GOSPEL REFLECTION The TWENTIETH Sunday in Ordinary Time Year A Matthew 15:21-28

Jesus reveals that God wants everyone to enter into the Kingdom of heaven. It is not reserved for an exclusive or select group but is available for all. Jesus, however, never diminishes in any way God's gift of free will, but his life does serve as a blueprint of how to enter into the Kingdom of heaven if we so choose.

To enter the Kingdom, we must accept the word of Jesus. Faith in Jesus, and in his Father who sent him, is the key to salvation. Everything else is based on this fundamental belief (see *CCC*, number 151). We don't have to be perfect to be in the Kingdom, but we do have to be willing to let the Holy Spirit help us grow more perfect in our love and forgiveness.

In the New Testament, we often read that the Kingdom of heaven is for those who are poor in spirit. This refers to those who are willing to do God's will and to place Gospel values before individual personal gain. The Canaanite woman gives witness to this kind of person by putting her daughter's needs first and by seeking out Jesus to heal her daughter of the demon regardless of the personal cost to her.

Because the Canaanite woman is able to let go of wanting to control God, and because she places her faith in God, she is able to witness to the disciples that trust in the will of God leads to grace.

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SAINT OF THE WEEK



St. Bernard of Clairvaux, Abbott and Doctor of the Church

Feast day: August 20 Death: 1153

St. Bernard, Abbot and Doctor of the Church St. Bernard was born of noble parentage in Burgundy, France, in the castle of Fontaines near Dijon.

Under the care of his pious parents he was sent at an early age to a college at Chatillon, where he was conspicuous for his remarkable piety and spirit of recollection. At the same place he entered upon the studies of theology and Holy Scripture.

After the death of his mother, fearing the snares and temptations of the world, he resolved to embrace the newly established and very austere institute of the Cistercian Order, of which he was destined to become the greatest ornament. He also persuaded his brothers and several of his friends to follow his example.

In 1113, St. Bernard, with thirty young noblemen, presented himself to the holy Abbot, St. Stephen, at Citeaux. After a novitiate spent in great fervour, he made his profession in the following year. His superior soon after, seeing the great progress he had made in the spiritual life, sent him with twelve monks to found a new monastery, which afterward became known as the celebrated Abbey of Clairvaux. St. Bernard was at once appointed Abbot and began that active life which has rendered him the most conspicuous figure in the history of the 12th century.

He founded numerous other monasteries, composed a number of works and undertook many journeys for the honour of God. Several Bishoprics were offered him, but he refused them all.

The reputation of St. Bernard spread far and wide; even the Popes were governed by his advice. He was commissioned by Pope Eugene III to preach the second Crusade.

In obedience to the Sovereign Pontiff he travelled through France and Germany, and aroused the greatest enthusiasm for the holy war among the masses of the population. The failure of the expedition raised a great storm against the saint, but he attributed it to the sins of the Crusaders. St. Bernard was eminently endowed with the gift of miracles. He died on August 20, 1153. His feast day is August 20.

Remember, O most gracious Virgin Mary,
that never was it known that any one who fled to thy protection,
implored thy help, and sought thy intercession, was left unaided.
Inspired with this confidence, I fly unto thee, O Virgin of virgins, my Mother,
to thee I come, before thee I stand sinful and sorrowful.
O Mother of the Word Incarnate! despise not my petitions,
but, in thy mercy, hear and answer me. *AMEN*.

THE RULE OF ST BENEDICT

The fourth degree of humility is that, meeting in this obedience with difficulties and contradictions and even injustice, he should with a quiet mind hold fast to patience, and enduring neither tire nor run away; for the Scripture saith: He that shall persevere to the end shall be saved; and again: Let thy heart take courage, and wait thou for the Lord.

FEAST OF THE ASSUMPTION OF OUR LADY AUGUST 15TH 2020 SOLEMNITY

This feast originated in Jerusalem before the fifth century as the "Falling-Asleep of the Mother of God." It was adopted in Rome in the mid-seventh century and was renamed the "Assumption" in the next century. It celebrates Mary's passing over, body and soul, from this world into the glory of her risen Son.

Message for BBNeighbourhoods 11 August 2020

My dear sisters and brothers in Christ,

Have you ever noticed that some people are incredibly passionate about issues in life? Issues such as the family, work, religion, politics, the environment, beginning and end of life, racism, justice and peace — the list is endless. The Oxford Dictionary defines the word passionate as "having or showing strong feelings of enthusiasm for something or belief in something". Yet, the word itself means so much more than having strong feelings. It is derived from the Latin word passio, which is a term found in Christian theology from the Latin word pati, meaning suffer. It is linked to the word compassion, which means to suffer with.

Looking around our Church and society, we do not have to go far to see or experience human suffering. Many people are doing it tough at the moment, and so it is good that as a community, we have strong feelings of enthusiasm towards life issues. It is even better that as a community of the Church we can stand alongside others and, in Christian solidarity, suffer with them.

Saint Paul spoke about suffering on many occasions. One of his most beautiful instructions can be found in his Second Letter to the Corinthians. Reminding the Christian community that we are never to lose heart but always to be filled with hope, he said, "We are afflicted in every way, but not crushed; perplexed, but not driven to despair; persecuted, but not forsaken; struck down, but not destroyed; always carrying in the body the death of Jesus, so that the life of Jesus may also be made visible in our bodies". (2 Corinthians 4:8-10)

For Paul, and indeed for all Christians, the paradigm of suffering is Jesus Christ, who underwent the agony of the cross and died for our salvation and the life of the world. The Apostle reminds us to put things into perspective by always placing Jesus and his cross at the centre of our lives. By doing so, we do not succumb to some sort of vague spiritual escapism, as the non-believer might have us think. We do find ourselves in communion with Christ – through his life, death, and resurrection.

Each day brings a deepening of that communion if we open our minds and hearts to the Spirit of Jesus. In the community of the Church, no one need ever be alone because we are one in Christ. This week can I encourage you to keep an eye out for those who might be alone and suffering? Through our faith in Jesus, we will be able to reach out to others. With the compassion of Christ, we will be able to suffer with them. In our love for Jesus, we will be passionate about issues of life over death, good over evil, and hope over despair.
