What (hopefully) defines us as Christians is not what we do: it's who we are:


we are people who believe in and have *experienced* the mercy, compassion and love of God

Food for the soul EDITING YOUR OWN LIFE

The laws of mathematics and physics have forever been one of our great constants. They are predictable and reliable, not given to strange surprises.

But now, more and more, scientists are finding that even the laws of physics sometimes offer unexpected surprises and exhibit a freedom that leaves us baffled. Freedom, it seems, is everywhere.

Novelists have always known this. A novelist creates an imaginary character, begins to write a story, and then discovers that this character doesn't always want to follow what the author had in mind for her. She becomes her own person, develops her own attitude, goes her own way, and shapes the story in a way that the novelist never intended. In the end, partly independent of the author, each character writes his or her own story.

In an interesting book, A *Million Miles in a Thousand Years*, Donald Miller takes this concept and uses it to offer a wonderful challenge within which each of us is invited to edit our own life so as to make our story a better and more noble one.

He does this through a series of autobiographical essays within which he challenges himself to write a better story with his own life and then invites his readers to each edit our own lives so as to build a story which is more interesting and more noble, one which, like a great movie, will leave its audience in tears and longing to do better things with their lives when the final credits roll.

Here's how he describes this:

So I was writing my novel, and as my characters did what they wanted, I became more and more aware that somebody was writing me. So I started listening to The Voice, or rather, I started calling it The Voice and admitting there was a Writer. I admitted that something other than me was showing me a better way. And when I did this, I realised the Voice, the Writer, who was not me, was trying to make a better story, a more meaningful series of experiences I could live through.

Miller's writing is brilliant but deceptive. Because of his particular genre, he can seem almost superficial at times, but, in the end, what you get is a combination of David Sedaris (wit, playful self-effacement), Annie Lamott (earthy, disarmingly direct), Kathleen Norris (outstanding common sense, intelligence), Henri Nouwen (an honest look at yourself) and Ignatius of Loyola (good rules for discernment and a bit of a guide to everything). Donald Miller runs all of this through a blender.

Initially, as I read the first chapters, I was taken only by his language and not by his content. He sounded more the comic wit than the wise elder. But slowly, almost imperceptibly, and this is his genius, depth, idealism, Christian vision, disarming common sense, and his real challenge begin to seep through, becoming clearer and more inviting as his story goes on.

Here's an example of both his writing and his depth. In this a passage he shares how he discerns the real voice of God from the many false, neurotic voices that he, and most everyone else, commonly can confuse with God's voice:

As a kid, the only sense I got from God was guilt, something I dismissed as a hypersensitive conscience I got from being raised in a church with a controlling pastor. But that isn't the voice I'm talking about. . . . The real Voice is stiller and smaller and seems to know, without confusion, the difference between right and wrong and the subtle delineation between the beautiful and the profane. It's not an agitated Voice, but ever patient as though it approves a million false starts.

The Voice I am talking about is a deep water of calming wisdom that says: hold your tongue; don't talk about that person that way; forgive the friend you haven't talked to; don't look at that woman as a possession; I want to show you the sunset; look and see how short life is and how your troubles are not worth worrying about; buy that bottle of wine and call your friend and see if he can get together, because, remember, he was supposed to have that conversation with his daughter, and you should ask him about it. (Miller, *A Million Miles in a Thousand Years*)

And that Voice, he says, is forever saying to us: "Enjoy your place in my story. The beauty of it means you matter, and you can create it even as I have created you."

In the end, this book is a healthy apologetic for faith, morality, decency, and God: the kind of challenge we badly need today. I was given the book by friend who has a twenty-something daughter who has long protested her doubts about God and, not least, her agnosticism about the church. This young post-Christian, my friend said, found the book on the kitchen table, picked it up out of curiosity, and then read it cover to cover, admitting that she was much challenged by it.

Now that's not a bad endorsement!

FR RICHARD ROHR OFM'S MEDITATION: A THEOLOGY OF MAKING

"Leave her alone," said Jesus. "Why are you bothering her? She has done a beautiful thing for me. . . She poured perfume on my body beforehand to prepare for my burial." (Mk 14:6,8).

I am struck by the deep awe, reverence, and devotion that modern artist & Christian Makoto Fujimura brings to his creative process. In these touching passages, he describes how he takes inspiration from the story of the "woman with the alabaster jar," who anoints Jesus' head with oil (Mk 14:3).

I experience God, my Maker, in the studio. I am immersed in the art of creating, and I have come to understand this dimension of life as the most profound way of grasping human experience and the nature of our existence in the world. I call it the "Theology of Making."... It has become my point of reference for a lifetime of star-gazing into the infinite realities of beauty and the sacred—and then creating....

In the slow process of preparing the pigments and glue, which one must learn to do with the handmade paint that I use, I realised that I was practicing a devotional liturgy of sorts, . . . Through this act, I begin to feel deeply the compassion of God for my own existence, and by extension for the existence of others. My works, therefore, have a life of their own, and I am listening to the voice of the Creator through my creation. I am drawn into prayer as I work.

The impulse toward Making seems embedded in us from "the beginning." Such an impulse imbeds our vision in actual earthly materials. So our journey to "know" God requires not just ideas and information, but actual making, to translate our ideas into real objects and physical movements.

It is hard work to live into this generative love, and it is what we are made for: to paint light into darkness, to sing in co-creation, to take flight in abundance.

I consider my art to be a devotional act, a memorial in response to this woman's act [in Mark 14]. I use precious materials such as azurite, malachite, and gold. I have done many paintings and installations based on this passage. . . . "Truly I tell you," he said to the disciples, "wherever the gospel is preached throughout the world, what she has done will also be told, in memory of her" [Mark 14:9].

In Mary's devotion, she expressed the beautiful to Jesus. What makes us truly beautiful? What makes us not just good, not just right, but beautiful? Can our churches be beautiful again, and not just promote goodness and truth? . . . Remember, what the disciples deemed a waste, Jesus called the most necessary. We have much to learn from Mary. What is our frivolous act of devotion today? What is our "art"? Mary's act of extravagance is what it means to create in, and through, love.

WHAT IS THE PLACE OF MARY AND THE SAINTS IN OUR FAITH? PART II

Now it is normal for one Christian to ask another to pray for them. This request doesn't imply that the person believes that the other person can grant the prayer! They are simply asking one member of the body of Christ to support them, to pray for them, to intercede for them. We would never consider that in making such a request we were equating the other person with God! Our belief in the Communion of Saints (and therefore in the resurrection) means that we believe that the saints in heaven are every bit as alive, and every bit as much a part of the Church, as the saints on earth - there is a communion uniting those on earth with those in heaven. And therefore when we 'pray to' a saint we are simply turning to another one of our brothers and sisters, albeit one who is a little closer to God, and asking them to pray for us, to intercede for us. To deny that we can pray to the saints in this way would be (i) to deny that we can ask any of our brothers and sisters to pray for us & (ii) to deny the reality of the resurrection: that those who have gone before us do live and are still our sisters & brothers in the communion of saints.

The rider that needs to be put on this however is that our prayer to (through) the saints should be kept in perspective. If a person *never* prayed to God themselves, but *always* asked their neighbour next door to pray *for* them something would be wrong. We should be praying ourselves and our prayer should normally be directed to the One who hears all prayers God. So, likewise something is askew if a person always asked the intercession of a saint and never prayed directly to God. Asking another's prayers can be a *part of* our faith; it should not be a dominant part of our faith.

There are other roles that the saints play in our faith of course. These roles were well explained in an article on "Mary and the saints" by the late Bishop Michael Putney some years ago in an article in "Liturgy News". In that article he explained that we VENERATE, IMITATE AND INVOKE THE INTERCESSION OF the saints. We've considered above why we can and do invoke the intercession of the saints. We also venerate and *imitate* the saints. We <u>venerate</u> them, not for what they have done, but for what God's grace has done in them. When we honour the saint we honour God who made them a saint. And so we <u>imitate</u> them: we try to respond to God's grace as they did. The saints can give us courage and stir us on to greater things when we see what is possible when human beings, in situations like those in which we find ourselves, achieve great things under God's grace. If we honour and imitate the great men and women of the secular world, surely we can and should honour and imitate the great women and men of our faith ~ and that's what saints and feast days Fr Colin are all about! 
Life in a time of lockdown!

那時候,法利塞人,及一些從耶路撒冷來的經師,聚集到耶穌 面前。他們看見耶穌的幾個門徒,用不潔的手,就是用沒有洗 過的手吃飯。原來,法利塞人和所有猶太人,都拘守先人的傳 統:若不仔細洗手,就不吃飯;從街市上回來,若不先沐浴, 也不吃飯;還有其他許多按傳統,應拘守的事:如洗杯、洗壺、洗銅器等。法利塞人和經師們就問耶穌說:「你的門徒,為什麼不遵守先人的傳統,竟然用不潔的手吃飯?」耶穌對他們說:「依撒意亞論及你們這些假善人的預言真好,正如所記載的:『這民族用嘴唇尊敬我,他們的心,卻遠離我。他們恭敬我,也是虛假的,因為他們所講授的教義,是人的規律。』你們離棄天主的誠命,而只拘守人的傳統。」耶穌又叫群眾來,對他們說:「你們都要聽我,且要明白!不是從人外面進入他裡面的,能使人污穢,而是從人裡面出來的,才使人污穢。因為從裡面,從人心裡出來的,是惡念、邪淫、盜竊、兇殺、姦淫、貪吝、毒辣、詭詐、放蕩、嫉妒、毀謗、驕傲、愚妄:這一切惡事,都是從裡面出來的,並且使人污穢。」——上主的話。
