Communion Antiphon

Jesus Christ is the same yesterday, today, and for ever.

GOSPEL REFLECTIONS

Sunday December 25 2022

NATIVITY OF THE LORD

Isaiah 52:7-10 Psalm 97:1-6 Hebrews 1:1-6 John 1:1-18

The Word became flesh and made his dwelling among us. (John 1:14)

Merry Christmas! Everyone here at *The Word Among Us* wishes you God's abundant blessings as you celebrate the birth of our Savior, the Word of God, who became flesh and dwelled among us.

When John speaks of Jesus as "the Word," he isn't referring to the close to thirty thousands words that the average person hears each day. Most of these words go in one

ear and out the other. But some stick with us and shape the way we think and the choices we make. These are the words that matter.

On this Christmas Day, St. John tells us of one Word that matters more than any other word we'll ever hear. It's Jesus, the *living* Word of God, who gives life to everything in the universe (John 1:3). He is the *divine* Word who imparts God's "grace and truth" to us (1:15). He is the *holy* Word who "shines in the darkness" to deliver us from sin and death (1:5). He is the *eternal* Word who "was made flesh" and who has "made his dwelling among us" (1:14).

Today can be a noisy day. We'll be making a joyful noise as we sing "Glory to God in the highest" and "Joy to the World" at Mass. Many of us will be part of the controlled chaos involved in unwrapping gifts and coming together for family celebrations. Who knows? We may hear as many as forty or fifty thousand words today! Of course, this is right and good. But at the center of it all is Jesus, the Word of God who came to speak life, healing, joy, and peace into our world.

As noisy as today may be, make sure you set aside time to sit quietly and listen for Jesus' voice. Welcome him into your heart. Let him share the good news of salvation with you. Let him tell you again that he loves you.

"Jesus, Word of the Father, come and speak your words of grace and peace to my heart."

Friday December 30 2022

THE HOLY FAMILY

Sirach 3:2-6, 12-14 Psalm 128:1-5 Matthew 21:13-15, 19-23

Take care of your father when he is old. (Sirach 3:12)

Doesn't today's first reading paint a beautiful picture of family life? Parents eagerly welcome their newborn baby into their hearts and home. They take care of that child's every need until she is able to live on her own. The child, in turn, honors and respects her parents, and when they grow old and become unable to care for themselves, she steps in and cares for them.

Of course, we know that it doesn't always work out that way, often through no fault of our own. But we can still form the circle of love that God desires every time we follow his call to "take care" of one another (Sirach 3:12).

On this feast of the Holy Family, let's consider what it means to take care of our loved ones. Of course, it starts with making sure that they are physically safe and healthy. But it goes far beyond that. "Taking care" means being aware of their feelings and paying attention to how our words and actions affect them. It means being patient when they are slow to learn or unable to do things for themselves. It means doing all we can to share our faith and enable them, whenever possible, to practice theirs. It means telling them how much we appreciate them. It means forbearing when they annoy us and forgiving them when they hurt us. And it means interceding for all their needs.

So take care of your children, your parents, your siblings. Take care of them when they are too young or too old to take care of themselves. Take care of them when they are ill or troubled. Take care of them when it's a delight and when it's a sacrifice.

This is a high calling, and we may fail at it sometimes. That's all the more reason to ask Jesus, who experienced family life himself, for the grace to keep forming this circle of love—day by day, week by week, year by year. Let's also ask Mary and Joseph to pray for us. May our care for one another bind us together in the Lord all the days of our lives!

"Father, thank you for the gift of my family. Help me to care for them as you care for me."

GOSPEL REFLECTIONS

Sunday January 1 2023

MARY, MOTHER OF GOD

Numbers 6:22-27 Psalm 66:2-3, 5-6, 8 Galatians 4:4-7 Luke 2:16-21

The shepherds returned, glorifying and praising God. (Luke 2:20)

Today, we celebrate the feast of Mary, Mother of God, the one who brought the Son of God into the world. And as much as we honor Mary today, we also honor Jesus, her divine Son.

At first glance, it may seem odd that today's Gospel focuses on the shepherds who came to see the newborn Jesus and left praising God. But surely Mary would want us to join them in their songs of praise! In everything she did, Mary led people to glorify her Son for the salvation he would win for them.

In every age, Mary has sought to bring all people to Jesus and to urge them to praise and worship him. In fact, it's probably her greatest desire for us as we begin a new year. She knows that we have so many reasons to praise her Son. We can praise him for becoming a man and teaching us to pray. We can adore him for offering himself on the cross to save us. We can glorify him for giving us his Spirit and making us children of God. We can *never* run out of reasons to praise Jesus!

So, make this your goal: to praise Jesus more in 2023. It's not always easy to include praise in your daily prayer, especially if you're not accustomed to it. You might not know what to say. But you can begin by thanking Jesus for your blessings. You can also praise him for forgiving your sins. And you can rejoice in his faithfulness and unending love.

As you add praise to your prayer, you can always ask Mary, Mother of God and your Mother, for help. You can use the Magnificat, her own song of praise, as a model as you set out to magnify the Lord (Luke 1:46-55). And you can take comfort in knowing that Mary is praising Jesus right along with you—all year long!

Sunday January 8 2022

THE EPIPHANY OF THE LORD



The star . . . stopped over the place where the child was. (Matthew 2:9)

Imagine how difficult the Magi's journey was. If they came from Persia, as most scholars believe, they would have had to travel nearly one thousand miles. That's four months on the road. Traveling all that time with treasures like gold, frankincense, and myrrh would have made them ripe targets for brigands and highway robbers. And then there were the general conditions, "the ways deep and the weather sharp," as the poet T.S. Eliot put it. How many times do you think they were tempted to turn around and return home?

To add insult to injury, when they came to Jerusalem, they discovered there was no "newborn king of the Jews" to be found (Matthew 2:2). They had to go to Bethlehem and "search diligently" for him there (2:8).

What a model of faithfulness and perseverance! And these were pagans who didn't even worship the God of Israel! On this day, when we celebrate the first Gentiles to worship the Lord Jesus, let's follow their example on our own journey toward Jesus.

When the way of discipleship seems too deep and the weather too sharp, picture the Magi trudging over miles and miles, determined to get to Jesus.

When the lies of the devil or the allure of the world try to rob you of your faith, picture the Magi guarding their treasures.

When the road to holiness turns out to be longer than you thought it would be, or when it takes an unexpected turn, picture the Magi pressing on to Bethlehem to seek the Christ child.

The Magi were "overjoyed" when they found the Lord (Matthew 2:10). Similarly, your perseverance will be rewarded with the deep-down joy that comes from knowing the overflowing love of Jesus. Surely this is a journey worth taking!

"Jesus, help me to persevere so that I can behold your glory!"
