Jesus said to the chief priests and the elders of the people, 'What is your opinion? A man had two sons. He went and said to the first, "My boy, you go and work in the vineyard today." He answered, "I will not go", but afterwards thought better of it and went. The man then went and said the same thing to the second who answered, "Certainly, sir", but did not go. Which of the two did the father's will?' 'The first' they said. Jesus said to them, 'I tell you solemnly, tax collectors and prostitutes are making their way into the kingdom of God before you. For John came to you, a pattern of true righteousness, but you did not believe him, and yet the tax collectors and prostitutes did. Even after seeing that, you refused to think better of it and believe in him.'

### GOSPEL REFLECTION Matthew 21:28-32

The parable of the two sons must be examined within the context of chapter 21. The chapter begins with Jesus's triumphal entry into Jerusalem. The crowds proclaim that Jesus is the Son of David. Upon entering the city, Jesus goes to the Temple and cleanses it of those selling and buying within it. The religious authorities, the chief priests and elders, demand to know on what authority Jesus has done this. In other words, they hadn't commissioned him or given him a license, and they want to see his credentials. Jesus does not respond to them directly but puts forth a few parables for their consideration.

In this Sunday's Gospel, one of those parables is before us. Jesus tells us of two sons and how they responded to their father's request. The father asks both sons to go and work in his vineyard. The first son says to his father, "'I will not'; but later he changed his mind and went" (21:29). The second son responds in this way, "'I go, sir'; but he did not go" (21:30). Jesus poses this question to the chief priests and elders who had challenged his authority: "Which of the two did the will of his father?" (21:31). Without hesitation, they answer, "The first" (21:31). Jesus affirms the answer given to him by the chief priests and elders and then goes on to speak of who will enter the Kingdom of heaven. Though these men are the officially designated religious authorities, others, such as repentant tax collectors and prostitutes, who actually carry out God's plan in their daily lives, will enter the Kingdom of heaven before the authorities. Tax collectors and prostitutes, long considered to be immoral individuals, heard the call for repentance; they took the message proclaimed by John the Baptist and Jesus to heart. They dared to believe in the forgiveness of sins and, as a result, completely changed their way of life. The chief priests and elders heard the same message but refused to open their hearts and minds; sadly, the course of their lives remained unchanged. By comparing the chief priests and elders to tax collectors and prostitutes, Jesus exposes their deep hypocrisy, their willingness to condemn others while failing to examine and change their own behavior.

### St Vincent De Paul

### Feast day: September 27

Patron Saint of all charitable societies, hospitals, & leprosy victims

Vincent de Paul was born in the small French town of Pouy on 24 April 1581 and ordained as a priest in 1600, at the age of 19.

As a young man, he ministered, initially, to the wealthy and powerful. An appointment as chaplain to a poor parish and to galley prisoners, however, inspired him to a vocation of working with those most marginalised and powerless.

Vincent urged his followers to bring God's justice and love to people who were unable to live a full human life. One of his many sayings was,

"Sometimes you must leave your prayers to serve the poor. In doing so you are leaving God for God."

Vincent de Paul died in Paris on 27 September 1660. He was canonised on 16 June 1737.

When Blessed Frederick Ozanam and his companions set up the Society in Paris in 1833, they adopted St Vincent de Paul as their Patron. It has been known as the "St Vincent de Paul Society" ever since.



Message for BBNeighbourhoods

### 22 September 2020

My dear brothers and sisters in Christ, In the first encyclical written in Pope Francis' pontificate, Lumen Fidei, the Holy Father looked at the biblical account of faith in the Old Testament. In particular, he looked at the kind of faith that Abraham exercised.

The faith of Abraham, says Pope Francis, was a faith where journeying in the expectation of the fulfilment of a promise by God took centre stage. The encyclical had this beautiful line to sum up the kind of faith I want to talk about this week in our Broken Bay Neighbourhoods: "faith sees insofar as it journeys" (Lumen Fidei, 9).

One of the fruits of the incarnation is that our faith cannot be an exit from this world. This is because heaven does not run from this world, it runs through it. The kind of faith our forebears believed and embraced was faith in action, embodied in the concrete circumstances of our lives.

The Psalms keep reminding us not only to think of the Lord, but "taste and see that the Lord is good" (Ps 34:8). This verse in Psalm 34 is a beautiful reminder of two important things.

First, it is a reminder of the incarnational aspect of our faith. Our faith in God is one that our bodies can and should experience and put into action in a concrete way. If you read this line of Psalm 34 carefully, you might notice that it is also a call to each and every one of us. It is calling us to be attentive to our circumstances and not try to use our faith to escape from them.

Our lived experiences are not a distraction from our faith in Christ. They are the very tools God uses for us to engage our faith. Indirectly, Psalm 34 is calling us to be attentive to the care of our sisters and brothers in Christ. Remember that when we walk with Christ, we also walk in communion with our brothers and sisters, and so they form an integral part of our lived experience of faith.

The other thing that the Psalm reminds us, is that our walk in and with Christ is ultimately a work of Christ.

When I say that faith is a faith in action, I do not mean that faith is a self-help programme. There is a line that says that "God helps those who help themselves", and this is terrible theology.

Faith does not mean pulling ourselves up by our bootstraps and proving to God that we are worthy of Divine assistance. Faith is not a force within us, it is a free gift of God, and the greatest gift of all is the gift of his Son, Jesus Christ.

This is where the incarnation once again becomes so important. The incarnation reminds us that God is not out there, distant, and uninterested in the lives of His Creatures. God poured himself out to live in solidarity with His creatures. In the person of Jesus, God lives as we would live and experiences the world as we would experience it. By doing so, God redeemed the world, and is still redeeming the world, out of love for you and me.

God continues to love us by joining us in our life, our joys, our hopes, and our sufferings, assuring us that we are not alone. This, my brothers and sisters, is what we call "grace". It is the pure and undeserved love of God. Our walk with Jesus Christ is the living out of that ridiculously abundant love of God for His world, in this world.
