PALM SUNDAY OF THE PASSION OF THE LORD THE BEGINNING OF HOLY WEEK

This week: Is 50:4-7; Phil 2:6-11; Luke 23: 1 - 49 Next week: The Easter Triduum



Today we enter Jerusalem with Jesus and so enter into Holy Week, the holiest week in our calendar. As we reflect on the Passion of Jesus today's liturgy calls us to set this week aside as no other week. We do not prepare for Easter holidays - we prepare for the Easter holy days.

We enter into the most wonderful week of our year, a week with liturgy rich in its symbolism and its power to touch our hearts and give life to our spirits. But it's up to us whether we give the Easter liturgy the chance to do that to us, and within us.

Let's enter together into the entirety of the Easter Triduum, from the Evening Mass of the Lord's Supper on Holy Thursday evening, through the Stations of the Cross on Good Friday morning and the Solemn Liturgy in the afternoon, and climaxing in the celebration of the Mass of the Easter Vigil and the joyful celebration of the resurrection at 7:30pm on Holy Saturday evening.

The days of the life-giving death and resurrection of Jesus are fast approaching. Let's enter into them and be renewed as individuals and as a parish. Fr Colin




As we prepare for the great celebrations of Easter . ..

* A HOLY FOREST: on Holy Thursday night we again want to create a beautiful 'Garden of Gethsemane' at the Altar of Repose at Killara. *** THE EASTER TRIDUUM ***

This year, once again, on Holy Thursday we will have a single celebration of the Mass of the Lord's Supper and it will be in our church at Killara. In this way on the night that Jesus gathered at table with his disciples for the Last Supper we too can gather as a parish at one altar. We hope that everyone from both the Lindfield and Killara communities can come.

(Holy Saturday is traditionally a day of solemn vigil [and fast], of waiting for the resurrection. Mass and the sacraments are not celebrated on this day. However, to spend some of this vigil of prayer together, there will be MORNING PRAYER at 10:00am in Lindfield church.



A Holy Week reflection The way of the Cross and prayer

Five years ago, as I began my prison sentence, I promised Creed. Prayers for the morning, daytime and evening. I myself I'd go to Mass as often as I could. I imagined I'd be found the "If you can't get to Mass" section bleakly funny, there at least every Sunday. Seventy-nine Communions to but even that helped. And most wonderful of all was the help me through. In that way, as in so many others, my Order of Mass. beliefs about prison were proved wrong. I arrived at HMP Wandsworth on 6 February 2020. They were quick to ask my religion. "Catholic," I said, and they promised to put me on the list for Mass. Someone was supposed to unlock me from my cell each Sunday morning. This did not happen. Despite week after week of requests and demands, it seemed that Wandsworth's Catholic service would remain beyond my reach. But then, at last, it happened. My cell door opened one Sunday morning. I was on the list at last! Mass. Prayer and worship together. Having this each week will help, I thought.

A few days later the UK entered the first Covid lockdown. Prison locked down harder, and for longer, than the outside world. So it wasn't until May 2021 that, still a prisoner, I received Communion again. All that long lockdown I had to find ways to stay sane. I painted toy soldiers, I wrote in my journal every day. I wrote poems and began a fantasy novel. I imagined myself in other places, other times, with those I loved. And I prayed. Those were tough months. Twenty-two or twenty-three hours a day in a cell the size of a parking space. Endless monotony, apart from the times when something awful happened. In prison everything is scarce, apart from time, and pain.

I prayed. Of course I prayed. I spoke to God of my guilt, of my regret and of my suffering. I prayed for my loved ones outside, that they might be spared from Covid. I prayed for myself, that I might survive prison and find some way to build a new life after it. I prayed for other men trapped there with me. My prayers then were simple pleas, or conversations. Often, I struggled to find the words.

It didn't feel like enough. The Church is a gathering. Praying alone, although calming, did not nourish me in the way that Mass would have done. I cursed all the times I took Mass for granted. I felt so alone.

Just before Christmas 2020 they moved me to Hollesley Bay, an "open" prison on the Suffolk coast. We had rooms, instead of cells, and far more freedom. But even in this kind of prison our church services were still banned, thanks to Covid. At least I could walk around the site, breathe fresh air, stare at the sea and the sky. I began to heal, a little.

I couldn't go to church, but I was able to visit the small chapel and browse its collection of books and pamphlets. I took one thin, pocket-sized book with me: A Simple Prayer Book published by the Catholic Truth Society. In there I found something I'd missed and longed for: structure. The

Almost half a year would pass before our chapel held worship again, but now I could read the words and imagine myself there. I'd "hear" the priest's words in my mind, and speak the responses out loud. The ritual, the familiarity soothed me. Something I love about Mass is how timeless and universal it is. We are connected not just to all other Catholics around the world, but to past and future worshippers. Holding that pamphlet, reading and imagining, wasn't the same, of course, but I felt so much better than I had before.

And then there were the prayers. Familiar prayers. Beautiful prayers. Prayers written with purpose, which connected me to generations of the faithful before, and generations to come. I no longer felt so alone. There are only a few dozen prayers in that little book. I know. I've just thumbed through it. It's lived close to me ever since prison. Those prayers, their words honed by Christians wiser and better than I, have a rightness to them.

I'd begun a Creative Writing degree that winter and turned the skills of "close reading" to my book of prayers. I studied each line, each word, considering its weight and meaning. I read the words aloud, feeling their presence on my tongue. With so few prayers to choose from I became intimately familiar with each one.

In prison we are powerless, or almost so. I might have expected that I would prefer and benefit from taking charge of my own worship, writing my own prayers. In fact, handing myself over to the rhythm and familiarity of those prayers, I found peace.

Even so, when I finally attended Mass again, on 1 May 2021, I felt uncertain, almost awkward. The priest's voice, thin & light, changed to something powerful, deep & resonant as he said, "Behold the Lamb of God". Afterwards I strolled back to my accommodation block & found my release paperwork waiting for me. I felt blessed & promised myself that I'd never take Communion for granted again.

Of course, I've not lived up to those promises. I'm a very mediocre Catholic, and in the years since prison I've struggled to -balance the demands of my life and my faith. I've not been to church anything like as much as I ought to have done. But still, I keep that little blue book, and still those prayers help, especially when my memories take me back to the darkness of Wandsworth, with all its pain.



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What's in a name? Zuite a lot in fact!

Hopefully we as Christians can at least be permitted to name our own holy days!

Despite the illiteracy of the retail industry:

- this coming Thursday is **Holy** Thursday, not Easter Thursday
- this coming Friday is Good Friday, not Easter Friday
- this coming Saturday is **Holy** Saturday, not Easter Saturday

Why is that important?

Firstly, because the stark barrenness of Holy Saturday speaks of a world without Easter: what might have been. Our churches are stripped, stark and bare. It is not yet Easter!

And secondly - because every day of the week following Easter Sunday is preceded by the word 'Easter': 'Easter Sunday'. then 'Easter Monday', 'Easter Tuesday'...all the way up to 'Easter Saturday' (the Saturday after Easter Sunday!). That week is the Easter Octave, a week of the overflowing joy of the Resurrection which spills into the rest of the 50 days of the Easter Season. We cant peak too early! As in life, so in liturgy, the Resurrection only comes through the way of the Cross.



- Pick up items and pay, on wknd of 3&4 May at both churches (please indicate on the form which church you prefer)






