#### THE SOLEMNITY OF SAINTS PETER AND PAUL THE THIRTEENTH WEEK IN ORDINARY TIME



This week: Acts 12:1-11; 2 Tim. 4:6-8, 17-18; Matt. 16:13-19 Next week: Is 66:10-14; Gal 6:14-18; Lk 10:1-12, 17-20



This Sunday we celebrate the feast of Sts. Peter and Paul, the two pillars of the church. These apostles share a feast as founders of the Church in Rome. Peter, a Galilean fisherman chosen by Christ as one of the twelve apostles, became the undisputed leader of the infant church after Pentecost. Paul, a pharisee and Roman citizen who had persecuted Christians, became after his dramatic conversion the church's greatest missionary - its "Apostle of the Gentiles." By tradition both were martyred in Rome in the first century.

Peter and Paul tirelessly worked for the spread of the gospel, not only to the people of Israel, but to all the nations as well. They risked their lives in the process and gladly poured out their blood in loyalty to their Master, the Lord Jesus Christ.

Paul so eloquently stated this in today's second reading where he says, "I have fought the good fight, I have finished the race, I have kept the faith (2Tim; 4:7). While Peter was the rock, the solid foundation on which the faith of the early church revolved, Paul was the one who helped the church spread far and wide. In fact, we know that Paul who initially persecuted the church, now worked for its propagation, Peter and Paul were different in

character and personality but united in their love for Christ and the church.

As disciples of Jesus we possess different personalities, charisms and gifts. And when we work together they become powerful means of making Jesus known. Peter and Paul believed in Jesus as the lord and Messiah ; and they worked hard to spread his good news to the extent of being ready to lay down their lives. Let us love their faith, their life, their trials, their passion and their teaching.

Happy feast of Sts. Peter and Paul to everyone.


## Fr Hien and Mission Broken Bay warmly invite you




## Our Parish's Book Group





# Food for the spirit WALKING ON WATER, SINKING LIKE A STONE

Faith isn't something you ever simply achieve. It's not something that you ever nail down as a fait accompli. Faith works this way: Some days you walk on water and other days you sink like a stone. Faith invariably gives way to doubt before it again recovers its confidence, then it loses it again.

We see this graphically illustrated in the famous story in the gospels of Peter walking on water. The story goes this way: The disciples had just witnessed a major miracle, Jesus feeding more than 5000 people with five loaves of bread and two fishes. Having just witnessed a miracle, their faith was strong. Soon afterwards they get into a boat to cross a lake. Jesus is not with them. A few miles out they run into a fierce storm and begin to panic. Jesus comes walking towards them on the water. Initially they're frightened and take him for a ghost. But he calms their fear by telling them, right from the center of the storm, that he is not just Jesus but that he is God's very presence.

Peter is immediately buoyed up in his faith and asks Jesus to let him too walk on the water. Jesus invites him to do so and Peter gets out of the boat confidently and begins to walk on the water. But then, realizing what he was doing and the incredulous nature of it, he immediately starts to sink, cries out for help, and Jesus has to reach out and rescue him from drowning.

What we see illustrated here are two things that lie at the heart of our experience of faith, namely, that faith (literally) has its ups and downs and that it works best when we don't confuse it with our own powers.

Faith has its ups and downs: We see this, almost pictorially illustrated, in the incident of Peter walking on the water. Initially his faith feels strong and he confidently steps onto the sea and begins to walk. But, almost immediately upon realizing what he was doing, he starts to sink. Our own faith works exactly like that, at times it lets us walk on water and at other times we sink like a stone. The gospel-image of Peter walking on the sea speaks for itself.

However if we feel discouraged because our faith vacillates in this way, we can take consolation from these words from Julian of Norwich. Describing one of her visions, she writes: .

"After this He [Jesus] showed a most excellent spiritual pleasure in my soul: I was completely filled with everlastingcertainty, powerfully sustained without any painful fear. This feeling was so joyful and so spiritual that I was wholly in peace and in repose and there was nothing on earth that would have grieved me. This lasted only a while, and I was changed and left to myself in such sadness and weariness of my life, and annoyance with myself that scarcely was I able to have patience to live. ... And immediately after this, our Blessed Lord gave me again the comfort and the rest in my soul, in delight and in security so blissful and so powerful that no fear, no sorrow, no bodily pain that could be suffered would have distressed me. And then pain showed again to my feeling, and then the joy and delight, and now the one, and now the other, various times." (Showings 15)

Julian of Norwich was a renowned mystic with an exceptional faith and, yet, like Peter, she too vacillated between walking on water and sinking like a stone. Her confident feelings came – but they also left.

As well, faith works best when we don't confuse it with our own efforts. For example, Donald Nichol, in his book, Holiness, shares a story of a British missionary working in Africa. At one point, early on in his stay there, the missionary was called upon to mediate a dispute between two tribes. He had no preparation for this, was naïve, and totally out of his depth. But he gave himself over to the task in faith and, surprisingly, reconciled the two tribes. Afterwards, buoyed by this success, he began to fancy himself as mediator and began to present himself as an arbiter of disputes. But now, however, his efforts were invariably unhelpful. Here's the irony: when he didn't know what he was doing, but trusted solely in God, he was able to walk on water; as soon as he began to wrap himself in the process, he sank like a stone. Faith works like that: We can walk on water only as long as we don't think that we are doing it with our own strength.

The Sufi mystic, Rumi, once wrote that we live with a deep secret that sometimes we know, and then not, and then we know it again. Faith works like that, some days we walk on water, other days we sink like a stone, and then later we walk on water again.

Today's Celebration — Solemnity of Saints Peter and Paul Did you notice in the first reading that, whilst Peter was in prison, 'the whole Church kept on praying incessantly for him'? This constant prayer played its part in Peter's being freed from the chains which bound him, the shackles which fettered him. Prayer of the community was essential to his being freed from prison. What are the shackles or chains which fetter the successor of St Peter? What prison walls need to be shattered so that he can preach the marvels of God in ways which affect the hearts of humanity? We know prayer of the community, i.e., of us, will be essential to his being freed – from what? A Pope could be imprisoned by a distorted or impoverished idea of 'the Church'. In the Gospel, our Lord says to Simon son of Jonah: 'You are Peter and on this rock I will build my church'. 'My church' – the church desired by our Lord, not a church designed by all too earthly ambitions, a church whose structure owes much to the Roman empire, and later to Euro-centric models spanning the last millennia or so.

May the Church, the Church of the third millennium, be unshackled from the chains of various historical eras so that the Pope, in giving an account of his ministry to the Lord will be able to say with St Paul, 'I have fought the good fight to the end,' by doing my best to heed your call 'rebuild my Church'.

#### Fr Richard Rohr OFM's Meditation: -

#### CONTEMPLATION: A PATH TO COMPASSION

Father Richard reminds us that regular contemplative practice is not an end in itself, but for the sake of solidarity with the suffering of the world:

One of the main works of contemplation is detaching from the ego, from the self, from impure motivations of success or power, money or control. That will never stop, but it isn't really that meaningful unless that detachment is accompanied by an attachment. What do we find after all the months and years we've been practicing some form of contemplation or meditation? Do we have an increased attachment, sympathy, empathy, and compassion for what I call in The Tears of Things the suffering of the world? For the women of Gaza, the children of Ukraine, the starving people of Africa, the poorest of the poor, and all those marginalized in the United States and around the world? If the emptiness of "letting go" is not pretty soon filled up by "holding on" to some kind of deep solidarity with the suffering of the world, I don't know that it's Christian contemplation or even meaningful contemplation at all. It seems we're simply back into private spirituality again.

We've spent much of our history of contemplation seeking

individually pure motivation. That's a real temptation, but are we really going to spend the years ahead seeking only to be motivated to love Jesus on some private level? What does it even mean to love Jesus? What is the positive act of love? When we are in silent meditation or prayer, that's what we're praying is growing inside of us. As we let go of false motivations, and false, ego-based concerns, we've got to pray, hope, and desire for an increase in compassion, in caring, in solidarity with human suffering.

I believe that's what the cross means. The raised arms of Jesus are an act of solidarity and compassion with the human situation. So, as we sit in silence this morning and every morning, let's pray that's what we're praying for: an increase in compassion by letting go of false purity codes and agendas, which we think make us holy or worthy of God's love. It doesn't matter if we have perfect motivation or a perfect practice. What is motivating us? Instead of perfection, let's look for growth. Ultimately, we only see that growth over time as we grow in communion with those who suffer, grow in solidarity with human and beyond-human pain, and with the tears of things.


