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GOSPEL REFLECTION

The Fourteenth Sunday in Ordinary Time Year A
Matthew 11:25-30

Matthew's community was mainly comprised of Jews that had converted to Christianity.

As Jews, they had to be obedient to all the rules and regulations the Pharisees had set forth. This sometimes was referred to as the yoke of the Law. It was a very disciplined life, and observing all the precepts was often a yoke that was impossible to bear.

With all the precise rules and restrictions imposed by the Pharisees' interpretation of the Law, salvation seemed far away or even impossible to obtain. Matthew wants his community to know that Jesus came to give them a new yoke of discipline for their lives.


Jesus's yoke is easy, and his burden is light. Jesus shows Christians the way to live—to be gentle and humble of heart.

The image of a yoke is also a sign of hope for Christian converts, reminding them they do not walk alone—they are yoked to Jesus. Jesus walks with them, showing them the way. If they learn to synchronize their actions (movements) with those of Jesus, the yoke makes following the precepts of Jesus easy.

The yoke can be perceived as a tool that helps the believer walk more easily with Jesus. It speaks of an intimate relationship between Jesus and his disciples, a relationship between the student and the master. This is how we find peace—working as a team with Jesus.

SAINT OF THE WEEK



St Benedict, Abbot

Feastday: July 11 Birth: 480 Norcia Italy

Death: 543

Patron of students and Europe

St. Benedict is believed to have been born around 480, as the son to a Roman noble of Norcia and the twin to his sister. Scholastica.

Benedict gave up his inheritance and lived in a small village. When God called him beyond this quiet life to an even deeper solitude, he went to the mountains of Subiaco. Although becoming a hermit was not his purpose in leaving, there he lived as a hermit under the direction of another hermit, Romanus.

After years of prayer, word of his holiness brought nearby monks to ask for his leadership. He warned them he would be too strict for them, but they insisted -- then tried to poison him when his warning proved true. The story goes, the monks attempted to poison Benedict's drink, but when he prayed a blessing over the cup - it shattered.

So Benedict was on his own again -- but not for long. The next set of followers were more sincere and he set up twelve monasteries in Subiaco where monks lived in separate communities of twelve.

He left these monasteries abruptly when the envious attacks of another hermit made it impossible to continue the spiritual leadership he had taken.

But it was in Monte Cassino he founded the monastery that became the roots of the Church's monastic system. Instead of founding small separate communities he gathered his disciples into one whole community. His own sister, Saint Scholastica, settled nearby to live a religious life.

After almost 1,500 years of monastic tradition his direction seems obvious to us. However, Benedict was an innovator. No one had ever set up communities like his before or directed them with a rule. What is part of history to us now was a bold, risky step into the future.

Benedict had the holiness and the ability to take this step. His beliefs and instructions on religious life were collected in what is now known as the Rule of Saint Benedict -- still directing religious life after 15 centuries.

Benedict did not want to lose the power of voice to reach up to God simply because others had use it to sink down to the gutter. He reminded us "Let us consider our place in sight of God and of his angels. Let us rise in chanting that our hearts and voices harmonize." There was always a voice reading aloud in his communities at meals, to receive guests, to educate novices. Hearing words one time was not enough -- "We wish this Rule to be read frequently to the community."

Benedict instructed his followers to practice sacred reading -- the study of the very Scriptures they would be praying in the Work of God. Four to six hours were set aside each day for this sacred reading. If monks had free time it "should be used by the brothers to practice psalms." Lessons from Scripture were to be spoken from memory not read from a book. On Benedict's list of "Instruments of Good Works" is "to enjoy holy readings."

THE RULE OF ST BENEDICT

Chapter 7

The first degree of humility, then, is that a man keep the fear of God before his eyes, altogether shunning forgetfulness. Let him ever remember all the commandments of God, and how hell will burn for their sins those that despise him; and let him constantly turn over in his heart the eternal life which is prepared for those that fear him. And guarding himself always from sins and vices, whether of thought, word, hand, foot, or self-will, and checking also the desires of the flesh, let him consider that God is always beholding him from heaven, that his actions are everywhere visible to the eye of the Godhead, and are constantly being reported to God by the angels. The prophet teaches us this when he represents God as always present in our thoughts: God searcheth the heart and the reins; and again: The Lord knoweth the thoughts of men; and again he saith: Thou has understood my thoughts from afar; and: and: The thought of man shall praise thee. In order then that he may be careful regarding his wrongful thoughts, let the good brother say constantly in his heart: Then shall I be spotless before him, if I shall have kept myself from my iniquity.

Message for BBNeighbourhoods 30 June 2020

My dear brothers and sisters in Christ,

One of my priests was recently told that there are no young people in the Church. When he shared this with me, he quickly added that he did not believe it. He soon set about his pastoral ministry and within a very short time; dozens of young people were connecting with the community of the Church. Thank God for that priest and his wonderful spirit of hope and clear vision.

On 22 October 1978, at the inauguration of his Pontificate, Pope John Paul II gave a special greeting to the young people of the world saying, "You are the future of the world, you are the hope of the Church, you are my hope."

Since then, part of this sentiment has been repeated many times. I say part of it because the full impact of what the new Pope was saying was so challenging that many could not comprehend it and consequently, they devoted substantial amounts of time and energy trying to avoid it.

The temptation was, and is, to consign young people in the Church to the future and in the process, deny them a place right here and now. This is not what Saint John Paul II had in mind. He emphasised the charism "hope" not the chronological "future" - that is, he emphasised a strong and confident expectation that there will be a future, because young people are a vibrant part of the living community of the Church. The Church is the Body of Jesus Christ and as the letter to the Hebrews reminds us, "Jesus Christ is the same yesterday and today and forever." (Heb 13:8)

There is another temptation, and that is to bury ourselves creating youth programmes in an attempt to keep them attracted to the Church. There is a fundamental problem in this approach, namely, that programmes are often institutional by nature. Most young people spend their time trying to avoid or even eliminate institutional dimensions from their life. That is not to say that they are anarchists, rather it is an acknowledgement of where our young people are during this stage of their lives.

So, you might be asking, what are we supposed to do for our youth when it comes to their life as Catholic Christians? I think that the answer is not really that complicated. What most people are looking for in life is security and stability in their relationships. Those relationships include the one with Jesus Christ, who is the most important relationship in the life of a Christian.

There is room for growing this vision in Broken Bay. If we make the investment now by listening to and accompanying our young people in the faith, then we have every reason to have hope for the future. Blessings on your week.

COVID-19 RELIEF: CAMPION COLLEGE MORE THAN TRIPLES SCHOLARSHIP FOR 2021 STUDENTS

Catholic Tertiary College Offers \$5000 Scholarships for Early Enrolments

Campion College, Australia's first tertiary liberal arts college, has more than tripled the amount of money awarded to all new students who enrol early to study in 2021.

In view of the financial hardship and uncertainty facing many Australians due to the COVID-19 pandemic, the Sydney-based college has decided to increase its Early Enrolment Scholarship from \$1500 to \$5000 per student.

The latest national Student Experience Survey showed Campion achieved a 96.3 per cent overall student satisfaction rate – topping not only the highest university score of 93 per cent but punching well above the 78 per cent national average.

"I strongly encourage anyone with a love of learning, including those who haven't yet settled on a career path, to consider enrolling at Campion for 2021, especially in view of this fantastic scholarship offer, thanks to our very generous sponsors," Dr Morrissey said.

Campion offers a three-year Bachelor of Arts in the Liberal Arts and a one-year Diploma of Liberal Arts.

The scholarship can be deposited directly into the student's bank account, or used to reduce tuition or accommodation fees. The latter option would be particularly useful for interstate students as it effectively reduces on-campus accommodation costs by 50 per cent.
