GOSPEL REFLECTION The Seventeenth Sunday in Ordinary Time Year A Matthew 13:44-52

Today's Gospel teaches us the great value of the Kingdom of heaven. The parables express the joy a person experiences in finding the great treasure of God in her or his life and the total commitment required in being a member of the Kingdom.

Whether we come to know the Kingdom by accident or after a long search, we must recognize that it is priceless, and we must be ready to sacrifice everything to hold on to it.

To be a disciple is to be single-hearted in accepting the Kingdom of heaven. Jesus wants his listeners to break out of their conventional way of thinking about the Kingdom of God and not confine it to a worldly kingdom that idealizes the past.

You may have heard the saying, "Where your treasure is, there your heart will be also (Luke 12:34)." Is there anything for which you would sell everything to have? The cost of being part of the Kingdom of

SAINT OF THE WEEK



St James, Apostle

Feastday: July 25

He was the brother of St John and, like him, a fisherman. He was one of the witnesses of the Transfiguration and one of those who slept through most of the Agony in the Garden. He was the first of the apostles to be martyred in the year 44, being beheaded by King Herod Agrippa I to please the Jewish opponents of Christianity. He was buried in Jerusalem, and nothing more is known about him until the ninth century.

At this time we learn of a tradition that the relics of St James were brought to Spain some time after his martyrdom, (perhaps early, perhaps as late as 830), and his shrine at Compostela in Galicia grew in importance until it became the greatest pilgrimage centre in western Europe. In every country there are churches of St James and known, well-trodden pilgrim routes.

In Paris, the Tour St Jacques marks the start of the route and the Rue St Jacques points straight towards Compostela. In England, pilgrim routes lead from all parts of the country to the major ports that were used on the pilgrimage. This network of routes is a vital witness to the fact that the Middle Ages were not the static stay-at-home time that we often think them to be: everyone must have known someone, or known someone who knew someone, who had made the pilgrimage. The scallop-shell, the emblem of St James, has become the emblem of pilgrims generally.

In 1987 the pilgrimage routes to Compostela were designated by the Council of Europe as historical cultural routes of international importance. The Confraternity of St James continues to work to restore and upgrade the refuges on a route which is still in active pilgrim use today.

Most Rev Anthony Randazzo Bishop of Broken Bay Message for BBNeighbourhoods

My dear brothers and sisters in Christ,

This image of the Penitent Magdalene painted in 1594-1595 by the Italian Master, Caravaggio, is worth contemplating as we celebrate the Feast of Saint Mary Magdalene, the Apostle to the Apostles, on Wednesday this week.

Caravaggio was not the first artist to depict Mary Magdalene in this manner. He makes the assumption that the woman in Luke's Gospel who washes Jesus' feet with her tears and dries them with her hair is Mary of Magdala (Luke 7:36-50). In the painting, we can see a glass bottle of oil representing the alabaster jar of perfume with which she anointed Christ's feet. Scattered on the floor next to Mary we can also see gold, pearls, and jewels that are symbols of earthly gain. Whatever the background of Mary Magdalene, what calls out to us for contemplation is not so much her past life but rather that, as the reading from the Song of Songs suggests, she found whom her heart loves (Song of Songs 3:1-4).

Only after having found Jesus in her life was Mary Magdalene able to bear witness to God's mercy and love. Traditionally this has been depicted, as this picture by Caravaggio suggests, as a penitent fallen woman. However, there is something much deeper here for our thought, and it can be found in the passage from John's Gospel (John 20:1-2, 11-18).

Having known Jesus in both life and death, Mary seeks the fullness of knowledge in his resurrection. There are two levels at which she seeks. The first is the most obvious and we would probably sum it up as the paschal mystery – the life, death, and resurrection of Christ.

However, the second is far more subtle, in that by faith, Mary demonstrates the real presence of Jesus in her own life. That is, through her living with Christ and her dying to sin, a new life is possible.

Through her belief in the risen Christ, the Paschal mystery is enacted in her life. This Good News then impelled her to go and tell the Apostles that the Lord is indeed alive! Because of this, we know her as the Apostle to the Apostles.

Each one of us, like Mary Magdalene, is invited to seek Christ in faith. Life in Christ will bring death to sin. Life in Christ is not just to be hoped for; it is something to be enacted now. Christ changes our hearts by making his home within us.

My sisters and brothers, this week be inspired by the life of Saint Mary Magdalene and by the words from the Song of Songs, to seek him whom my heart loves. Moreover, having found that love go and tell others that the Lord is indeed alive!

This is the Good News for each of us.
