection. Jesus himself had told his disciples that he would rise on the third day, but I don't think anyone was actually expecting the tomb would be empty.

When we think about cemeteries - they are almost like places of pilgrimage - people will go there for various reasons. But no-one goes to a cemetery expecting to find an empty grave.

Yet this is exactly what ~ firstly the women ~ and then the disciples ~ are confronted with on that first Easter morn.


Yes - it is true, he has risen from the dead!

And so the disciples, they need to process this, they need to respond to it - how will they deal with the unexpectedness of the Resurrection?

We too might ask ourselves the same question - no matter whether this is our first Easter, or our fiftieth - we should never lose touch with the unexpectedness of the Resurrection.

How do we live out the unexpectedness of the Resurrection in our lives?



Gerry started his schooling at All Hallows Bathurst as a boarder and went to high school at St Ignatius College during which time the family moved to Sydney. As a boarder he embraced school life, playing rugby, rowing and joining the cadets. He continued his love of swimming and became the 1959 school swimming champion.

After school Gerry attended university and achieved two degrees in science. During the holidays he worked as a garden hand at Vaucluse House and after work spent time swimming in the harbour at Nielsen Park and at Bondi Beach.

After university Gerry obtained a position in 1970 with the International Wool Secretariat in London. He enjoyed travelling around England and Europe and gained much experience in the wool industry. He also spent time holidaying with his Australian friends and it was on one of these holidays to Europe he met Sue, a nurse who was also working in London.

On Gerry's return to Australia he worked for the CSIRO for a short time before obtaining a position with the Department Trade in Canberra. Gerry and Sue were married in Sydney in 1973. They settled in Canberra where Emma and David were born.

In 1979 the family returned to Sydney to be closer to family. Gerry started to work for the Meat and Livestock Corporation and rented a home in Killara. It was at this time the family had their first introduction to Killara Parish but six months later the family moved to Pymble. Their son Stephen was born in 1981. Gerry obtained a position with Sydney Ports Authority and visited and negotiated with many New South Wales exporters in the agricultural industry. He remained there until his retirement.

In 1993 the family moved to Lindfield and in 2005 with two children living overseas and with Gerry nearing retirement, he and Sue downsized to a smaller home in Killara and rejoined the Killara Parish. Gerry was always willing to help out and for a couple of years organised the raffle at the annual Church Fete. He was a reader and helped with the collection at Mass.

In retirement Gerry liked to keep healthy and active and was very fond of going to the gym, bushwalking and of course continuing his love of swimming. He was a regular and well liked member of West Pymble pool and gym and as his health declined he was always grateful for the care and assistance he received from his trainers and swimming companion, Gary.

Gerry was a loving and devoted husband, father. and grandfather. With all the children now living back in Sydney he was never happier than getting together with family, especially to celebrate special occasions. He was delighted at the arrival of his two granddaughters in 2020 and was a proud and adoring Grandad. He had a kind and gentle nature and had the ability to make friends throughout his life.




