Once again it's the theme of God's love as hospitality of heart that emerges in today's Gospel:

Zacchaeus was a public sinner – as a tax collector he worked for the occupying Romans and extorted his own people. His sin was real, not imagined.

And the response of religious people was to shun him. That's how sin and sinners should be treated.

#### By contrast Jesus invites himself to dinner!

We can't imagine the impact of that simple act. Under Jewish ritual law to enter a sinner's house made you unclean – and to share food with them made you as unclean as could be imagined.

But that's what Jesus does. In our Christian faith we recognise Jesus as the incarnation of the God of love: in Jesus we see our God made visible.

And what we see is a God whose heart is utter hospitality. There is no exclusion, only invitation. Zacchaeus' life was transformed because for once someone embraced him rather than judging him.

Hospitality of heart. That's the God we believe in. The God we're called to reflect.

# Last weekend's Parish Synodal Assembly



Many thanks to all those who took part in our third Synodal Assembly last Sunday. We'll have a report next week.



The first of the two appeals for this Financial Year will take place over the weekends of 1st/2nd and 8th/9th November. PWBB provides the funds for our catechist training & support for our State Schools, our diocesan Hospital Chaplaincy, and support children with disabilities at St Edmunds and St Lucy's School, and also the deaf community via the Ephphetha Centre.

We will need to raise in excess of \$20000 over each of the two appeals - please help us to achieve our required amount.

The PWBB collection used to be spread over three appeals (August, November and May). However it now takes place over only TWO appeals (November and May). Our required quota remains the same - which means that we need to achieve 1.5 times as much on each of the appeals

achieve 1.5 times as much on each of the appeals to match our previous yearly total.

At each Mass next weekend we will invite all to come forward and to take a candle (we will provide the candles) lit from the Easter light of the Paschal Candle and to place it before the altar where it will burn during the celebration of the Eucharist as a sign of our prayers for those who have died and our hope in eternal

# Food for the spirit.... 'Shortcuts'

We are all devoted to finding shortcuts in any journey we make or in any process in which we are involved. Our focus is always on arriving at our destination or getting the job finished. Time is of the essence. We do not always appreciate that moving forward at a more leisurely pace often means that we do things better or derive much more pleasure from the journey we have undertaken.

Being so fixated on finishing means that we pay slight attention to what happens after the beginning and before the end. The long middle stage. Instead of practicing mindfulness and cherishing every moment, we rush at high speed, failing to be moved by anything in the ever-changing landscape. We submit our environment to control by refusing to take any note of it; that way it cannot influence us, either to comfort or to challenge. It is always "Full steam ahead!"

We receive the content of our faith as a finished product of nearly twenty centuries of development. It is all neatly packaged and tied with a ribbon. We are not always aware of the conflicts and struggles that contributed to what we have received. It was only because people asked questions that the answers were sought and eventually found. In a sense, the questions were more important than the answers. And not all the answers provide a response to every aspect of the questions. There are still unresolved difficulties. Perhaps we think that, in some way, we ourselves can avoid all the searching and doubting that contributed to the formulation and growth of official doctrine.

In living our faith we must expect also to go through the agonies of question and answer before we arrive at a definitive stance. It is unrealistic to expect that somehow we will be exempt from doubts, difficulties, dilemmas, and darkness, or that in some way we will be protected from compromises and backsliding. There are no shortcuts in the spiritual life. If we are to receive mercy, we must first discover our need for mercy and recognise how much we have in common with the rest of humanity –even those we esteem to be less worthy than ourselves.

Salvation is a great benefit, but we cannot be saved unless we first get our lives into a mess – or, rather, we cannot feel our need for salvation until we recognise that our lives really are a mess.

There are no shortcuts.

Loving Father, you call us to yourself, despite our hesitancy and our many failings. Give us the courage to believe what you have promised and so to go through life confident that we are always loved by you, no matter how often we have wandered from the way you have set before us.

We make this prayer in the name of Jesus our Lord. Amen

# FR RICHARD ROHR OFM'S MEDITATION: PROPHETIC SOLIDARITY AND COMPASSION

Old Testament Scripture scholar Walter Brueggemann (1933-2025) witnesses Jesus' prophetic role in his solidarity and his compassion for those on the margins:

Among his other functions it is clear that Jesus functioned as a prophet. In both his teaching and his very presence, Jesus of Nazareth presented the ultimate criticism of the royal consciousness.... The way of his ultimate criticism is his decisive solidarity with marginal people and the vulnerability required accompanying solidarity. The only solidarity worth affirming is solidarity characterised by the same helplessness they know and experience.

Jesus' prophetic actions were motivated by his deep solidarity and compassion for those who are suffering:

Jesus in his solidarity with the marginal ones is moved to compassion. Compassion constitutes a radical form of criticism, for it announces that the hurt is to be taken seriously, that the hurt is not to be accepted as normal and natural but is an abnormal and unacceptable condition for humanness. In the arrangement of "lawfulness" in Jesus' time, as in the ancient empire of Pharaoh, the one unpermitted quality of relation was compassion. Empires are never built or maintained on the basis of compassion. The norms of law (social control) are never accommodated to persons, but persons are accommodated to the

norms. Otherwise the norms will collapse and with them the whole power arrangement. Thus the compassion of Jesus is to be understood not simply as a personal emotional reaction but as a public criticism in which he dares to act upon his concern against the entire numbness of his social context.

Empires live by numbness. Empires, in their militarism, expect numbness about the human cost of war. Corporate economies expect blindness to the cost in terms of poverty and exploitation. Governments and societies of domination go to great lengths to keep the numbness intact. Jesus penetrates the numbness by his compassion and with his compassion takes the first step by making visible the odd abnormality that had become business as usual. Thus compassion that might be seen simply as generous goodwill is in fact criticism of the system, forces, and ideologies that produce the hurt. Jesus enters into the hurt and finally comes to embody it.
