### Gospel reading for this Week

### Mark 1:21-28

A reading from the holy Gospel according to Mark *This is a new kind of teaching that speaks with authority.* 

Jesus and his followers went as far as Capernaum, and as soon as the Sabbath came Jesus went to the synagogue and began to teach. And his teaching made a deep impression on them because, unlike the scribes, he taught them with authority.



In their synagogue just then there was a man possessed by an unclean spirit, and it shouted, 'What do you want with us, Jesus of Nazareth? Have you come to destroy us? I know who you are: the Holy One of God.' But Jesus said sharply, 'Be quiet! Come out of him!' And the unclean spirit threw the man into convulsions and with a loud cry went out of him. The people were so astonished that they started asking each other what it all meant. 'Here is a teaching that is new' they said 'and with authority behind it: he gives orders even to unclean spirits and they obey him.' And his reputation rapidly spread everywhere, through all the surrounding Galilean countryside.

### GOSPEL REFLECTION Mark 1:21-28

"You are the holy One of God!" Even demons recognized who Jesus was. In the person of Jesus, Son of Mary, God visited his people. Through the words and deeds of Jesus, God 's presence became tangible. "Wherever God acts, God is." God was present to the audience in the synagogue through Jesus, simply because the Son of God possessed a divine nature.

When we experience Jesus, his words and deeds change us. If he could heal one possessed, can't he heal us of our demons, sins, and failures? All we need to do is trust. Once we have seen and heard, once we have been healed, we are sent to proclaim the Good News to others. (See 1 John 1:1-4)

When was the last time you had a moment of grace: a time of divine insight and healing?

Was that time a signpost in your life?

Are you still affected by that graced moment? Explain.

Jesus came to proclaim the Good News. Sometimes he used words. And, sometimes he healed. But all his words and deed reflected a greater power: God's love. He was the instrument, the conduit of that love, for he is God. The holy One made God present in tangible ways. He still does.

What word would you like to hear God speak?

How would you like to be healed?

Take a few moments this week to listen to God and prepare yourself for his loving touch.

## SAINT OF THE WEEK Saint John Bosco

c. 1815-1888

Feast Day: January 31

Patron Saint of editors, publishers, schoolchildren and juvenile delinquents

St. John grew up dirt poor in the country working as a shepherd. His father died when he was an infant. After studies and priestly ordination we went to the big city, Turin, and saw first hand how the urban poor lived. It changed his life. He began a ministry to poor boys which was not particularly innovative. He said Mass, heard confessions, taught the gospel, went on walks, cooked meals, and taught practical skills like book binding. There was no secret to Don Bosco's success. But no one else was doing it, and no one else did it so well. Followers flocked to assist him and he founded the Salesians, a Congregation named after his own hero, St. Francis de Sales. The Salesian empire of charity and education spread around the globe. By the time of its founder's death in 1888 the Salesians had 250 houses the world over caring for 130,000 children. Their work continues today.

Don Bosco was not concerned with the remote causes of poverty. He did not challenge class structures or economic systems. He saw what was in front of him and went "straight to the poor," as he put it. He did his work from the inside out. It was for others to figure out long term solutions, but not for him.

Don Bosco did not know what rest was and wore himself out by being all things to all men. His reputation for holiness endured well beyond his death. A young priest who had met him in northern Italy in 1883, Fr. Achille Ratti, later became Pope Pius XI and, on Easter Sunday 1934, canonized the great priest he had known so many years before.

St. John Bosco, you dedicated your life to the education and care of poor youth. Aid us in reaching out to those who need our assistance today, not tomorrow, and here, not somewhere else. Through your intercession may we carry out a fraction of the good that you achieved in your life. **AMEN**.
