Gospel reading for this Week

A reading from the holy Gospel according to Matthew 14:13-21

They all ate and were satisfied.

When Jesus received the news of John the Baptist's death he withdrew by boat to a lonely place where they could be by themselves. But the people heard of this and, leaving the towns, went after him on foot. So as he stepped ashore he saw a large crowd; and he took pity on them and healed their sick.

When evening came, the disciples went to him and said, 'This is a lonely place, and the time has slipped by; so send the people away, and they can go to the villages to buy themselves some food.' Jesus replied, 'There is no need for them to go: give them something to eat yourselves.' But they answered, 'All we have with us is five loaves and two fish.' 'Bring them here to me,' he said. He gave orders that the people were to sit down on the grass; then he took the five loaves and the two fish, raised his eyes to heaven and said the blessing. And breaking the loaves he handed them to his disciples who gave them to the crowds. They all ate as much as they wanted, and they collected the scraps remaining, twelve baskets full. Those who ate numbered about five thousand men, to say nothing of women and children.

GOSPEL REFLECTION

The **Eighteenth** Sunday in Ordinary Time Year A Matthew 14:13-21

In this Sunday's Gospel, Jesus invites his disciples to act in response to the needs of the crowd, to respond to the hunger they see before them. That hunger may be a physical hunger, as in the need for food, but it may also be a spiritual hunger. To feed someone means to encounter an individual at a fundamental point of need. It is an invitation to become intimately familiar with what it means to be human and weak.

Through this story, Jesus invites his disciples to learn what it means to embrace, with compassion, all who hunger.

Initially, the disciples' response is very tentative. At the prospect of feeding such a large crowd, the disciples look at what they don't have rather than at what they do have.

In facing similar challenges, we might ask ourselves how we respond. Do we look at our inadequacies and, out of fear, choose not to use what we have been given because we judge it is not enough? In God's Kingdom, whatever we have is more than enough if we allow God to act through us; therefore, when we take what we have, offer it to God to be blessed, and then share it with others, it is sufficient—more than sufficient—to meet the needs of God's people.

SAINT OF THE WEEK



St John Vianney

Feastday: August 4

Birth: 8 May 1786 at Dardilly, Lyons, France

Death: 4 August 1859 at Ars, France of natural causes

Born to a farm family. In his youth John taught other children their prayers and catechism.

Ordained in 1815, though it took several years of study - he had little education, was not a very good student, and his Latin was terrible.

Assigned as a parochial vicar to Ecully, France.

In 1818 he was assigned to the parish of Ars-sur-Formans, France, a tiny village near Lyons, which suffered from very lax attendance.

He began visiting his parishioners, especially the sick and poor, spent days in prayer before the Blessed Sacrament, did penance for his parishioners, and leading his people by example.

Had the gifts of discernment of spirits, prophecy, hidden knowledge, and of working miracles.

Tormented by evil spirits, especially when he tried to get his 2-3 hours of sleep each night. Crowds came to hear him preach, and to make their reconciliation because of his reputation with penitents; by 1855 there were 20,000 pilgrims a year to Ars.

Spent 40 years as the parish priest.

Dear Lord.

Help us to be like St John Vianney, to see God in each person regardless of their situation in life, and despite any wrongs they may have done to us.

Most Rev Anthony Randazzo Bishop of Broken Bay Message for BBNeighbourhoods

28 July 2020

My dear brothers and sisters in Christ,

Over the past fortnight, we have seen an escalation of COVID cases, not just in the State of Victoria, but also in parts of Sydney. It is worrying, but not unexpected.

Some of the most vocal critics are the very same people who advocate large public gatherings and demonstrations, as well as those who seem to flaunt the physical distancing recommendations and precautionary hygiene measures.

My dear people, now is not the time to relax our vigilance as a community of the Church. The Government measures that have been in place and that we have adopted as a Diocese are for the protection and well-being of all. I would like to thank you for implementing these measures and I urge you to continue to be observant and respectful of them. As a Catholic community, it is important that we take a leading role in good citizenship.

I was reminded this week that the Spanish Influenza pandemic of 1918 swiftly spread around the world and was not "under control" until 1920. While the COVID-19 Coronavirus is different to the Spanish Flu, there is much for us to learn as a community regarding how we might contribute to the safety of our society.

The Flu took a heavy toll on family life. Community wellbeing was threatened continuously over a three-year period. The economy was damaged as businesses closed, workers found themselves unemployed, and basic services such as mail delivery and garbage collection were hindered due to flu-stricken workers.

Thanks be to God, we have a much stronger health system in 2020 than in 1920. We also have access to cleaning and sanitising products that were simply not available to the masses 100 years ago. However, family life is just as vulnerable now as it was during the Spanish Flu because human lives and relationships are always vulnerable in moments of crisis. Likewise, the economy and the availability of gainful employment is currently under threat.

Being aware that members of the community are at risk or in danger is one of our major efforts at this time. Our Parishes, Catholic Schools, and CatholicCare communities are particularly well placed to be alert to risk and they are places where people feel secure. They are for many a safe harbour in the storm.

This week, I urge you to renew your efforts to ensure that you and your family remain attentive to the need for good hygiene, at home and when you are out and about. By being attentive, you will help limit the risk in the community of the Church and therefore in our neighbourhoods and social communities. I also encourage you to pray for an end to this time of trial.


"The plague that prowls in the darkness you will not fear" (Psalm 90: 5-6)
