This week's Gospel has Jesus teaching the disciples to pray and giving them the prayer that has become known as the Lord's Prayer: the pattern for all Christian prayer.
But what is that pattern?

Above all, it's outward looking – rather than being primarily concerned with our own needs:

it begins with praise of God

its desire is the coming of God's Kingdom, not our own when it does ask for something it's for basic needs: 'our daily bread' its deepest request is for a spiritual gift – the gift of forgiveness: to be forgiven ourselves and to be able to forgive others

This is the prayer that is given by Jesus as the pattern for all prayer. Perhaps on this Sunday we could reflect on our own prayer in the light of this model which Jesus gives to us.

Food for the spirit The Power of Prayer and Ritual Inside Our Helplessness

"Lord, teach us to pray just as John taught his disciples." $(\underline{Lk} \ 11:2)$

In the movie based upon Jane Austen's classic novel, Sense and Sensibility, there's a very poignant scene where one of her young heroines, suffering from acute pneumonia, is lying in bed hovering between life and death. A young man, very much in love with her, is pacing back and forth, highly agitated, frustrated by his helplessness to do anything of use, and jumping out of his skin. Unable to contain his agitation any longer, he goes to the girl's mother and asks what he might do to be helpful. She replies that there's nothing he can do, the situation is beyond them.

Unable to live with that response her says to her: "Give me some task to do, or I shall go mad!"

Weddings, just like funerals, are a prime example of where we need ritual to do for us what we cannot do for ourselves. We've all had the feeling at times when in the face of a dire situation we need to do something, but there's nothing we can do, no magic wand we can wave to make things better. But there is something we can do.

I recall an event in my own life several years ago: I was teaching summer school in Belgium when, late one evening, just as I was getting ready for bed, I received an email that two friends of mine, a man and a woman recently engaged, had been involved that day in a fatal car accident. He was killed instantly and she was in serious condition in hospital. I was living by myself in a university dorm, thousands of miles from where this all happened, and thousands of miles from anyone with whom I could share this sorrow.

Alone, agitated, panicked, and desperately needing to do something but being absolutely helpless to do anything, I was literally driven to my knees. Not being able to do anything else, I picked up the prayer-book that contains the Office of the Church and prayed, by myself, the Vespers prayer for the dead. When I'd finished, my sorrow hadn't gone away, my friend was still dead, but my panic had subsided, as had my desperate need to do something (when there was nothing I could do).

My prayer that night gave me some sense that the young man who'd died that day was alright, safe somewhere in a place beyond us, and it also relieved me of the agitation and panicked pressure of needing to do something in the face of agitated helplessness. I'd done the only thing I could do, the thing that's been done in the face of helplessness and death since the beginning of time; I'd given myself over to prayer and to the rituals of the community and the faith of the community.

It's these, prayer and ritual, which we have at our disposal at those times when, like the man in Sense and Sensibility, we need to do something or we will go mad. That's not only true for heavy, sorrowful times when loved ones are sick or dying or killed in accidents and we need to do something but there's nothing we can do.

We also need ritual to help us celebrate happy times properly. What should we do when our own children are getting married? Among other things, we should celebrate the ritual of marriage because no wedding planner in the world can do for us what the ritual of marriage, especially the church-ritual, can do. Weddings, just like funerals, are a prime example of where we need ritual to do for us what we cannot do for ourselves.

Sadly, today, we are a culture that for the most part is tonedeaf ritually. We don't understand ritual and therefore mostly don't know what to do when we need to be doing something but we don't know what to do. That's a fault, a painful poverty, in our understanding.

The Trappist monks who were martyred in Algeria in 1996 were first visited by extremists who would later kidnap and kill them, on Christmas Eve, just as they were preparing to celebrate Christmas mass. After some initial threats, their eventual murderers left. The monks were badly shaken. They huddled together as a group for a time to digest what had just happened. Then, not knowing what else to do in the face of this threat and their fear, they sang the Christmas mass. In the words of their Abbott: "It's what we had to do. It's all we could do! It was the right thing." He shared too, as did a number of the other monks (in their diaries) that they found this, celebrating the ritual of mass in the face of their fear and panic, something that calmed their fear and brought some steadiness and regularity back into their lives. There's a lesson to be learned here, one that can bring steadiness and calm into our lives at those times when we desperately need to do something but there's nothing to do. Ritual: it's what we have to do. It's all we can do! It's the right thing..

Fr Richard Rohr OFM's Meditation: CONTEMPLATION CREATES COMPASSION

A practice of contemplation is one of the surest ways to develop the virtue of compassion—for both ourselves and others. Father Richard speaks to how this loving gaze is developed between ourselves and God.

Much of the early work of contemplation is discovering a way to observe ourselves from a compassionate and nonjudgmental distance until we can eventually live more and more of our lives from this calm inner awareness and acceptance. In a contemplative stance, we find ourselves smiling, sighing, and weeping at ourselves, much more than needing either to hate or to congratulate ourselves because we are finally looking at ourselves with the eyes of

Actually, what is happening is we are letting God gaze at us, in the way only God can gaze—with infinite mercy, love, and compassion. God initiates a positive gaze, which now goes in both directions. Unfortunately, we seldom allow that to happen. Decades ago, Matthew Fox identified what it has cost us and the universe to have lost this mutually loving gaze with God. I believe it is even more true of the world today. Fox writes:

Compassion is everywhere. Compassion is the world's richest energy source. Now that the world is a global village we need compassion more than ever—not for altruism's sake, nor for philosophy's sake or theology's sake, but for survival's sake.

And yet, in human history of late, compassion remains an energy source that goes largely unexplored, untapped and unwanted. Compassion appears very far away and almost in exile. Whatever propensities the human cave dweller once had for violence instead of compassion seem to have increased geometrically with the onslaught of industrial society.

The exile of compassion is evident everywhere. . . In acquiescing in compassion's exile, we are surrendering the fullness of nature and of human nature, for we, like all creatures in the cosmos, are compassionate creatures. All persons are compassionate at least potentially. What we all share today is that we are victims of compassion's exile. The difference between persons and groups of persons is not that some are victims and some are not: we are all victims and all dying from lack of compassion; we are all surrendering our humanity together. As we receive God's compassionate gaze contemplation, all negative energy and motivation is slowly exposed and will eventually fall away as counter-productive and useless. There will be no mistrust, fear, or negativity in either direction! If we resort to any form of shaming ourselves, we will slip back into defense, denial, and overcompensation. We will not be able to "know as fully as we are known" (see 1 Corinthians 13:12).

But if we can connect with the Indwelling Presence, where the "Spirit bears common witness with our spirit" (see Romans 8:16), it can and will change our lives! No place to call home

Roughly 1 in 200 people in Australia are homeless on any given night. One third are under 18 years of age. The number of women 55+ becoming homeless has increased dramatically in the past 5 years. Other women are making an impossible choice between staying in a violent relationship or risking homelessness for herself and her children if she leaves.

The causes of homelessness are numerous and complex. Structural causes of homelessness are poverty and a severe shortfall of affordable housing. Homelessness can be the result of factors such as unemployment, family breakdown, physical or mental illness, addiction, and financial difficulty. Domestic violence is the single biggest cause of homelessness in Australia.

When we think about homelessness, many of us envisage people living on the street, but only around 7% of the homeless population are living on the streets. Being without a home means they are sleeping in cars, staying in refuges, couch-surfing, house-sitting, and more. Being homeless means not having a place to call one's own, a place where children can settle into school and make friends, a place where they can lock the door and feel safe.
