GOSPEL REFLECTION The TWENTY-SECOND Sunday in Ordinary Time Year A Matthew 16:21-27

Jesus is not a worldly leader who has conquered other nations in battle. Instead, Jesus has done something far greater and more liberating: Jesus has conquered death. In conquering death through his own Passion, death, and Resurrection, Jesus has won salvation for all humankind.

In professing that Jesus is the Messiah as defined by God's revelation, Jesus's followers will also face suffering and pain. Jesus did not come to do away with these conditions of human nature but to be a model of how to deal with suffering and death, which lead to new life in resurrection.

Jesus's honor is restored by God when God raises him from the dead on the third day. For Jesus's disciples, honor is won by taking up their crosses each day: "For those who want to save their life will lose it, and those who lose their life for [Jesus's] sake will find it" (16:25).

SAINT OF THE WEEK



The Passion of St John the Baptist

Feast day: August 29

Herod is to John the Baptist what Pilate is to Jesus. Neither Herod's nor Pilate's first choice was to order an execution. But cowardice and fear coalesced until commanding the death of an innocent man was more expedient than braving the ridicule and threats of subordinates.

According to Saint Mark, "Herod feared John, knowing that he was a righteous and holy man...When he heard him, he was greatly perplexed; and yet he liked to listen to him" (Mk 6: 20). "[Herod] was deeply grieved" (Mk 6: 26) that he had to order John's death. But he didn't actually have to order John's death. If he were truly grieved, he could have stood up in the midst of the happy crowd, said "I made a stupid promise which I now regret," and granted Salome (her name is not found in the Bible) some other handsome gift instead of a blood-splattered plate. Herod beheaded a man to save face, to avoid embarrassment, and to avoid having to say "I made a mistake."

The Passion, or Beheading, of Saint John the Baptist is one of the very oldest liturgical feasts on the Church's calendar. John's birth may be *the* oldest feast. Along with the feasts of Holy Week, the original event of John's death is right there on the surface of Holy Scripture, and so likely was commemorated as soon as the Church started commemorating anything.

John the Baptist's colorful life on the edge of respectability came to an abrupt end due to the weakness of a weak man, Herod, and due to the revenge sought by the troubled conscience of Herodias, who despised John for mentioning the obvious.

Saint Jerome writes that Herodias's rage was not satiated by the grisly head of her tormentor on a platter, but that she rabidly stabbed the tongue which had indicted her even after it was silenced.

Dear Lord, St John the Baptist's life ended abruptly when he spoke the truth. He was imprisoned and then killed for defending the dignity of marriage. Help us to be as courageous and outspoken as him, to profess our Faith in You, and help us to lead others to Your way, Your Truth, and Your Eternal Life.

Message for BBNeighbourhoods

25 August 2020

My dear brothers and sisters in Christ, In the past, the topic of mental health and wellbeing tended to have a negative label attached to it. That is an unfortunate situation and hopefully one that is consigned to the history books.

This year, the Australian Catholic Bishops have chosen mental health as our theme for the 2020-2021 Social Justice Statement. The theme was chosen long before COVID-19 took hold of the world and few could have predicted that along with threats to our physical well-being, the pandemic would profoundly impact the mental health of many people. There have been many instances where people experience anxiety and even despair. Anxiety has certainly become a widespread consequence of the manifold changes our Church and society has undergone in just a few months, particularly bearing heavily on the most vulnerable.

I believe that the Holy Spirit was at work, guiding the bishops to encourage our communities to understand mental health better, overcome some of the barriers and stigma from the past that may still be attached to mental ill-health and be more aware of those who most need our support.

Our challenge and our mission is to recognise Jesus Christ in the most vulnerable people in our community of the Church and in society. Often, they are the people who are ill in body, mind, or spirit. This time provides us with the opportunity to ensure that they do not slip between the gaps in our works of mercy and in our systems of care.

Jesus sought out the ones who were lost and forgotten and healed them of their ailments, but he did not stop there. He welcomed them back into the community of the Church to live a life of fulfilment and hope (John 10:10). Let us imitate Jesus in our passionate and relentless seeking of those who need our attention and welcome them into our parishes and communities with tender care (Romans 15:7).

I highly recommend the 2020-2021 Social Justice Statement: To Live Life to the Full: Mental Health in Australia Today. I believe that the Statement will be of great use for ongoing education and formation in our community of the Church as we engage with others in mercy and love. I offer you this brief summary by way of introducing the Statement to you and hope that it will be of benefit to us all, as together we seek the Kingdom of God, in this world and the next.
