Jesus preached a very different way of viewing life, of seeing people,

But within less than a generation his message began to be tamed, domesticated,

brought within the mainstream, its sting removed.

As the Beatitudes are proclaimed again this weekend it's our choice as to whether that demanding side of the Good News is going to find a place in our own life.

### COMMUNITY SAFETY AT OUR MASSES

Please be assured that we are doing all we can to ensure our gatherings are as safe as possible:

- We have temporarily suspended congregational singing once again.
- Holy Communion will only be distributed by Eucharistic ministers who have had their booster shot or who have been vaccinated so recently that they are ineligible for a booster at present.
- We ask that everyone sanitises their hands on arrival.
- We also ask, as per public health orders, that if you are feeling even mildly unwell that you do not attend.

Well it is rather personal since I actually tested positive for CoVid last Monday ~ which is why I'm not with you this weekend.

Having now seen that dreaded T line on a once-elusive RAT (on three of them in fact) my frustration at the situation that led to that line appearing got an extra boost this week. Moving from one of the lowest case-load rates in the world to one of the highest due to ill-conceived easing of sensible public health restrictions is a major reason why I was sick this week and why so many have been and will be sick ~ and worse still, why so many have died. All in the name of the supreme god of the modern pantheon ~ the economy. As if the economy, as Ross Gittins so often points out, was not from start to finish about **people!** 

A friend sent me a passionate article from *The Canber-ra Times* this week bewailing the effect that public policy is having on the most vulnerable. As Dr Blair Williams wrote:

"tying COVID-19 mortality so closely to 'underlying health conditions' diminishes the tragic loss of over 1000 Australians since the start of 2022....many vulnerable people feel they have been thrown under the bus. Jacinta Brennan, an at ~risk Canberran who cares for their terminally ill mother and lives with their sister who has cancer, told me the let-it-rip attitude is 'a real kick in the teeth' to vulnerable groups which has undone many of the sacrifices made over the past two years. Before the Omicron surge and after receiving their booster shots, Brennan and their family had been able to leave the house to have lunch or visit a museum, but now they can't even see their brother on his birthday. They've had to cancel medical appointments, and have started cutting their hair at home.

C Moore, a Canberran disability and health consumer advocate who is immunocompromised, has also been severely impacted by this rhetoric, disclosing that they have felt 'disregarded and dehumanised by the federal government'. The let-it-rip response 'has been harmful for vulnerable people both in terms of actual support/services but also for our mental health and self-esteem - because it has said our lives simply are not worth as much as the potential gains for the economy'

It seems to me that we're dealing not with merely a political issue but also an ethical one, and one that should concern us as Christians.

One remarkable achievement of our leaders has been to shorten the infectious period of the virus ~ so that it apparently is no longer infectious after 7 days (rather

than 14 days as previously). Someone should have thought of that before! Of course, as an entirely unrelated consequence it does get people back to work more quickly and thus helps the economy. When I spoke to a good friend of mine this week who is an infectious diseases specialist he told me not even to think of emerging from isolation until after at least ten days. Which would imply that the oft-said mantra that public policy follows sound medical advice is.......

It was with a sense of despair that while ill this week I read in the Herald of our Premier's enthusiasm for easing most restrictions at the end of a month when we're still seeing close to 10,000 cases a day. Honestly, how hard is it to wear a mask and to check-in for the sake of the common good?! In the same edition I also read:

Last week, WHO chief Tedros Adhanom Ghebreyesus said at a news briefing that COVID-19 deaths were increasing in many parts of the world. He warned it would be "premature for any country either to surrender or to declare victory" against the coronavirus.

"We're concerned that a narrative has taken hold in some countries that because of vaccines, and because of Omicron's high transmissibility and lower severity, preventing transmission is no longer possible, and no longer necessary," he said. "Nothing could be further from the truth."

There's nothing like being sick for a week to do some reading, focus your thoughts and sift the wheat from the chaff.

My thanks to Fr Thomas and the parish team for looking after things in my absence, and to Fr David Strong SJ who will assist us with our celebrations of Mass this weekend. Looking forward to being back with you after 10-14 days of (economy-damaging) isolation.

## Food for the soul: THE EMPATHETIC GAZE OF GOD

Recently I was visiting a family who have a four yearold daughter. Some of her friends were over at the house playing with her and her siblings. There were about six kids in total, all under the age of eight. Kids can play cruel games and these kids did just that. At a certain point, the others began to tease this young girl because she still occasionally wets her bed. They had a little jingle that they sang within which they rhymed part of her name with the word "pee."

The poor kid! She flinched every time they repeated the rhyme and yet she was helpless to protect herself. She was exposed and ashamed. You could also see that she was angry, not so much at the other kids and their teasing as at herself, at her weakness, at her inability to not do that for which she was being taunted. Sometimes kids are powerless to stop wetting their beds, long after they've matured enough to experience great shame in doing it.

To such as these belongs the kingdom of God. Jesus had just such a child in mind when he made that statement. But generally we misunderstand why the kingdom belongs to children. We tend to idealise the innocence of children—and, indeed, childlike innocence is a beautiful quality. However that is not what Jesus most idealises in a child. The quality that makes children so apt to receive the kingdom is not so much their innocence as their helplessness, their powerlessness among other things to not wet their beds. Very young children cannot even feed themselves, let alone provide for themselves. And certainly they cannot protect themselves, especially against their own weaknesses. There is more than one fruitful theological reflection that can be spun off of the phenomenon of bedwetting. At a more obvious level, of course, we have St Paul's great dictum in the Epistle to the Romans: "Woe to me, weak and inept. The good I want to do, I can't do; the thing that I most don't want to do, I end up doing." What a pity our young four year-old couldn't have quoted Romans to herself in the face of their cruel teasing.

There is a congenital ineptness inside of all of us and, try as we might, we cannot always or often protect ourselves against our own weaknesses. That's basic biblical anthropology. But there is something even more important theologically here. It's how God sees us in our weakness. I was one of the adults in the room as this child was being teased, as was her mother. What an adult brings to this situation, beyond a pretty immediate call to the kids to stop it, is understanding and empathy: a three year-old cannot always help herself, cannot be responsible for herself as an adult can, and should not be subjected to this kind of cruel, wounding judgement. Any adult not jaded in the soul, witnessing something like this, will spontaneously feel

a burst of tender empathy for the one who is little, who cannot protect herself against her own weakness. That, I suspect, is how God looks at us.

We grow up, grow more responsible, grow more capable of taking care of ourselves, still we never quite achieve adequacy. We simply humiliate ourselves in other ways, though we become more adept at hiding this from others. Or, at least, we think we do. But, to use Jesus' metaphor, the beam in our eye is always evident to others. We are never whole and adequate, nor do we look it.

Physically, our bloom is pretty short-lived &, long before we are ready for it, our bodies begin again to betray us. Wrinkles, fat, & the humiliating sags of midlife appear in ways that can't be hidden. Our friends don't tease and taunt us about these weaknesses, as very young kids do. They don't need to, we are painfully aware of our inadequacies.

That is true too for us emotionally and morally. There are mid-life wrinkles, fat, and sagging in these areas too. When we are young, the beauty of a youthful body and youthful spirit helps compensate for, and partly camouflages, our hidden and not-so-hidden selfishness, bitterness, and envy. These become more and more evident in us as we grow older and are a lot more shameful than bed-wetting. In the end, none of us can protect ourselves against our own weaknesses, nor indeed can we forever hide them from the view of others.

But, and this is the point, in the face of our inadequacies, we must begin to see ourselves as God sees us, a child who cannot yet be fully responsible for his or her life. Then our shame can give way to tender compassion.

We all "wet our beds" and live in that humiliation. But, as Jesus assures us, to such as these belongs the kingdom of heaven.

# FR RICHARD ROHR OFM'S MEDITATION WE ARE ONE AND MANY: DIVINE DIVERSITY AND ONENESS

During a conference on the Trinity, Richard spoke about how the three-in-one God shows God's love for diversity:

God clearly loves diversity. All we need to do is look at the animal world, or the world under the sea, or each human being: who of us looks exactly alike? We are always different. Is there any evidence to show where, in all creation, that God prefers uniformity? But we consistently confuse uniformity with spiritual unity.

The mystery that we're talking about is revealed in the Trinity: the three are maintained as diverse, different & distinct, & yet are radically"One"! The foundational philosophical problem has been called the problem of the one & the many. How can there be one & how can there be many? In the Trinity, we have the paradox at least metaphorically resolved. But most of us don't easily know how to be both diverse & united. We want to make everybody the same. The church has become more & more an exclusionary institution, instead of a great banquet feast to which Jesus constantly invites sinners & outcasts.

The ego is much more comfortable with uniformity, people around me who look and talk like me, and don't threaten my boundaries. But in the presence of the Trinitarian God, God totally lets go of boundaries for the sake of the other. Each accepts full acceptance by the other.

In an article for Sojourners, Richard writes about how understanding the Trinity can heal our tendency to "other" people who are different than ourselves:

I believe racism is often rooted in [a] distorted view of divinity; rather than reflecting the One who created all things in God's own "image and likeness" (Genesis 1:26–27), we instead make God into a mascot who, as Anne Lamott brilliantly quips, hates all the same people we do. ..

It took them [early church fathers] three centuries to make full sense out of Jesus' often-confusing language about what he named "Father," how he understood himself, and what he named the "Holy Spirit." Our common form of dualistic thinking just could not process such three-fold and one-ness evocations at the same time. . . .

The Godhead itself maintains separate identity between Three, with an absolutely unique kind of unity, which is the very shape of Divine Oneness.

God's pattern and goal has never been naïve uniformity but radical diversity (1 Corinthians 12:4–6) maintained in absolute unity by "a perfect love"

that infinitely self-empties and infinitely outpours—at the same time.

This Divine pattern is, of course, most beautifully revealed in "all the array [pleroma, or fullness] of creation" (Genesis 2:1). God is forever "making room" and "infilling"; this is the Way of the Flow. This is, in our finite understandings, an utterly new logic and is the foundational template for the success of the human project for those ready to embrace at the level of experience what they already confess in [their] creeds.
