SELF-REFLECTION: BE READY

Sunday's Gospel, Jesus said "Stay awake.....you too must stand ready because the Son of Man is coming at an hour you do not expect." (Matthew 24:43-44)

Staying awake does not mean staying awake all night but to be alert and live in the present so we can notice our Lord when he does appear in our lives. He shows himself in times you will not be ready for him.



- Am I alert and "awake" living in the present moment recognising the Lord if he appears in my life?
- When my time comes to face God, will I hear the words 'Well done'?
- If life-changing moments happen to enter my life will I be in tune with Jesus ready for whatever may come?
- Am I present to the Lord's daily appearances in my life even in my ordinary routine?


Stay awake, you must be ready.

GOSPEL REFLECTION

Sunday, November 27 Isaiah 2:1-5; Psalm 122:1-9 Romans 13:11-14 Matthew 24:37-44

You also must be prepared. (Matthew 24:44)

This is it—we have lit the first Advent candle. Christmas is less than four weeks away, so we need to get ready. If we plan on giving gifts, sending Christmas cards, or having guests over for Christmas dinner, now is the time to start planning.

Jesus is saying something similar in today's Gospel reading, but with a different focus: "Get ready; you don't know when I will come again!"

So how can we prepare ourselves for Jesus' coming, both at Christmas and at the Second Coming? Here's one idea: just as you give Christmas gifts to your friends and family, think of a gift you could give the Christ child. Here are some possibilities.

- -Set aside an hour each week to sit before Jesus in the Blessed Sacrament. In the quiet of his presence, praise and thank him for becoming a man and saving you from sin and death.
- -Serve the needy in some way. Volunteer at a food kitchen, buy gifts for a family that is struggling, or help decorate the home of an elderly relative or neighbor.
- -See where you have strayed from God. Then go to Confession and receive his forgiveness and the grace to follow him more closely.
- -Is there anyone you need to forgive? Ask Jesus to help you forgive that person, and then reconcile with them if possible.

As you decide what you will give Jesus, remember: it's not only about what you do to get ready for his coming. It's also about what he wants to do for you.

- -As you sit before him in adoration, he wants to give you his peace.
- -As you reach out to the needy, he wants to encounter you in his beloved poor.
- -As you go to Confession, he wants to fill you with his mercy.
- —As you forgive other people, he wants to help heal your wounded relationships.

Jesus is so generous that he wants to help you get ready for him. So slow down this Advent and let him give you the gift of a ready and willing heart.

"Jesus, I long for your coming. Help me to get ready!"



Vox Populi - Voice of the People ADVENT



This Sunday, 27 November marks the start of Advent. It is the beginning of the Church's liturgical year and encompasses the four Sundays (and weekdays) leading up to the celebration of Christmas.

It is a time of reflection, anticipation and preparation when we can direct our minds to Christ's second coming at the end of time, and to the anniversary of Our Lord's birth on Christmas.

The exact origin of the celebration is not known, although it was being practiced as early as the 5th century.

Saint Gregory of Tours wrote about his predecessor Saint Perpetuus decreeing a fast three times a week from the feast of Saint Martin (November 11) until Christmas.

It's unclear whether this was a new custom or the reinforcement of an existing custom. Either way, the custom began to spread beyond the Diocese of Tours, and soon all of France was observing three days of fasting each week between the feast of Saint Martin and Christmas. However, the practice of fasting went beyond France, and many chose to fast every day of the Advent season, not just the three days prescribed.

By the 13th century, the fast of Advent was not being as commonly practiced, and so it was reformed, shortening it to a four-week cycle.

The liturgical season of Advent (which comes from the Latin *adventus*, meaning "coming") is now spread over four Sundays, with the readings and teachings focused on the preparation for the Second Coming and the Last Judgement.

People are often fascinated by Jesus' promise to "come again". But the scripture readings during Advent tell us not to waste our time with predictions. Advent is not about speculation. The Advent readings call us to be alert and ready, not weighted down and distracted by the cares of this world (Lk 21:34-36).

During the season of Advent, the liturgical colour is violet which represents penance, preparation and sacrifice.

It serves as a beautiful visual reminder to the faithful, that they should carry this spirit of repentance and penance throughout the season, remembering that Christ's birth was the beginning of his earthly mission, preaching the faith and eventually dying for our salvation.

However, on the 3rd Sunday of Advent, or Gaudete Sunday, priests wear rose-coloured vestments, just as it is during Lent, which represents the joyful reward that comes from offering sacrifice with patience.

During Advent there are four candles, one each week, followed by the white candle at Christmas:

The first one, violet or light purple, represents God's People. It is the candle of Hope.

The second, also violet, represents the Old Testament Prophets, and is the Candle of Peace.

The third represents John the Baptist, and is the Candle of Hope. This is rose-coloured. The fourth, again violent, represents Mary the Mother of Jesus, and is the Candle of Joy.

Lord Jesus, Master of both the light and the darkness, send your Holy Spirit upon our preparations for Christmas. We who have so much to do and seek quiet spaces to hear your voice each day, we who are anxious over many things look forward to your coming among us. Amen.

Saint Andrew the Apostle

c. First Century

Feast Day: November 30



Patron Saint of Scotland, Greece, fishermen, sailors, and spinsters

A big-hearted fisherman becomes a daring Apostle of the Lord

Andrew was a fisherman from Bethsaida in Northern Israel. He lived on the shores of the Sea of Galilee, which is really a lake, where many of Jesus' miracles took place. Jesus chose mostly fishermen and small farmers to be His disciples, perhaps because in these professions a man can plan, sweat, and calculate, and still, in the end, fail. Success is not appreciated unless failure is an option. Farmers and fishermen must depend on God's providence for success. No amount of preparation can make the clouds open and the rains pour down, and no amount of careful planning will make the nets burst with fish. Farmers and fishermen are hard-working, careful, thoughtful, and yet entirely dependent on the weather and other factors outside of their control. They must work, pray and trust in God in equal measure. They must have the discipline of faith. These are the qualities that made Andrew and others such great disciples.

Andrew was first a disciple of John the Baptist. Andrew was at John's side when a man whom John had recently baptized walked by. "Look, here is the Lamb of God," John exclaimed (Jn 1:36). Andrew was curious and, along with a few of John's other disciples, followed the mysterious man. The next day Andrew breathlessly told his brother Simon "We have found the Messiah" (Jn 1:41) and brought him to Jesus, who renamed Simon as Peter. From that point forward, Andrew became one of Jesus' most reliable Apostles, a leader among the Twelve whose name recurs time and again in the Gospels. There are various traditions about where Andrew evangelized after the Ascension of the Lord, with most focusing on Greece, Turkey, and north of the Black Sea. There are no certain facts about his manner of death, although various apocrypha state that he was tied to an x-shaped cross and then preached from that high pulpit for days until he died.

Saint Andrew sat at the table of the Last Supper, felt the hot breath of the Holy Spirit on his cheeks at Pentecost, saw the radiant body of the risen Lord with his own eyes, and endured physical hardships as he carried a new religion into old lands. We can suppose that he, like many of the Apostles, was content with his way of life before he met the Lord. Fishing on the tranquil waters of a lake, sharing daily meals with his extended family, chatting in the evenings with old friends before a fire. The Apostles did not abandon their lives to follow Jesus because their lives were miserable. It was a question of more. More meaning. More truth. More fulfillment. More challenge. More daring. There is nothing wrong with a good life, but there is something better about a great life.

The Apostles were mostly simple, intelligent, hardworking men whose outstanding characteristics were courage and daring. Many people who could have followed the Lord did not. The rich young man went away sad for he had many possessions. Perhaps the greatest thing that young man had was his youth. Andrew and Peter and John and Simon and all the others were young too. Yet they did not go away sad. They stayed, they followed, they were challenged, and they were contented.

Andrew renounced his father, his boat, his nets, and all that was known and comfortable. He traded what was good for what was better. And for that generosity and daring we remember him today, so many centuries later. He was of that generation of pathbreakers who sowed the seeds whose harvests the Christians of today have reaped and enjoyed.

Saint Andrew, we ask your intercession as an Apostle in heaven to make all Christians more generous in responding to the Lord's invitation to follow Him. Embolden us to share the faith with our families, as you did with your brother Simon Peter, and to be outspoken in our beliefs. Amen.
