FEAST OF THE EXALTATION OF THE HOLY CROSS

This week: Num 21:4-9, Phil 2:6-11, Jn 3: 13-17 Next week: Amos 8: 4-7, 1 Tim 2:1-8, Lk 16:1-13





Today's feast contains something of a paradox - the triumph of 'the Cross' - the triumph of something which outwardly represents disaster and failure:

to human eyes the Cross represented the end of Jesus' mission, the rejection of his message, the dissipation of the movement which he had started.

In fact of course it was through that disaster that the Gospel triumphed and spread – and ultimately touched our own lives.

And so the message is that failure, weakness, imperfection can be the means of God's grace working in our lives, in the world – and that it works so often not through strength and success.

This feast celebrates the triumph of the Cross: not the removal of the Cross. The Cross is the great symbol of Christian faith and spirituality because at the heart of our faith is the conviction that at the centre of the Cross, buried deep within it, is God. Fr Colin

Our next Parish Synodal Assembly



A report from the wandering pilgrim....

Well, it's lovely to be back with you all at Lindfield-Killara in our wonderful parish. But I also must say that my time in England was an extraordinarily rich and blessed one.

As you may recall, three of the four months I was away was for a sabbatical experience, with the remaining month being my annual holidays.



The sabbatical was of a pastoral nature and involved me ministering in the parish of St Michael's at Sonning Common in the Deanery of South Oxfordshire.. The parish is part of the vast Archdiocese of Birmingham which is being challenged in being able to provide priests to its smaller rural parishes when the diocese also contains major urban centres. Because of that Sonning Common will no longer have a full-time resident priest and my appointment was an opportunity to help the parish build its strengths (which are many - it's s a very vibrant community) and to move confidently into the future with only visiting priests for liturgy. The parish is also served by a permanent Deacon, Brian Theobald who, with his wife Frances, are long term members of the parish.

St Michael's Sonning CommonBrian exercises a wonderful ministry. It was an honour ministering with him.

Perhaps I might give a brief outline of some of the initiatives I was involved with during my time at Sonning Common (in addition to all the usual aspects of parish life such as Sunday & weekday Masses, funerals, PPC meetings, school Masses, etc.

- I prepared for and led an inaugural Parish Synodal Assembly which was a very rich experience. The next assembly will be taking place in October.
- I was also invited by Canon Paul, the Dean, to do the same for Henley-on-Thames parish again a very rich experience and again one which will be followed up in October.
- I offered a Scripture course (which I have previously given here in our parish) and two enthusiastic groups participated - we had a daytime and an evening alternative for each session. At the end I offered to set up an on-going Scripture group for those who were interested and there was a good response. I liaised with Canon Paul (who just happens to be a Scripture scholar) and all is now in place for a threeterm Scripture series between now and next May on the Gospels of Matthew, Mark and Luke, with a daytime in-person alternative and an evening Zoom alternative for each session.
- I also worked to introduce the ministry of Adult Server both as a way of expanding lay ministry and also providing support and backup for Deacon Brian. I was able to commission the first group before I left.
- At the request of the Parish Pastoral Council I prepared and led a retreat day for them and the Finance Committee at a lovely retreat house in the nearby Chiltern Hills (Albert Einstein, amongst others, had visited there when it was a grand family home!).
- The Synodal Assembly identified outreach to youth as a priority and I had the opportunity to draw three people into a youth ministry team before I left.
- With no resident priest coming once I had left the Finance Committee was considering leasing the presbytery. I proposed that another option was to approach the Archdiocese to see if they would take it on, lease it from the parish, and provide it as a home for a retired priest. In this way the parish would have a resident and regular celebrant for the Eucharist (although he would not be involved in the leadership and administration of the parish). By the time I left the appropriate team from the diocese was to come and assess the suitability of the presbytery for this purpose. Say a prayer that this might work out - to the benefit of the parish and a retired priest who wishes to retain a connection to parish ministry.

Well, that's a bit of a snapshot of my time in the parish. I was made so very welcome there and given much encouragement in my efforts. It was a very rich experience and one that I will always remember. They wanted me to stay but I told them that

you wouldn't let me!

Of course, there was also my month of holidays and that too was wonderful. Amongst other things I had a delightful week in Scotland with friends of mine from here, and a wonderful week in Paris with a

friend who is an English priest. A number

of friends - both England-based and Australian travellers - also passed through and many fine times of friendship, fun (and fine wine) were involved! Oh, and I had the opportunity to attend the Henley Royal Regatta - now that was quite an experience!

After a very rich four months it's lovely to be back with you all, and I very much extend my gratitude to our Parish Staff for their - as always - wonderful work while I was away, and to Fr Thomas for his tremendous ministry as Administrator. Fr Colin

A reflection for today's Feast of the Exaltation of the Holy Cross

"Whoever does not carry their own cross and come after me cannot be my disciple" (Lk 14:27)

The Cross used to be nothing more than an instrument of torture and death. The Romans used it to punish those they considered criminals, to strike fear in the hearts of those who might dare challenge their so-called peace. It was the cruelest form of execution.

Everything changed the day Jesus was crucified. Once he died upon the Cross, what was once merely an instrument of Roman punishment became in Christ the symbol of humans' salvation from pain and death. It became an instrument of God's mercy, a symbol of love, and above all, our hope for God's total deliverance at the end of time.

In Christ, the Cross now tells not a human story of oppressive power and dehumanising punishment, but the divine story of redemption. In the cross, Jesus reveals the very heart of God. He shows us how precious each of us is to the Father, and how far God is willing to go for our salvation: "For God so loved that he gave his only Son, so that everyone who believes in him might not perish but might have eternal life." On the cross, Christ proves God's love for us and answers the deepest questions of human life. God alone is the ultimate purpose of our existence.

The Cross teaches us that it is better to give than to receive. That, as Jesus teaches, unless the grain of wheat falls and dies, it bears no fruit. That a life lived for others is the fullest life. That death is not a calamity when it crowns a selfless life of charity and service. It teaches us the meaning and power of humility. Jesus embraced the cross in humility as an example for us. He emptied himself for our sake to model for us what it means to empty ourselves for the sake of others.

The Cross reminds us to prepare for our impending death by appreciating the temporality of life and the emptiness of a life lived outside the purpose of God. The cross doesn't just urge us to be good as individuals; it inspires us to work together with other good people for the common good. After all, one of the reasons Jesus climbed the Cross was to draw all humanity in unity unto himself.

The Cross compels us toward justice, compassion, and solidarity with all those who suffer. It challenges us to open our eyes to the plight of the poor, the hungry, the sick, and the oppressed, and to vehemently challenge the structures responsible for their suffering, while we do

what we can to alleviate their distress. It warns us not to rest until there is justice for all, to resist the constant temptation to participate in corruption or selfishness, but to transform the vicious circle of life into a circle of grace and mercy.

Above all, the Cross challenges us to take God and our faith more seriously. For every Christian, the cross remains the most powerful reminder of the religion of love, justice, and peace that Christ inaugurated.

As we celebrate the Feast of the Exaltation of the Cross, my heart goes out to the victims of the recent shooting at the Annunciation Church and School in Minnesota. As Pope Francis reminds us: "The Way of the Cross alone defeats sin, evil, and death, for it leads to the radiant light of Christ's resurrection and opens the horizons of a new and fuller life. It is the way of hope, the way of the future. Those who take up this way with generosity and faith give hope and a future to humanity."

The Cross is our message and our hope. May we, on this feast day, embrace it anew.

FR RICHARD ROHR OFM'S MEDITATION **RELEASING OUR PASSIONS**

Richard Rohr explores the emotional energy of anger and how we can allow it to both inform us and move through us:

In Greek mythology, three female goddesses, the Furies, were the deities of retribution and vengeance. They were horrible to look at, with snakes for hair, black wings, and blood dripping from their eyes. Though they were supposedly pursuing and punishing evildoers, their righteous need for vengeance brought about little lasting good, because they needed to punish evil too much and thus became evil themselves. Does this not sound like what practitioners of modern nonviolent theory tell usviolence begets violence? Our words "furious" and "infuriated" come from these goddesses. Their main problem was that their righteous anger consumed them, and their blind fury became an end in itself—and the lasting message.

It has taken us centuries to fully recognise this pattern is operating in human beings too. It is common for the unhealthy ones will have us! This is surely what the psyche to put its hope in a retributive notion of justice Bible was pointing to in using the psychologically even though it never works long term. That reveals the astute phrase of "being possessed by a demon"! classic pattern of all addiction: We keep doing If we don't want to let go of our anger and keep something even when it is not working.

The preoccupations of the Furies were what the later probably operating out of our own offended ego. When Desert Fathers and Mothers would call "passions" or we can let go of it—after properly acknowledging it—what we might call addictive emotions. Whenever we we will probably be able to retrieve its wisdom recognise an outsized emotional response, we can be

pretty certain that we are over-identified with something or our shadow self has just been activated and exposed. If we are ultimately incapable detaching from an emotion, we are far too attached!

There is much evil and injustice in the world that deserves righteous anger, but a good practice is to watch that emotion a bit—to see where that anger is actually coming from. This will take humility and patience. If it is truly God's anger, we can also trust God to lead and resolve it to some degree, but when it is mostly our anger-if we are using God as our justification—it will have too much urgency, too much of "me," too much righteousness, too much impatience, too much need to humiliate the opponent. We almost always start there, but good therapy, a wise friend, or spiritual direction can help us distinguish between our personal anger and God's pure anger. This might take some time to learn, but, unless we do this, we will not have healthy or helpful emotional responses—the



Molly O'Brien's film about her aunt Orin, the first woman member of the New York Philharmonic, produced when the legendary double bassist was 88 (though she comes across, quite naturally, as been fifty-something) is a marvel — don't mind its being on Netflix and sponsored by The Secular Society. It gives you a compelling account of a life convincingly lived with passion, vulnerability, and disarming self-irony. Orin would tell her students to treasure the sound of their instruments, 'but if there's anything else you enjoy as much as playing the bass, by all means, do it'. That's good vocational discernment. Looking back, she offers her 'theory of how to enjoy your life incredibly': the secret is not to 'mind playing second fiddle', loving what you do so much that you do it for its own sake, never mind whether or not you get rapturous applause.
