ENTRANCE PROCESSION

Give me justice, O God, and plead my cause against a nation that is faithless. From the deceitful and cunning rescue me, for you, O God, are my strength.

SUNDAY HOLY MASS PRAYER

SELF REFLECTION: MERCY

John 8:1-11 reminds me to withhold judgment and focus on my own flaws before condemning others. Jesus' mercy toward the woman teaches me the power of forgiveness and transformation, urging me to extend grace and strive for change in my own life.

- How often do I judge others without reflecting on my own flaws first?
- Am I quick to extend grace and forgiveness, as Jesus did, or do I hold grudges?
- In what areas of my life do I need God's mercy and transformation?
- How can I show more compassion to others who are struggling or have made mistakes?
- Do I fully embrace God's forgiveness and allow it to change my actions and heart?



Lord, help me to reflect on my own flaws before I judge others. Teach me to extend grace and forgiveness, as You did with the woman caught in sin. Fill my heart with Your mercy and guide me toward transformation, that I may live a life that reflects Your love. Amen.

FIFTH SUNDAY OF LENT

First Reading: Isaiah 43:16-21 (Year C) (JB) A reading from the prophet Isaiah

I am doing a new thing and I will give drink to my people.

Thus says the Lord, who made a way through the sea, a path in the great waters;

snuffed out, put out like a wick: No need to recall the past, no need to think about what was done before.

The wild beasts will honour me, jackals and ostriches, because I am putting water in the wilderness (rivers in the wild) to give my chosen people drink. The people I have formed for myself will sing my praises.

YEAR C

Second Reading: Philippians 3:8-14 (Year C) (JB)

A reading from the letter of St Paul to the Philippians Because of Christ I look upon everything else as useless in order to gain him.

I believe nothing can happen that will outweigh the supreme advantage of knowing Christ Jesus my Lord. For him I have accepted the loss of everything, and I look on everything as so much rubbish if only I can have Christ and be given a place in him. I am no longer trying for perfection by my own efforts, the perfection that comes from the Law, but I want only the perfection that comes through faith in Christ, and is from God and based on faith. All I want is to know Christ and the power of his resurrection and to share his sufferings by reproducing the pattern of his death. That is the way I can hope to take my place in the resurrection of the dead. Not that I have become perfect yet: I have not yet won, but I am still running, trying to capture the prize for which Christ Jesus captured me. I can assure you my brothers, I am far from thinking that I have already won. All I can say is that I forget the past and I strain ahead for what is still to come; I am racing for the finish, for the prize to which God calls us upwards to receive in Christ Jesus.

GOSPEL: John 8:1-11 (Year C) (JB) A reading from the holy Gospel according to John Let the person without sin be the first to throw a stone.

Jesus went to the Mount of Olives. At daybreak he appeared in the Temple again; and as all the people came to him, he sat down and began to teach them.

The scribes and Pharisees brought a woman along who had been caught committing adultery; and making her stand there in full view of everybody, they said to Jesus, 'Master, this woman was caught in the very act of committing adultery, and Moses has ordered us in the Law to condemn women like this to death by stoning. What have you to say?' They asked him this as a test, looking for something to use against him. But Jesus bent down and started writing on the ground with his finger. As they persisted with their question, he looked up and said, 'If there is one of you who has not sinned, let him be the first to throw a stone at her.' Then he bent down and wrote on the ground again. When they heard this they went away one by one, beginning with the eldest, until Jesus was left alone with the woman, who remained standing there. He looked up and said, 'Woman, where are they? Has no one condemned you?' 'No one, sir,' she replied. 'Neither do I condemn you,' said Jesus 'go away, and don't sin any more.'

The Gospel of the Lord. Praise to you, Lord Jesus Christ.

GOSPEL REFLECTION Sunday, April 6 Isaiah 43:16-21 Psalm 126:1-6 Philippians 3:8-14 John 8:1-11

Forgetting what lies behind but straining forward to what lies ahead. . . . (Philippians 3:13)

St. Paul's description of his life in Christ can sound like a burdensome set of rules: accept the loss of all things; share in Jesus' sufferings; forget what lies behind; strain toward God's upward calling.

But Paul was *happy* to do all of this. Why? Because he had been changed. He had encountered Jesus, experienced his mercy, and was convinced that his new life was infinitely better! The imprint of Paul's experience of conversion on the road to Damascus, and every choice he made to follow Jesus thereafter, transformed his perspective. The entire direction of his life was different.

You can imagine something similar happening in the heart of the woman caught in adultery in today's Gospel reading. Her sin was laid bare before Jesus, and she was about to be killed by an angry mob. But she received God's unexpected and surprising mercy as Jesus dispersed the crowd and said to her, "Neither do I condemn you. Go, and from now on do not sin any more" (John 8:11). Surely, empowered by Jesus' words, she gladly accepted the loss of her old way of life, just as Paul did. She was happy to forget the emptiness of what lay behind her and, by God's grace, to strain toward his upward calling of a life free from her past sins.

How have you encountered Jesus? You might have decided to give your life completely to him at a pivotal point. You might have brought a burdensome sin to Confession and been convinced of God's forgiveness and love. Maybe you're longing for an even deeper encounter right now! These experiences can change your heart and shape your perspective. They make losing your life apart from Jesus—even when it involves difficulty—completely worth it! You, like Paul, can hold onto the "supreme good of knowing Christ Jesus [your] Lord" (Philippians 3:8).



SAINT OF THE WEEK

Saint John Baptist de La Salle, Priest

Feast Day: April 7 C. 1651 - 1719

Patron Saint of educators

Canonized by Pope Leo XIII on May 24, 1900

John Baptist de La Salle was born into an upper-class family in Reims, France. He enjoyed a life of honor and social prestige, as well as an excellent and expensive education. When John was eleven, he and his parents made a promise of his lifelong service to the Church. At age sixteen, he became a canon of the ornate Reims Cathedral, acting as the cathedral's caretaker and advisor to the archbishop. He completed his education at some of the finest schools in France. He had to return home when both of his parents died to care for his six younger siblings and to oversee the family estate. Over the next five years, he completed his theological studies and was ordained a priest at age twenty-six. He then completed his doctorate of theology and immersed himself in the life of a young and well-respected priest.

Father de La Salle's spiritual director, Father Nicolas Roland, had a saintly heart for the poor and the education of children. He helped found the Sisters of the Child Jesus whose mission was to care for the sick and educate poor girls. Father de La Salle served as chaplain and confessor and assisted them with their work. When Father Roland was dying, he exhorted Father de La Salle to continue on. Not drawn to the work, he reluctantly agreed and soon met Adrian Nyel, whom he assisted in founding two schools for poor boys in Reims. He later tried to withdraw but could not resist the sisters and Adrian who were passionate about education of the poor.

With Father de La Salle's own excellent education, he was well aware of the teachers' lack of skills and their poor personal formation. The students were often poorly brought up and "far from salvation," he would recount. Father de La Salle invited the teachers into his home, sharing meals with them, and teaching them how to be better teachers and men of God. To devote more time to them, he invited the teachers to live with him, drawing criticism from his wealthy relatives. Resistance and criticism from his social peers and even the bishop for associating with poor boys and poorly educated teachers continued. After prayerful consideration, Father de La Salle resigned as cathedral canon and devoted himself full-time to the education of the poor.

Father de La Salle gave away the small fortune he had inherited to the poor who were suffering from a famine in another city. He founded the Institute of the Brothers of the Christian Schools, relying on donations to educate poor boys.

Father de La Salle formed his brothers in the art of education with a clear system and classroom structure that was new, ordered, and effective. The brothers became master teachers and formed the boys in virtue and ordered living. He opened schools for teachers and educated poor children for free.

Father de La Salle remarked later in life that if he had known what God would ask of him from the beginning, he would have never said "Yes." But God, in His perfect wisdom, led him one step at a time, and Father de La Salle only had to respond to one gentle prompting of grace at a time.

Saint John Baptist de La Salle, God led you one step at a time. Your generosity to the promptings of grace led you down a path you could have never imagined. Please pray that I will always be open to the plan God has for my life and will generously respond to that plan. Saint John Baptist de La Salle, pray for me. Jesus, I trust in You.
