In fact however Christians are often known for their lack of openness, for rigidity, for being unwilling to be surprised by God and challenged by God.

The ministry of Jesus was a litany of such surprises: sinners embraced and welcomed; religious authorities challenged and criticised; the poor and outcast declared as blessed.

Today's Gospel asks us whether as disciples we are faithful to that baptismal calling: are we 'opened', are we open – **open-hearted and open-minded?** Do we have the breadth of vision and depth of love revealed in the Jesus, the Word of God made flesh amongst us?

WHAT IS THE PLACE OF MARY AND THE SAINTS IN OUR FAITH?

PART III

MARY

Catholics of course have always had a very special place in their faith for Mary. In the first place we must be clear that Mary is *one of the saints* - the cathedral in the archdiocese of Sydney is after all *Saint* Mary's Cathedral. Mary is one of us, a human being created by God. Like the saints she is in no way a competitor with God. But like the saints she is one that we *venerate, imitate and invoke*. She is also seen in our tradition as pre-eminent among the saints because of her special relationship to Jesus and her part in God's plan of salvation.

We *venerate* Mary because she responded to God's call: at the Annunciation she received a perplexing call from God that she did not fully understand and yet she said 'yes' and became the mother of Jesus. We therefore *imitate* Mary - through her 'yes' she became the mother of Jesus and brought him into the world. We likewise are called to say 'yes' to God in the many ways God calls us to respond and so likewise to become 'mothers of God', bringing God to birth in our world today. We *invoke* Mary like all the saints because she is our fellow disciple in the communion of saints - and a special one at that: the mother of our Lord - and so we can ask her to pray *for* us. Mary cannot answer our prayers. That belongs to God alone. But like any member of the communion of saints she can hear our prayers and intercede for us: and she is not just *any* member of the communion of saints!

A number of the Church's doctrines are associated with the person of Mary (such as the Assumption, the Immaculate Conception). Shouldn't *doctrine* be about God and not about one of God's creatures? Indeed that's so. And that's what is the case in these doctrines - they point to what *God* has done in Mary and what God wants to do in us. The Assumption reminds us that the resurrection of Jesus is something in which we all, like Mary, will share: Mary stands as an exemplar of the whole human race - a sign of hope. Each feast of Mary is a celebration of what God can do in a human being who responds to God's call - each feast of Mary therefore is a challenge asking us whether *we* respond to that aspect of God's grace.

5 Food for the soul

He ordered them not to tell anyone. but the more he ordered them not to, the more they proclaimed it (Mt 7:36)

REPENT

“Repent and believe in the good news!”

These are the first words out of Jesus’ mouth in Mark’s gospel and they are meant as a summary of the entire gospel. But what do these words mean?

In English, the word “repent” is often misunderstood. It seems to imply that we have already done something wrong, regret it, and now commit ourselves to live in a new way. Repentance, understood in this way, means to live beyond a sinful past.

Biblically, this is not quite what is meant. In the gospels, the particular word used for repentance is *metanoia*. Literally this means to do an about face, to turn around, to face in an entirely new direction.

But what direction?

Robert Barron, then a young theologian out of Chicago, offered a simple, yet profound, understanding of this. In his view, within each of us there are two souls, a little soul (a *pusilla anima*) and a great soul (a *magna anima*). On any given day we tend to identify more with one or the other of these and we are a very different person depending upon which soul is reigning within us.

Thus, if I take my identity from my little soul I will inevitably feel bitter and angry. It is here, in the *pusilla anima*, where I am petty, afraid, aware of my hurts, and constantly nursing the sense of having been cheated and short-changed. In my little soul, I am paranoid and defensive. When I relate to life through it, I am short-sighted, impatient, despairing, and constantly looking for compensation.

But I also have within me a great soul. When I let it reign, I become different person altogether. I am relating out of my great soul at those moments when I am overwhelmed by compassion, when everyone is brother or sister to me, when I want to give of myself without concern of cost, when I am able to carry the tensions of life without a breakdown in my chastity, when I would willingly die for others, and when my arms and my heart would want nothing other than to embrace the whole world and everyone in it.

All of us, I am sure, have had ample experience of both, identifying with the great soul and with the petty soul inside us. Sometimes we operate out of one, sometimes out of the other.

When Jesus asks us to “repent,” to do *metanoia*, what he is asking is that we cease identifying ourselves with the little soul and instead begin to live out of our other soul,

the *magna anima*. The very etymology of the word *metanoia* implies this. It takes its root in two Greek words: *meta*—beyond; and *nous*—mind. Literally, *metanoia* means to move beyond our present mindset, beyond our present way of seeing things.

When one looks at the miracles of Jesus, it is interesting to see that so many of them are connected to opening up or otherwise healing someone’s eyes, ears, or tongue. These miracles, of course, always have more than a physical significance. Eyes are opened in order to see more deeply and spiritually; ears are opened in order to hear things more compassionately; and tongues are loosened in order to praise God more freely and to speak words of reconciliation and love to each other. To put it metaphorically, what Jesus is doing in these miracles is attaching the eyes, ears, and tongue to the great soul so that what a person is now seeing, hearing, and speaking is not bitterness, hurt, and pettiness but rather compassion, gratitude, and praise.

Many of us are familiar with a famous passage in Thomas Merton within which he describes a revelation he had one day while standing on the corner of Fourth and Walnut in Louisville. Among complete strangers in the middle of a shopping district on a very ordinary day, Merton had the sense that his eyes, ears, and tongue were all at once attached to a bigger soul:

I was suddenly overwhelmed with the realisation that I loved all of those people, that they were mine, and I, theirs, that we could not be alien to one another even though we were total strangers. It was like waking from a dream of separateness.

*... Then it was as if I suddenly saw the secret beauty of their hearts, the depths of their hearts, where neither sin, nor desire, nor self-knowledge, can reach the core of their reality, the person that each one is in God’s eyes. If only we could all see each other that way all the time! There would be no more war, no more hatred, no more cruelty, no more greed. I suppose that the big problem would be that we would all fall down and worship each other.**

To repent is let the great soul, the image and likeness of God, reign within us so that, like Merton on the corner of Fourth and Walnut, we are so overwhelmed with compassion that indeed we do turn and face in a completely new direction.

FR RICHARD ROHR OFM'S MEDITATION: THE COSMOS REVEALS GOD'S GREAT LOVE

Brian McLaren grew up, as I did, in a very religious home, where "our story" was defined by strict religious obligations, with clear insiders and outsiders. However, a mystical experience in nature opened Brian up to God's Great Story. He writes:

I grew up in a religious home. A full-dose, hard-core, shaken-together-and-my-cup-run-neth-over, conservative, Bible-believing, Evangelical, fundamentalist Christian home. . . . Holidays and Sundays were just the spiritual appetizers. For the main course, there was also church every Sunday night. And there was a Wednesday night prayer meeting too. . . .

Some neighbourhood buddies . . . invited me on a weekend retreat with the youth group from their Southern Baptist church. And that's where spirituality snuck up and crashed upon me like an unexpected wave at the beach. The retreat leader sent us off on Saturday afternoon for an hour of silence during which we were supposed to pray. I climbed a tree—being a back-to-nature guy—only to discover that my perch was along an ant superhighway and that mosquitoes also liked the shade of that particular tree. But eventually, between swatting and scratching, I actually prayed. My prayer went something like this: "Dear God, before I die, I hope you will let me see the most beautiful sights, hear the most beautiful sounds, and feel the most beautiful feelings that life has to offer." . . .

In spite of my sincerity, absolutely nothing happened. . . . [After supper,] a few friends and I snuck away to a hillside and found ourselves sitting under one of those sparkling autumn night skies. I walked several paces away from my friends and lay back in the grass, fingers interlocked behind my head, looking up, feeling strangely quiet and at peace. Something began to happen.

I had this feeling of being seen. Known. Named. Loved. By a Someone bigger than the sky that expanded above me. Young science geek that I was, I pictured myself lying on a little hill on a little continent on a little planet in a little solar system on the rim of a modest galaxy in a sea of billions of galaxies, and I felt that the great big Creator of the whole shebang was somehow noticing little, tiny me. It was as if the whole sky were an eye, and all space were a heart, and I was being targeted as a focal point for attention and love. And the oddest thing happened as this realisation sank in. I began to laugh. I wasn't guffawing, but I was laughing, at first gently, but eventually almost uncontrollably. Profound laughter surged from within me.

It wasn't a reactive laughter, the kind that erupts when you hear a good joke or see somebody do something ridiculous. It was more like an overflowing laughter, as if all that space I had been feeling opening up inside me was gradually filling up with pure happiness, and once it reached the rim, it spilled over in incandescent joy. "God loves me! Me! God! At this moment! I can feel it!"
