The fourth Sunday of Easter is traditionally known as 'Good Shepherd Sunday' because the Gospel, whether in Year A, B or C, is always taken from the tenth chapter of John's Gospel – which explores the image of Jesus as 'the good shepherd'.

However it can be easy to sit back and pass that good shepherd role on to others:

Jesus is the good shepherd - so we leave it to him to care for others;

the Pope is the chief shepherd in the Church, so we leave it to him to care for others;

he bishop is the shepherd of the diocese so it's his job to care for others;


the priest is the shepherd of the parish, so it's all up to him.

The real challenge of this day, however, is recognise that it calls each one of us to be the good shepherd:

that the pastoral care of the Church is in the hands of each one of

Reflecting on our Easter and its message for our lives....

Over these weeks we are printing the various homilies by Fr Colin over the Easter Triduum in the hope that they may offer some food for thought during this Easter Season.

This week we print Fr Colin's homily on Good Friday......

Last night, as you may recall, at the Mass of the Lord's Supper, I mused that if there is a cloud hovering over the world at the moment, emanating from a certain oval-shaped office, then the silver lining in the cloud is the excellent raw material it provides for a homilist.

Not that I'm wanting to get into the minefield of party politics but as disciples we must reflect on attitudes, and actions, and world-views, that are in diametric opposition to the events we commemorate on this day – Good Friday.

At the heart of the horror that unfolded on this day was that a man who only ever saw the person in front of him, rather than what was objectionable and judgeable about them, was himself reduced in the most absolute way possible to an object, an inconvenience, an opponent, a disposable 'other'.

What happened to Jesus that day has happened in similar but different ways to so many others throughout history. And sadly continues to happen.

But on THIS day – or rather, tomorrow night, God pronounced an eternal judgement on that behaviour: the Resurrection is so much more than a mere resuscitation; it's a transformation that ripples through the whole of human history and reveals that every human being is a beloved child of God, that, as human beings we are united in the most intimate possible way. But its starting point for that was in what happened today: its very opposite.

There's a whole swamp full of words which capture what this day is about: degradation, judgement, victimisation, accusation, disposability, scapegoating, lying – to achieve an end—and ridiculing. And it speaks to so much of what is happening in our world at the moment: 'My country first'. 'We're being used.' Speaking of nations coming grovelling to make a deal. Perhaps even worse, the way others are spoken of by people in high office: scum, moron, dumber than a sack of bricks.

This is not the language of mutual respect. This is not the language that sees the other as a person. And the danger is that it can further infect our world, which already has too much brutality of thought and of action in it.

But what **we** can do on this GOOD Friday is to ensure that it doesn't infect us. That we look on the world and the people in it with the same eyes of love with which Jesus looked out from his Cross. That in everything we do we see the *person* in front of us, rather than an object or an opponent; that we reject the worldview that is being modelled for us on a daily basis.

We name this Friday 'good' because a man who was rejected, objectified, demonised and scapegoated, could, in his agony, only ask that those who did this be forgiven. And our faith tells us that that man is God; And that this is what God calls us to be like. So on this Good Friday let's ensure that we accept that call from God and reject the hateful alternatives being modelled for us in our world today.

FR RICHARD ROHR OFM'S MEDITATION: THE SIMPLICITY OF DIVINE LOVE

Father Richard emphasises the clarity and simplicity of trusting in divine grace:

The early English Franciscan brother William of Ockham (c. 1285–c. 1349) had an overriding principle that's called "Occam's razor" (using the Latin spelling of his name). As he put it, "The answer that demands the fewest assumptions is likely the correct one." If his students wanted to discover the truth of something, he encouraged them to "shave" away as many assumptions, beliefs, or complicating explanations as possible. Great truth might well be mysterious, Ockham believed, but it is never complex. The better answer is almost always the simpler one was his conclusion

I've found that mature prophets are those who simplify all questions of justice, reward, and punishment by a simple appeal to divine love. God's infinite, self-giving care is the only needed assumption, cause, factor, or possible variable in the drama of creation. All else must be "shaved" away as creating needless and useless complexity—which only confuses the soul and the mind.

This is the nature of mature, mystical religion—simple and clear. We shave away as many religious assumptions and judgments as possible and reground religion on one lone conviction—a divine love that can only be experienced and

not proved by rational logic. The prophets claim such divine experience and tell us that we can and must, too. This is their one absolute foundation and their radical centre on which the entire rest of their message is built, and it makes them unlike any other kind of teacher. Anything that gets in the way of this divine and absolute love must be shaved away. This is the purpose of the sacred criticism practiced by prophets like Amos, Jeremiah, Ezekiel, and Isaiah.

The prophets—and Jesus—are the ones who have the courage to make God's way of loving action the source, the goal, the criterion, and the standard for all human morality and behaviour. The questions for all of us should eventually be *What is God doing?* and *How does God act?*

We cannot dismantle the violence we find in the world if we allow threats and promises to be the overarching frame of Christianity, or any religious or secular creed. This dualism—the idea of an infinite God being caught up in a naive reward/punishment worldview—must be undone by the deeper gospel of radical grace, unconditional love, and true respect, or nothing will ever change. The loving people I've met across the world seem to know that if it's love at all, it has to be love for everybody. As soon as we begin to parcel it out, we're not in the great field of love.
