## SELF-REFLECTION: COURAGE & FAITH

This Sunday's Gospel, Joseph is faced with fear, uncertainty, and a future he did not expect. In the quiet of his confusion, God speaks to him in a dream. Joseph listens, trusts, and acts. Without words, he becomes a model of faithful obedience, welcoming Jesus into his life and accepting the role God has given him. Through Joseph's trust, Emmanuel—God *with us*—enters the world.

## I Reflect

- *Where in my life is God asking me to trust, even when I do not fully understand?*
- *Do I make space to listen for God's voice in moments of uncertainty?*
- *Like Joseph, am I willing to act with courage and faith?*

# Obedient Love

## Prayer:

*Loving God,  
help me to trust you when the path ahead is unclear.  
Give me a listening heart and the courage to say yes to  
your will, so that I may welcome Jesus more fully into my  
life. Amen.*

**First Reading: *Isaiah 7:10-14 (JB)***

A reading from the prophet Isaiah

*The virgin will conceive.*

The Lord spoke to Ahaz and said, 'Ask the Lord your God for a sign for yourself coming either from the depths of Sheol or from the heights above.' 'No,' Ahaz answered 'I will not put the Lord to the test.'

Then Isaiah said:

'Listen now, House of David:

are you not satisfied with trying the patience of men without trying the patience of my God, too? The Lord himself, therefore, will give you a sign. It is this: the maiden is with child and will soon give birth to a son whom she will call Emmanuel, a name which means "God-is-with-us".'

**Responsorial Psalm: Let the Lord enter; he is king of glory.****Second Reading: *Romans 1:1-7 (JB)***

A reading from the letter of St Paul to the Romans

*Jesus Christ, a descendant of David, is the Son of God.*

From Paul, a servant of Christ Jesus who has been called to be an apostle, and specially chosen to preach the Good News that God promised long ago through his prophets in the scriptures.

This news is about the Son of God, who, according to the human nature he took, was a descendant of David: it is about Jesus Christ our Lord who, in the order of the spirit, the spirit of holiness that was in him, was proclaimed Son of God in all his power through his resurrection from the dead. Through him we received grace and our apostolic mission to preach the obedience of faith to all pagan nations in honour of his name. You are one of these nations, and by his call belong to Jesus Christ. To you all, then, who are God's beloved in Rome, called to be saints, may God our Father and the Lord Jesus Christ send grace and peace.

**GOSPEL *Matthew 1:18-24 (JB)***

A reading from the holy Gospel according to Matthew

*Jesus was born of Mary, the betrothed of Joseph, a son of David.*

This is how Jesus Christ came to be born. His mother Mary was betrothed to Joseph; but before they came to live together she was found to be with child through the Holy Spirit. Her husband Joseph, being a man of honour and wanting to spare her publicity, decided to divorce her informally. He had made up his mind to do this when the angel of the Lord appeared to him in a dream, and said 'Joseph son of David, do not be afraid to take Mary home as your wife, because she has conceived what is in her by the Holy Spirit. She will give birth to a son and you must name him Jesus, because he is the one who is to save his people from their sins.' Now all this took place to fulfil the words spoken by the Lord through the prophet:

The virgin will conceive and give birth to a son  
and they will call him Emmanuel,

a name which means 'God-is-with-us'. When Joseph woke up he did what the angel of the Lord had told him to do: he took his wife to his home.

## GOSPEL REFLECTION

**Readings: Isaiah 7:10-14 / Romans 1:1-7 / Matthew 1:18-24**

Today's readings revolve around a simple yet demanding invitation: **to trust God when the way forward is unclear.**

In **Isaiah**, King Ahaz is offered a sign from God but hesitates. Even so, God remains faithful and promises a sign anyway—"The virgin shall conceive and bear a son, and shall name him Emmanuel." God does not withdraw His promise because of human fear. He steps closer, assuring His people that **He is with them**.

In **Matthew's Gospel**, we see how that promise is fulfilled. Joseph faces confusion, fear, and potential shame. His plans are disrupted by God's unexpected work. Yet Joseph listens, trusts, and acts. He takes Mary into his home and names the child Jesus. Without words, Joseph teaches us that **faith is shown through obedience**.

**St Paul**, in his letter to the Romans, reminds us that this child—Jesus Christ—is not only born into history but **sent for the sake of the world**. Through Him we receive grace and are called to belong to God. Faith is not private or passive; it is a response to God's initiative.

Together, these readings proclaim a powerful truth:  
God keeps His promises. God comes close. And God asks for our trust.

### Key Thought

**Faith means trusting God enough to act, even when we do not fully understand.**

### Take-Home Challenge

This week, ask yourself: *Where is God inviting me to trust Him more deeply?*

Choose one situation where you are uncertain, anxious, or hesitant, and consciously place it in God's hands. Like Joseph, take one small step of faith.

**Loving God, You are Emmanuel, always with us. Give us the faith to trust Your plans and the courage to say yes, even when the path is unclear. Amen.**





## SAINT OF THE WEEK

### Saint John of Kanty (Cantius), Priest

C. 1390-1473

Feast Day: December 23

**Patron Saint of teachers,  
students, priests, pilgrims, Lithuania, and Poland**

**Canonized by Pope Clement XIII on July 16, 1767**

Jan Kanty (John Cantius in English) was born in 1390 in the small town of Kęty, in the Kingdom of Poland. Kęty is about ten miles south of Oświęcim, which the Nazis renamed Auschwitz, the location of the largest and most horrific concentration camp in World War II.

Young John proved to be intelligent and devout, receiving his early education in his hometown. Around age twenty-three, he enrolled in the Kraków Academy where he studied philosophy. During John Cantius' studies, he was introduced to *Devotio Moderna* (Modern Devotion) that emphasized personal devotion, humility, and conversion through meditation upon Sacred Scripture and prayer.

Around 1418, John earned his doctorate in philosophy. He taught philosophy classes at the Kraków Academy while studying theology. Upon completing his studies, John was ordained a priest and became rector at the school of the Canons Regular of the Most Holy Sepulcher in Miechow, about twenty-five miles north of Kraków, where he served for about eight years. The Canons Regular followed Saint Augustine's Rule. With no printing press, one of Father John's duties was to work as a copyist of Scripture and books through which he grew in an intimate knowledge of Sacred Scripture. He also copied Saint Augustine's works, inspiring his deep love of Augustinian philosophy and theology. Father John copied more than 18,000 pages of text that still exist.

In 1429, Father John accepted a position at Kraków Academy where he became a beloved professor of Sacred Scripture, philosophy, and theology. He had a reputation for making complex philosophical and theological concepts accessible to his students, combining depth with clarity and practical application. He earned a doctorate in theology, becoming head of the Philosophy Department, and eventually, head of the Theology Department.

Besides being an excellent professor, Father John cared for his students' spiritual needs with compassion and concern. He was known as a powerful preacher and a defender of orthodoxy. One raging debate in the Church was conciliarism, an assertion that the pope should submit to Church councils' authority. Father John became a staunch defender of the papacy, with a profound effect upon his colleagues and students.

Father John also became well-known and well-loved in Kraków for his generosity and love of the poor. Whatever he had was theirs, minus the meager amount he required for his own needs. One story relates that he even gave away his shoes to a poor person. When asked why he was going barefoot, he replied that a poor person needed his shoes more than he did.

Father John's prayer life was greatly enhanced by his penitential life. He slept on the floor and ate very little. He made four 1,800-mile pilgrimages to the Holy Land, carrying his one sack of belongings. Many miracles were attributed to his intercession by those who visited his tomb. These later miracles drew pilgrims from across Europe to the university's Collegiate Church of Saint Anne, where he was buried.

*Saint John Cantius, though a great intellectual, your humility, deep faith, and genuine love for those to whom you ministered had a lasting effect upon your community and upon all of Poland. Please pray that I will imitate your virtues so that I, too, will one day be counted among the saints. Saint John Cantius, pray for me. Jesus, I trust in You.*
