# OUR COMING RETURN TO THE GREAT GIFT OF THE EUCHARIST:

AN UPDATE

After our long separation from the Eucharist and from one another as a community the day draws nearer to both separations coming to an end.

Here's an outline of the next steps on the journey:

• Weekday Mass will resume on Monday 25th October and so our first gathering for the Sunday Eucharist will be on the weekend of 30th-31st October. Hurrahl We're so looking forward to seeing you! (though a caveat—this date is predicated on when 80% vaccination is achieved—if that were to be delayed then the return of Sunday (and weekday) Mass could be one week later than advised here)

From then until the end of November the capacity of our churches will be set by the one person per four square metres rule and so to ensure that we have space for everyone the weekend Masses at Lindfield over those five weeks will be in MacKillop Hall adjacent to the church. Masses at Killara will of course be in the church.

#### There will be no need to book for Mass.

During that five week period the public health order requires:

- that masks be worn in church
- that everyone 'signs in' using either the QR code or the sheet provided. It is no longer legal to write your name and details on a sheet. If you do not have a smart phone please see page 3 for details for obtaining a personal QR code.
- that everyone sanitises their hands upon entry

During this period singing will not be permitted, though we will of course ensure that music is provided at our celebrations as we have done in the past.

Regrettably, the NSW government has decided not to require proof of vaccination to attend Mass during this period.

Please note that the parish will no longer provide face masks since this has come at a considerable cost, and also because everyone now carries face masks because of their widespread requirement. Please don't forget to bring your face mask with you to Mass.

- from this Monday 11th October our two churches will re-open for private prayer. The hours of opening are given on page 2. During this initial period anyone visiting the church must wear a mask, sanitise their hands and check in with the QR code. Weddings and funerals with up to 50 people attending may take place, though all must be fully vaccinated.
- as of **Monday 25th October** weekday Masses will resume being celebrated (on weekdays the Masses at Lindfield will be in the church).
- the celebration of **baptism** will also resume once the 80% target is reached. If you would like to organise the baptism of your child for November or December please contact Alison (alison@lindfieldkillara.org.au)
- we won't resume our non-liturgical face to face gatherings for a little while yet. Thus our various online parish groups will continue meeting in that forum at this stage until the end of the year.
- from 1st December onwards most restrictions will be eased or reduced and so:
  - singing will return to our celebrations
  - our capacity will increase to one person per two square metres (the same as before we went into lockdown) and so we'll have plenty of space. Sunday Masses at Lindfield return to the church.

Let's work together to re-build, renew and re-create our community of faith.

### WHAT IS THE PLACE OF MARY AND THE SAINTS IN OUR FAITH? PART VIII

#### Local celebrations

In addition to the pattern of feasts outlined above we should note that local communities may also have their own celebrations which assume a particular importance in that One type of celebration stands out: community. celebration of the patron saint. The celebration of the patron saint of a parish is obviously one of the most important days in the life of a parish community. This is the day of that member of the Communion of Saints which this community has been given to be their particular model and example. The day of the patron saint is observed as a Solemnity within the parish, regardless of the rank of the feast on the universal calendar of the Church. Thus, the celebration of the Immaculate Heart of Mary is only an Optional Memoria on the universal calendar. But in our parish it is a Solemnity and should be observed with all the liturgical trappings of a Sunday. The Holy Family is a Feast on the universal calendar of the Church but has the rank of a Solemnity in our parish.

#### Conclusion

Hopefully all that has preceded can give some insight into our Christian tradition of 'feasting' - for it is the Gospel (literally 'Good News') that we claim to follow. The celebrations of Mary and the saints remind us that our belief in the resurrection leads to our belief in the Communion of Saints - that death does not break up the Christian community, but that rather the Church on earth and the Church in heaven are one communion, one community, of The celebrations of Mary and the other saints are joyful because we look to inspiration from their lives and support in our journey from their prayers.

Each of us also has to find a place in our hearts and our homes for our mother and brothers and sisters in the Communion of Saints; each of us has to find those celebrations which touch our hearts and speak to our lives, and then to *celebrate* them. As one of the Prefaces for celebrations of the saints prays: 'This great company of witnesses spurs us on to victory'. May we keep company with this great company, and allow them to help us to live the Gospel which they followed so well.

### FAQS AS OUR PARISH EMERGES FROM LOCKDOWN

### ♦ How many can now attend a funeral?

Despite the precipitate decision to double the number able to attend a funeral as of this Monday to 100, this number is subject to the one person per four square metre rule at present. Hence the number permissible in our Killara church will be 66 and at Lindfield 62. It is currently anticipated that we will move to the one person per two square metre rule as of the beginning of December.

In the first stage of the easing of restrictions these numbers are predicated on all people attending being fully vaccinated. If an unvaccinated person attends the permissible number drops to 10.

### • Will our Parish Office be opening?

Not at present. Our Parish Secretary, Philita, has been on leave without pay due to our reduced income (however supported by the government's disaster payment scheme) and will only return to work at the beginning of November. All our other parish staff continue to work, between office and home as they wish at this stage. Hence the physical office will have no set opening hours until at least the 80% vaccination rate is reached.

However our parish staff are still working for our parish, albeit remotely. The contact email addresses for all can be found in the staff directory in this bulletin and on the website.

### • Will our online Masses be continuing?

Our online *weekday* Masses will be discontinued once public weekday Masses resume. However our **Sunday** online Mass will continue - as it has since the advent of CoVid - for the sake of those who by reason of age or health are still unable to come to a public gathering. However, we hope that unless you are in that situation you will indeed come to our public celebrations of Mass where we can be together as a community of faith and share in the Eucharist in Holy Communion.

### What about Children's Liturgy of the Word?

Our *online* Children's Liturgy of the Word will come to and end once our public Sunday Masses resume (for dates see p.1). We are just clarifying whether we can immediately begin to hold 'live' Children's Liturgy of the Word as soon as Mass resumes. We'll let you know here in the bulletin next weekend.



### ABOUT SIGNING IN WHEN ATTENDING MASS

It is no longer legal to sign in on a sheet as an alternative to using a QR code.

If you do not have a smart phone you will need to obtain a personal QR code. These can be applied for online at https://www.service.nsw.gov.au/transaction/create-covid-19-check-card

The parish will be required to obtain a scanner for each church which can read the card.



### CAN YOU HELP US?

As you'll read on page 1, to ensure that we have sufficient total seating across our parish once public Mass resumes, the Masses at Lindfield will be celebrated in MacKillop Hall between the time public Mass resumes and when our capacity increases to one person per two square metres on 1st December.

This means we need teams rostered for about four weeks to set the chairs up in MacKillop Hall at 5pm each Saturday afternoon. Remember it's only for the first four or five weeks.

## REFLECTIONS ON THE EUCHARIST AS WE PREPARE TO GATHER AGAIN PART IV

### A Missioning and Commissioning:

The word 'Mass' is, when you stop and look at it, a seemingly strange word for the celebration of the Eucharist. Where does the word 'Mass' come from? It doesn't look anything like the words 'Eucharist, Communion, Supper, or anything like that.

In fact it comes from the final words of the celebration of the Eucharist in the old Latin rite: 'Ite **Missa** est', which is often translated 'Go ('ite'), the Mass ('missa') is ('est') ended (there's no word meaning 'ended' in the Latin phrase!). And it begs the point to render 'missa' as 'Mass' since the word 'Mass' was in fact derived from 'missa'!

So what does this ancient phrase actually say? Properly translated it says 'Go, it is sent' ('missa' meaning 'sent'). Well, what is sent? What is sent is everything that we have celebrated: the mystery of Jesus present amongst us, the communion and fellowship that it brings about us who share in the Eucharist, the sacrifice, the self-giving unto death of Jesus that gives birth to the Resurrection ~ all of this great mystery which is made present in, and celebrated in, the Eucharist is now SENT OUT into the world.

But HOW is it *sent* ('missa')? There's only one possible answer - in **us**, through **us**, who have participated in, shared in the Eucharist. This mystery of God's gracious self-giving is sent out **in us**.

As the Dominican, Fr Timothy Radcliffe, put it, the whole point of going to Mass is to be sent away. To take what we have been privileged to share in and to play our part in it touching the world around us.

This is the extraordinary thing - our uniquely Catholic word for the Eucharistic celebration (Mass) says that its whole purpose is to mission us, to commission us (both words of course also being derived from the Latin 'missa'). Pope Francis constantly reminds us that there's no point to our discipleship, to the Church, if we're not missionary, if we don't evangelise, if we don't bear the Good News we've been privileged to share in to the world around us. And the Eucharist, the high point of the Christian life, naturally both gives us that commission AND the grace to do it.

'I'm going to Mass.' Do we stop to think that what we're saying is 'I'm going to be missioned, I'm going to be commissioned, I'm going to be sent out'?

Can we bring this aspect of the Eucharist - our being called and empowered for mission - to our prayer this week as the day for our re-assembly draws nearer?

### FR RICHARD ROHR OFM'S MEDITATION: SEEING THINGS AS THEY TRULY ARE

Richard continues exploring Francis of Assisi's insights, pointing us beyond the "bird bath" spirituality for which Francis is too often known.

Francis of Assisi knew that the finite manifests the infinite, and the physical is the doorway to the spiritual. If we can accept this foundational principle we call "incarnation," then all we need is right here and right now - in this world. *This* is the way to *that*! Heaven includes earth and earth includes heaven. There are not sacred and profane things, places, and moments. There are only sacred and desecrated things, places, and moments - and it is *we alone* who desecrate them by our lack of insight and reverence. It is one sacred universe, and we are all a part of it. In terms of a spiritual vision, we really cannot get any better or simpler than that.

Franciscan spirituality emphasises a real equivalence & mutuality between the one who sees & what can be seen. What you see is what you are. There is a symbiosis between the mind & heart of the seer & what they pay attention to. Francis had a unique ability to call others—animals, plants, and elements—"brother" and "sister" because he himself was a little brother. He granted other beings and things mutuality, subjectivity, "personhood," and dignity because he first honoured his own dignity as a son of God. The world of things was a transparent two-way mirror for him, which some of us would call a fully "sacramental" universe.

#### As Franciscan sister Ilia Delio explains:

Francis came to realise that it is Christ who sanctifies creation and transforms it into the sacrament of God. The intimate link between creation and Incarnation revealed to Francis that the whole of creation is the place to encounter God. As his eyes opened to the holiness of creation, he came to see that there is nothing trivial or worthless. Rather, all created things point beyond themselves to their Creator....


[The Franciscan scholar] Bonaventure [c.1217–1274] describes the contemplative vision of Francis as "contuition," that is, seeing things for what they truly are in God. In his *Major Legend*, [Bonaventure] writes:


In beautiful things he [Francis] contuited Beauty itself and through the footprints impressed in things he followed his Beloved everywhere, out of them all making for himself a ladder through which he could climb up to lay hold of him who is utterly desirable.

.. He savoured in each and every creature ~ as in so many rivulets ~ that fontal Goodness, and . . . sweetly encouraged them to praise the Lord. [1]

These footprints of God impressed on the things of creation enabled Francis to find God wherever he went in the world, and finding God in the things of creation led him to the embrace of Jesus Christ, for Christ is the Word of God made visible in the world. [2]


There will of course be reduced parking on the outdoor Coles carpark and ultimately no parking there at all during the main construction phase which begins next year.




