But can you imagine yourself as the sower, the one who continues to take the good seeds of God's word and sow them in the world today?



SAINT OF THE WEEK



St Benedict, Abbot

Feastday: July 11 Birth: 480 Norcia Italy

Death: 543

Patron of students and Europe

St. Benedict is believed to have been born around 480, as the son to a Roman noble of Norcia and the twin to his sister. Scholastica.

Benedict gave up his inheritance and lived in a small village. When God called him beyond this quiet life to an even deeper solitude, he went to the mountains of Subiaco. Although becoming a hermit was not his purpose in leaving, there he lived as a hermit under the direction of another hermit, Romanus.

After years of prayer, word of his holiness brought nearby monks to ask for his leadership. He warned them he would be too strict for them, but they insisted -- then tried to poison him when his warning proved true. The story goes, the monks attempted to poison Benedict's drink, but when he prayed a blessing over the cup - it shattered.

So Benedict was on his own again -- but not for long. The next set of followers were more sincere and he set up twelve monasteries in Subiaco where monks lived in separate communities of twelve.

He left these monasteries abruptly when the envious attacks of another hermit made it impossible to continue the spiritual leadership he had taken.

But it was in Monte Cassino he founded the monastery that became the roots of the Church's monastic system. Instead of founding small separate communities he gathered his disciples into one whole community. His own sister, Saint Scholastica, settled nearby to live a religious life.

After almost 1,500 years of monastic tradition his direction seems obvious to us. However, Benedict was an innovator. No one had ever set up communities like his before or directed them with a rule. What is part of history to us now was a bold, risky step into the future.

Benedict had the holiness and the ability to take this step. His beliefs and instructions on religious life were collected in what is now known as the Rule of Saint Benedict -- still directing religious life after 15 centuries.

Benedict did not want to lose the power of voice to reach up to God simply because others had use it to sink down to the gutter. He reminded us "Let us consider our place in sight of God and of his angels. Let us rise in chanting that our hearts and voices harmonize." There was always a voice reading aloud in his communities at meals, to receive guests, to educate novices. Hearing words one time was not enough -- "We wish this Rule to be read frequently to the community."

Benedict instructed his followers to practice sacred reading -- the study of the very Scriptures they would be praying in the Work of God. Four to six hours were set aside each day for this sacred reading. If monks had free time it "should be used by the brothers to practice psalms." Lessons from Scripture were to be spoken from memory not read from a book. On Benedict's list of "Instruments of Good Works" is "to enjoy holy readings."

THE RULE OF ST BENEDICT

Chapter 7 (continued)

We are, indeed, forbidden to do our own will by Scripture, which saith to us: *Turn away from thine own will.* Moreover, we ask God in prayer that his will be done in us.

And rightly are we taught not to do our own will, since we dread that sentence of Scripture: *There are ways which men seem right, but the ends thereof lead to the depths of hell*; and since we fear also what is said of the careless: *They are corrupt and have become abominable in their pleasures*. And in regard to the desires of the flesh, let us believe that God is always present to us, since the prophet says to the Lord: *All my desire is before thee*.

Message for BBNeighbourhoods 7 July 2020

My dear brothers and sisters in Christ,

The Evangelist Matthew describes a simple, but powerful encounter between Jesus, little children, their parents and carers, and Jesus' disciples (Matthew 19:13-14). Matthew tells us that the children were being brought to Jesus so that he might lay hands on them and pray. It is a beautiful, intimate and pure moment of communion. In that moment of encounter with Jesus the wellbeing of the children is paramount. With Jesus, the children are happy, healthy, and holy. They are safe. Meanwhile, the disciples and those who brought the children to Jesus are caught up in an altercation. It seems that their daily schedule had not provided space for this meeting. Maybe the structure of the timetable did not allow for spontaneous moments or the needs of others. Whatever the case, Jesus intervenes saying, "Let the little children come to me, and do not stop them". This is clearly a God moment, and the disciples cannot quite see it.

In the Gospel according to Mark, the Evangelist reports the episode of the blind man of Jericho named Bartimæus (Mark 10:46-52). Sitting by the side of the road, this person was both blind and a beggar. He is alone and looking for compassion. At one level, he desires human companionship, because on his own he is vulnerable and isolated. At the same time, this person desires healing and he asks for mercy. It is tempting to think that the healing he desires is outward looking, that is, his eyesight. However, his vulnerability is also inward looking. Bartimæus shouts out to Jesus because he seeks inner healing and spiritual well-being. In sum, this vulnerable person realises that Jesus will understand him and suffer with him, which is the deepest sign of compassion and mercy. In that moment when Jesus calls Bartimæus, they become one. In that moment, we have a glimpse of Jesus suffering on the cross for the salvation of all.

These two passages from the New Testament are a powerful reminder of how the business of discipleship can sometimes distract us from the true purpose of following Jesus. The busyness of activism can reduce the Christian life to a series of meetings, debates, and endless conversations about strategy and process. The mindfulness of belonging to Jesus, of being present in and through him, and of being sent on mission to proclaim Christ to the world, primarily by a life of witness to the Good News, can often be missing.

As the community of the Church of Broken Bay, we can never risk being so caught up in this kind of bureaucracy. The two examples from the Scriptures above are powerful reminders of how Jesus cares for children and vulnerable people. The safety and well-being of all people in the community of the Church and beyond is part of who we are as disciples of Jesus. Likewise, the conviction that all people in the community must be respected and cared for will inform and direct what we do as we live out our Christian vocation.

Beginning with my own ministry as your bishop, I hope that the determination to live the Gospel is something that each of us will commit to. In this way, we will be faithful to Christ who respected, protected, and cared for the children, the vulnerable, and indeed all people.

COVID-19 RELIEF: CAMPION COLLEGE MORE THAN TRIPLES SCHOLARSHIP FOR 2021 STUDENTS

Catholic Tertiary College Offers \$5000 Scholarships for Early Enrolments

Campion College, Australia's first tertiary liberal arts college, has more than tripled the amount of money awarded to all new students who enrol early to study in 2021.

Campion offers a three-year Bachelor of Arts in the Liberal Arts and a one-year Diploma of Liberal Arts.
