Commandments

When Jesus was asked about the greatest commandment, the question was not designed to initiate a serious discussion of morality. It was a game, The rabbis distinguished 613 different commandments found in various places in the Hebrew Scriptures. They loved debating the order of precedence among them. It didn't matter how the respondent answered; there was always occasion for the parry and thrust of intellectual debate: who can attempt to juggle 613 objects without at least one of them dropping to the floor?

Jesus takes the discussion beyond the borders of entertainment and treats the question seriously. He cites two texts that together affirm the vertical and horizontal aspects of morality: we need to have appropriate attitudes both to God and to other human beings. Do this, and all will be well. Some of the rabbis used the same combination.

But, we may ask, can love really be the object of a commandment? It is possible to order children to eat their breakfast cereal, but it is useless to insist that they enjoy it. You can't make others love what they do not. Love is something that is spontaneously drawn from us; we cannot force ourselves to love, no more than we can force ourselves to relax. We can make choices about our behavior, but our feelings dance to a different tune.

Perhaps what Jesus is indicating by his response is that true religion is more than the observance of specific commandments. It is a global attitude of acceptance and attachment to all reality, divine and created. It is communion. Certainly, this communion is expressed and reinforced by particular actions, but the relationship transcends these secondary manifestations, Our primary gift is to live in the context of God and others, which involves basing our choices on the practical opportunities that are offered us every day. Sometimes we will be called to solitary communion with God in prayer, and sometimes we will be drawn forth to practical concern for another. Always our religious zeal must seek to free us from self-concern and self-centeredness so as to allow ourselves to be filled with a greater and infinitely more attractive reality.

Meanwhile, before we scoff at the rabbis for their 613 commandments, it would be well to remember that the current Code of Canon Law for the Latin rite contains no less than 1,752 commandments. Significantly, love of God and love of neighbor are not included among them.

Reflecting on our Easter and its message for our lives...

"Over these weeks we are printing the various homilies by Fr Colin over the Easter Triduum in the hope that they may offer some food for thought during this Easter Season.

On this final week we print Fr Colin's homily at the Easter Vigil and on Easter Sunday......


In just a little while there will be quite a spectacle up here as 25 new members of the Church stand before us clothed in white baptismal garments. It will be a scene that reflects St Paul's beautiful words that 'if anyone is in Christ they are a new creation' (2 Cor. 5:17). In fact, it's one of the most beautiful moments of the Easter Vigil when the newly baptised, still dripping from the waters of the font and dressed in white, are addressed by the celebrant with the words:

'My friends, YOU have become a new creation and have clothed yourselves in Christ.'

Such a such beautiful statement.

It may seem strange to say it, but Easter is not *just* about Jesus. But, *because of Jesus*, Easter celebrates a re-newed and reborn *humanity*. It says something beautiful about us all. It says that we are beautiful. It says that we may look the same as before, but that we aren't: despite the fact that so often we seem little different to the acquisitive, anxious, pessimistic world around us.

And that's the problem: acquisitiveness and anxiety and pessimism, and so much more, can infect the way we look at ourselves and the way we look at others. As I've been saying over these three days our world at the moment is being given a terrible role model of how to be and to act: the model being put before us is one of: self-focus, the demeaning of others, the almost daily use of the language of insult, a deep closure to compassion: the words and the actions of a bully. It's a very different vision of humanity to the one those white garments will proclaim here in a few minutes' time.



It brings to my mind the words of the monk Thomas Merton which I've quoted

before but are than apt on this night and at this time. Standing at a busy city intersection he had a mystical experience which he described in these words:

"I was suddenly overwhelmed with the realisation that I loved all these people, that they were mine and I theirs, that we could not be alien to one another even though we were total strangers. This sense of liberation from an illusory difference was such a relief and such a joy to me that I almost laughed out loud. . . . I realised I have the immense joy of being human, a member of a race in which God Himself became incarnate. As if the sorrows and stupidities of the human condition could overwhelm me, now that I realise what we all are.

And if only everybody could realise this! But it cannot be explained. **There is no way of telling people that they are all walking around shining like the sun.....**

If only we could see each other that way all the time. There would be no more hatred, no more cruelty, no more greed, and no more war . '

(Thomas Merton, Conjectures of a Guilty Bystander)

This Easter I've suggested that the silver lining in the cloud of misanthropy emanating from a certain oval shaped office is that it can stop us in our tracks and make us re-focus on the vision of humanity to which the Gospel calls us - a powerful wake-up call for ourselves as it were.

Tonight, after our newly baptised are clothed in white, they will be handed a candle lit from the Paschal Candle and I'll say to them words that were spoke to each of us at our own baptism:


'Walk always as children of the light and keep the flame of faith alive in your heart.'

'Keep the flame of faith alive in your heart.'

Faith is more than saying a Creed. Faith is more than believing in God. <u>Faith is also believing in humanity *because* we <u>believe in God.</u> All the rich and beautiful symbolism of Easter calls us to that faith: that faith in, and love, of the humanity created by God. 'Keep the flame of faith alive in your heart.' That's Easter's call to us: keeping faith in humanity because of our faith in God, turning our back on the hateful, self-focussed and bitter view of the world being modelled for us on a daily basis and living out of Merton's Easter vision that people are all walking around shining like the sun.</u>

If our love of God doesn't directly influence, and even change, how we engage in the issues of our time, I wonder what good religion is. "God talk" becomes an opaque screen in which we see only reflections of ourselves, rather than any kind of true light. "Anyone who says they love God, and hates their brother or sister, is a liar" (1 John 4:20). None of us wants to be a liar, yet religion's high goals make failure almost inevitable for all of us (read Paul's attempts to describe this paradoxical phenomenon in Romans 7:7–25). Our daily question is this: "Have I even begun to love?"

Most Christians tend to echo the cultural prejudices and worldviews of the dominant group in their country, with only a minority revealing any real transformation of attitudes or consciousness. It has been true of slavery and racism, classism and consumerism, and issues of immigration and health care for the poor. From a religion based on a man who was always healing poor people and praising foreigners, it defies any logical analysis!

One would think that people who insist they believe in one God would understand that everyone on Earth is equally a child of that one God. Christians ought to be first in line to cross artificial boundaries created by nation states, class systems, cultures, and even religions. Often, we're the last! It makes one wonder if we believe what we say we believe. Religion too often becomes the way to defend the self instead of the way to "let go of the self" as Jesus forthrightly taught (see Luke 9:23).

Pope Francis reminds Christians of their duty to welcome the

stranger:

Let us concentrate on these words of Jesus: "I was a stranger and you welcomed me, I was naked and you clothed me" (Matthew 25:35-36). In our time, charitable action regarding foreigners is more relevant than ever. The economic crisis, armed conflicts, and climate change have forced many people to emigrate. However, migration is not a new phenomenon; it is part of the history of humanity. It is a lack of historical memory to think that this phenomenon has arisen only in recent years....

At times it seems that the silent work of so many men and women who, in various ways, do all they can to help and assist the refugees and migrants is obscured by the clamour of others who give voice to an instinctive selfishness. However, closure is not a solution, but instead ends up fostering criminal trafficking. The only path to a solution is through solidarity. Solidarity with the migrant, solidarity with the foreigner....

We all ... are called to welcome our brothers and sisters who are fleeing from war, from hunger, from violence and from inhuman living conditions. All together we are a great supportive force for those who have lost their homelands, families, work, and dignity.



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
